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BURGLARS AT WORK.
Turner and Salem Visited Last Night - Swag Secured at Turner.
AT TURNER.
The store of Schmidt & Co., at Turner, was robbed early this morning. The burglars got in through the door and succeeded in getting away with about \$100 worth of goods in the shape of two new suits of clothes, shoes, silk handkerchiefs and cutlery. No trace has been found so far. Sheriff Croisan was notified at 9 a. m., and has a sharp lookout. Burglars are infesting the small towns.
AT SALEM.
Burglaries are growing very frequent in occurrence. Last night Harry Simon's cigar store was entered from the rear, but nothing could be secured as another glass door intervened, there being police on this block all the time. The key was evidently seized from without and turned. There is no doubt but that burglars in store for Salem and that several of the lower orders of this species of craftsmen are located in this city.

Burkhardt, residing near this city, received first and second premiums on two-year-old Percheron colts, thoroughbreds. They were sired by Deo and weigh 2300 together. This is quite a feather in Linn county's cap, one deserved. There were four Oneco colts in the exhibition at least, R. A. Witzels receiving a prize.—Albany Democrat.
FROM CLATSOP COUNTY.—Sheriff H. A. Schmidt, of Clatsop county, came up on the south bound train today. He had in his charge an insane man committed from Astoria. He is an Austrian about 35 years of age, Paulo Tarahia by name, and he imagines that he is a bird. He was in a strait jacket and tightly strapped. He was taken at the Clifton cannery, twenty-five miles distant from Astoria. He is said to be very violent.

APPEAL FOR THE COLLEGE.
Salem Should Awake Before the Willamette is Shattered Away.
The people of Salem can not afford to let the proposition to enlarge the endowment of the Willamette University to fail. It is a matter that concerns all who are interested in the prosperity of the city. Considered from a business standpoint it adds largely to the growth and prosperity of the city and whatever enlarges its usefulness also aids the prosperity of the city. It is all the more important since the proposition is not an appeal to the generosity of the people but a business proposition involving no possible loss but on the contrary insuring fair returns, in fact a good investment considered simply as a speculative venture. With such an opportunity there should be no hesitancy in taking hold of the undertaking and push it to success. There is no question of doubt connected with it, if those who are able will only interest themselves to the extent of investigating the proposition and then acting promptly and unitedly. It only requires a little concert of action and popular enthusiasm to make it an eminent success, financially to all parties, as well as an honor to the city. The business men of Salem ought to show their interest in the upbuilding of the city by giving this matter the needed support not as donors, but as a business enterprise. It is no longer a question of where to locate but a question of disposition to do anything.
There certainly is not a business man in Salem who does not desire to see the University put upon a more solid basis and there can be none who are not willing to do their best in helping along so worthy an enterprise, especially when it involves no sacrifice of means.
