He has already improved so far as appearance indicates, and it is believed the air of Bar Harbor will have its usual invigorating effect upon him.

HEARSAY MINISTERS.
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 8.—In recent sermons several ministers have inveighed against a large number of immoral places allowed to exist in this city by the authorities. The grand jury summoned these ministers before them, and in its report, just made public, the jury says: "Your grand jury have no hesitation in saying that they regret that ministers of the Gospel should lower their dignity as to proclaim from their pulpits and through the public press of this city the existence of evils and immoral condition of affairs based only upon hearsay and rumors."

AGAINST MORPHINISTS.
SPOKANE, June 8.—The crusade that has been waged by the police for the past two months against the morphine habit is having a beneficial effect. City Attorney Hamilton, who first called the attention of the public to this growing pernicious evil, said today that he thought the number of the "fiends" had been reduced of late, but there were many in the city yet.

"They have learned to avoid the police," said he, "and are not in the station so often for vagrancy. The worst case I ever saw was only released from the county jail last week. His person was something horrible to look at and shows to what point these men can be reduced and still retain hold on life."

HUNG BY A MOB.
LOUISVILLE, June 8.—At Wick Cliffe, this morning, Evan E. Shelby was taken from jail and hung by a mob. Shelby was charged with the murder of Mrs. Sallie Moore in 1888.

FOUND A TRUE BILL.
PHILADELPHIA, June 8.—The grand jury this afternoon returned a true bill of indictment against John Barsdale, ex-city treasurer, charged with appropriating funds belonging to the city.

PART OF CARGO AT TOCOPILLA.
WASHINGTON, June 8.—Information was received in this city from Chili to the effect that the insurgent schooner Etata, before proceeding to Iquique, from Tocopilla landed at the latter place 13,000 rifles and a large amount of supplies.

STRIKE AVERTED.
CHICAGO, June 8.—A serious strike was averted yesterday by a prompt concession on the part of the employers. Saturday night the journey bakers' council decided to order all the union bakers in the city out on a strike yesterday afternoon if a renewal of last year's scale of wages was refused. Yesterday afternoon over two-thirds of the master bakers had not only conceded the scale, but further agreed to advance \$1 per week to all the bench hands during the summer months. Nearly 1400 men would have been affected by a general strike. Two of the largest establishments, Bremner and Aldrich, employing union and non-union help, will give an answer today. If they accede to the journeymen, 400 men now out in smaller establishments, is expected, will speedily gain their point.

SORROWFUL CANADIANS.

The Death of Sir John Mac Donald.

High Water in Texas, The Baccarat Scandal, Accidentally Shot, Gibson Will not be Tried, The Strike in London, State and Foreign News, Etc.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD IS DEAD.
OTTAWA, June 7.—Sir John A. Macdonald is no more. The distinguished statesman who guided the political destinies of Canada for nearly half a century, passed peacefully away at 10:15 last night, surrounded by his entire household. Lady Macdonald, who bore up bravely during the fatal illness, is now prostrated with grief. Thousands of citizens are expressing deep regret at the premier's demise. For hours members of the household had been watching at the bedside to see life depart. He had lost consciousness thirty hours before, and had taken no nourishment since, save small quantities of champagne, which were administered with difficulty. For days he resisted the inevitable by sheer force of his powerful will.

The funeral is likely to take place on Tuesday next, and will be of a state character. On that day the body will likely be removed to the senate chamber and lie in state for four or five hours. The interment will subsequently take place at Kingston, Ont., where the premier's first wife and father are buried.

HIGH WATER IN TEXAS.
ST. LOUIS, June 8.—Dispatches from several points along the Red river in Texas indicate that the stream is rising rapidly. At Gainesville it is above high water mark. All communication with Indian Territory is cut off and it will be some time before the damage can be repaired. Messengers from Burlington state that the river is running wild in that section and the destruction of property is very great. Some lives are reported lost. D. T. Harris, a stockman has lost five hundred head of cattle and fifty-five horses. In the heavy rain at Chillicothe, Texas, two employes of W. T. Lindsay and two strangers who camped near the bridge at that place were drowned.

THE BACCARAT TRIAL.
LONDON, June 8.—When the trial of the Baccarat case was resumed today, Sir Charles Russell took up and completed his address for the defense. Solicitor General Sir Edward Clarke, the leading counsel for the plaintiff in opening his plea said it had been common talk that the Prince of Wales' continual presence in court during the trial of this suit had been for the purpose of restraining the tongues of the lawyers from commenting upon the Prince of Wales' connection with it. Facing the Prince of Wales, the Solicitor General remarked that the counsel for the defendants had said if the jury had found for the plaintiff and disregarded the document the latter had signed at Tranby Court, the military authorities would take the matter up and that Sir William Gordon Cummings' name would be stricken from the army list. "I wish to say in unmistakable terms" exclaimed Sir Edward Clarke "that it would be impossible for the authorities to do any such thing and leave on that list the name of field marshal Prince of Wales." This bold statement seemed completely to take away the breath of the audience and caused by far the greatest sensation of the trial. The Prince of Wales sat on a bench to the left of the Lord Chief Justice immovable not a muscle of his face apparently twitching. Leaning his head upon his arm and endeavoring to appear totally unconcerned.

INDICTMENT QUASHED.
CHICAGO, June 8.—Judge Rodgett this morning quashed the United States indictment against Geo. G. Gibson, secretary of the whiskey trust, charged with a conspiracy to destroy Shufeldt's distillery. The decision is on the ground, that the case is one for state court, and not for United States courts, to decide in a case in which there is no statute of penalty for the crime for which he was indicted.

PORTLAND, June 8.—The American Sons of the revolution was organized Saturday. Twenty-five charter members were enrolled, and the following officers were elected: Colonel T. M. Anderson, U. S. A., of Vancouver, president; Lloyd Brooke, of Portland, vice-president; Colonel J. K. Phillips, of Portland, secretary; C. N. Waite, of Portland, treasurer; Lieutenant Alfred Hasenous, U. S. A., of Vancouver, registrar.

These officers, with the following gentlemen, will constitute the board of directors: Dr. Ross C. Houghton, of Portland; Major J. C. Muhlenburg, U. S. A., of Vancouver; George M. Savage, of Olympia; and H. L. Wells, of Portland.

The annual meetings will be held on the 22d of February. It is desired to make the society as strong as possible in Oregon and Washington.

THE OMNIBUS STRIKE.
LONDON, June 8.—Hardly a single omnibus is running today and it is estimated about 5000 omnibuses and 10,000 horses are idle through the strike which commenced yesterday.

FROM CHINA.
LONDON, June 8.—Advices from Shanghai report fresh outrages against foreigners at Wusueh, near Kia Kiang, the English missionary and customs officer were murdered and European residents are appealing for the protection of the men of war.

THE BEHRING SEA.
LONDON, June 8.—A bill to enable Her Majesty by order in council to make special provision for prohibiting catching seals in Behring sea by her subjects during the period named in order, passed the house of lords today.

THE SORROW OF CANADA.
TORONTO, June 8.—From almost every point in Canada come the tidings of universal sorrow at the death of Sir John Macdonald. Everywhere signs of mourning are to be seen. Arrangements are being made to fire five minute guns at Ottawa and at every city in Canada during the progress of the funeral of the dead premier. There is strong feeling that an autopsy should be made on the body of Sir John by independent medical men in order that the public may know what really caused his death. The Empire, a government organ, in an editorial on "The Duty of the House" says: "It is plain that Sir John's disappearance from the stage is to be the signal for a movement toward annexation."

DID NOT LIKE IT.
IQUIQUE, June 8.—There is great excitement here over the decision of the American admiral to take the Etata without allowing a discharge of her arms and ammunition. The press is very bitter, and considers the United States does not recognize the cradle of the republican idea, and commits a grave error in thus indirectly assisting the dictator. El Nacional in an editorial says: We know we have the sympathies of the people of America, also of the people of all other civilized nations, but the act of the United States government against the weaker power to arms for liberties and rights, is not in harmony with the traditions of that government.

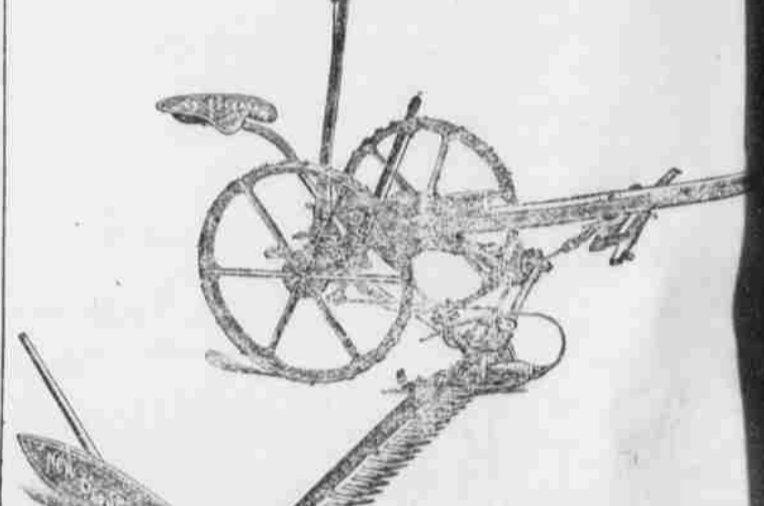
