THE SAFE CRACKERS.

Sheriff Croisan Adds a Desperate Character to his Collection in Jail.

Probably there has never been a tougher collection of dangerous criminals in any county jail in the state, except Multnomah, than is now under Sheriff Croisan's charge. During the past few months there has occurred several successful safe-cracking exploits. First Mr. Blackberry at Silverton, Independence was the next victim to the midnight depredators, Gervais following, then Eugene and lastly Stayton and as one of the burglars of the latter was caught "red-handed" it will probably be his last for sometime. The circumstances of the capture of the Stayton safe-cracker, near Albany are already well known, his examination occurred this morning before Justice Applegate. He waited examination and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury with the amount of his bond not yet determined. Being unable to get any one to serve as his bondsman he will be lodged in the county jail. The prisoner who gives his name as Thomas Manley is a powerful looking young fellow, light complexion, light curly hair quite short, a yellowish mustache and has a scar on his left temple.

Attorney Geo. Bingham, Mr. Eldridge of the firm of Eldridge & Whitney of Stayton whose store was robbed, and a JOURNAL representative went to the county sheriff's office and requested to see his kit of tools. Deputy Sheriff Wain took the gunny sack from behind the desk and dropped it on the floor for inspection. After finding that it contained giant powder, dynamite and giant caps it was handled with marked consideration. His outfit is one of the best adapted to his line of business that has been captured in this state for sometime. It consists of eleven drills ranging in size from one-fourth inch to one-half inch. Two funnels for the purpose of putting the powder into the safe. Two one-pound cans of powder, some coarse blasting powder in a sack, a box of giant caps, besides a small copper case containing dynamite, also a coil of fuse. They were also well supplied with fire arms, having three double action revolvers and a plentiful supply of ammunition. For purposes of entrance into buildings they were well equipped, having a bunch of skeleton keys which will open almost any lock. In case the key was in the door however, they are provided with a pair of key nippers. The other pack, captured with the prisoner, consisted of wearing apparel, gum coats, shoes, coffee and other like articles. All of these however were of the best, although having the pick of the best at the same price, it is quite natural that they should have superior articles. On Thomas Manley's person were found three watch chains one of which is the property of Mr. Whitney the charm having his name engraved upon it, two pocket knives and \$40 in gold and silver.

He had a Mexican dollar and a Canadian quarter both of which Mr. Eldridge can identify. This money the prisoner offered to Judge Pratt to defend him. As it is Mr. Eldridge's money however he thinks he will not devote it to this purpose.

Besides the contents of the safe at Stayton some dry goods and other general merchandise was taken. It is hoped the capture of several of the burglars recently will break up the gang of thieves that have been operating in the valley for some time past.

THE ELWOOD ARRIVES.—Just before noon today the continued whistling of the new steamer Elwood, notified the Salemites that she had arrived. Mr. J. Eldridge and C. H. Abernathy, two of the firm of Eldridge & Abernathy Bros., who own her were aboard, and report a very speedy and successful trip. She will go down to Portland next Sunday. Hereafter, however, her regular days to go to Portland will be Mondays, Tuesdays and Saturdays. She will be able to run at almost any stage of the river, it is thought.

AN IOWA PICNIC.—Quite a number of Iowa people have expressed a desire to follow the suggestion of the JOURNAL for picnics by states on July 4th. We presume other states will be glad to fall into line and prospects are good for a number of reunions by states on that day.
