

ship company to buy 400 tons of coal, but the Mexican government refused to permit them to load it, even after it had been paid for. It is thought Palma threatened to fight if it was not furnished, and anchored the Esmeralda with her guns trained on the town. After repeated protests, the government at the City of Mexico sent an order to furnish the vessel with the needed coal. While the Esmeralda was awaiting coal, her guns were always ready and her docks strewn with sand in expectation of a battle. Palma is reported as being the congressional party lost 8500 men in the revolution, while Balmaceda could count his losses at 10,000, and that the insurgents needed arms and ammunition more than anything else.

THE WALLA WALLA SOLDIER.
WALLA WALLA, June 9.—Yesterday at 10 o'clock, when the superior court opened, the judge ordered the sheriff to bring the seven soldiers indicted by the grand jury for lynching Andrew Hunt, into court. Prosecuting Attorney Blanford moved to quash the indictment, which was ordered done by the judge, and the prisoners were remanded to the custody of the sheriff. Defendants, through their attorney, Senator George P. Thompson, moved that they be discharged from custody. The motion was argued by both attorneys and submitted to the judge, who overruled the motion and the men were taken to the jail again and locked up. At 3 o'clock the grand jury came into court and informed the judge they had something to communicate to him, and the foreman passed up a paper to the judge, who read it and announced that the grand jury had found a true bill against the seven soldiers now confined in jail for the killing of Andrew J. Hunt. The indictment was substantially the same as the first one, with the exception that the language was changed. The jury then returned to their room for further deliberation.

A CARZY FREAK.
NEW YORK, June 9.—Lester L. Bristol, superintendent of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad tunnel, of Jersey City, has been missing from his home with his four children, Louis, William, Dexter and Harry, aged 11, 9, 7, and 5 years respectively, since last Saturday. The boys left home Saturday morning, and although the police of New York and Jersey City have been making diligent search for them, no trace of any of the party has been discovered. Bristol is an educated man, and an expert electrician. He has been working on a patent for several months, and is believed to have become unsound in mind. He had complete charge of the tunnel, ordering the movement of scores of passenger trains daily. Superintendent Reasoner, of the D. L. & W. R. R., received Bristol's resignation Saturday afternoon. It appeared to have been written by a lunatic man. Mrs. Bristol is nearly distracted, and she indignantly denies that any domestic troubles existed, and says her husband was devotedly attached to her and the children. She fears that in his insanity he may harm the boys. Bristol's father who is stopping temporarily with the family, also received a rambling letter from his son Saturday afternoon. It tells the old gentleman in time of trouble to go to the Bible.

EVIDENCE OF A CRIME.
NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 9.—Charles Kehoe, of this city, and two others were walking in the woods in Arlington, a mile from here, yesterday afternoon. At a spot about fifteen rods from the main road, they discovered signs of a sharp struggle. The grass was much trampled and covered with blood; nearby were a man's shoes. They also found a clay pipe, a handkerchief soaked with blood yet wet, and a lady's glove with the fingers torn off. Later a party of boys found a lady's bracelet. There also were traces of blood, and between that spot and the river the bushes were beaten and trampled down. Police are making investigation, and think murder has been committed.

SUGAR TRUST DIVIDEND.
NEW YORK, June 9.—The sugar trust today declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 1/2 per cent, on preferred and 4 per cent, on common stock.

FLOODS IN MEXICO.
ST. LOUIS, June 9.—A dispatch from the City of Mexico says a water spout burst near San Luis Potosi, Sunday, devastating the country for three miles. It is not known how many lives are lost. Hundreds of people are homeless and destitute.

A STRANGE ACCIDENT.

The Czar Interferes in Behalf of the Hebrews.

THE BACCARAT TRIAL ENDED.

Rumors of Cabinet Changes, A Lucky Carpenter, Foreign Ministers Going to Chicago, The Sharpshooters Tournament, Foreign and State News, Etc.

A STRANGE ACCIDENT.
BERLIN, June 9.—A strange and fatal accident occurred at Templehof this morning, in the presence of the emperor. The grandees were being drilled by the emperor, while the men were being put through their exercises, a vivid flash of lightning hurled them to the ground. The officers in command and three soldiers were knocked insensible. Two of the latter died almost immediately afterwards, and the captain and the other soldier were dangerously injured. A horse was also killed. It is supposed the rifle barrels and bayonets of the soldiers attracted the electricity which caused such fatal results.

THE CZAR INTERFERES.
ST. PETERSBURG, June 9.—It is semi-officially stated that the czar, having learned that the Jews expelled from Moscow were brutally treated and not given time to settle their affairs, has given an order to authorities to observe the ukase which directs the expulsion to be effected gradually, in order to enable the Jews to wind up their business.

THE BACCARAT TRIAL.
LONDON, June 9.—The jury in the Baccarat trial today returned a verdict against the plaintiff, Sir William Gordon Cumming. The Prince of Wales was not present this morning. The lord chief justice had hardly taken his seat when Gen. Owen Williams stepped to the front of the bench and said, his face pale and his voice husky: "My lord, I have to ask your protection. Yesterday Sir Edward Clarke thought proper"—here Solicitor-General Sir Edward Clarke sprang to his feet and exclaimed, "I ask your lordship to interfere, and that Gen. Williams should not be allowed to make a statement, as he has not the privilege of doing so." To this Gen. Williams hotly replied: "I was accused of an abominable charge"—here the chief justice interfered, saying "I do not remember the expression but I do not think you can be allowed to speak." But General Williams persisted in being heard, Lord Coleridge interrupted the general remarking with considerable warmth "I cannot hear any statement from you and immediately commenced his summing up, while General Williams retired frowning and greatly discontented.

The announcement of the verdict for the defendant was received with blessing from the galleries where the ladies were congregated and upon the part of some of those in the body of the court who were in sympathy with the plaintiff. Court officers had some difficulty in suppressing these marks of principally feminine disapprobation of verdict.

CABINET CHANGES.
WASHINGTON, June 9.—It is stated by a Vermont republican, who was formerly clerk of a prominent committee of the house of representatives, that Secretary of War Proctor would retire after the fall elections, and then Mr. Harrison's cabinet would be reconstructed. Mr. Blaine, he said, would remain at the head of the state department, Mr. Tracy as secretary of the navy, Mr. Miller would go on the bench and Mr. Noble would be provided for with a foreign mission. The reconstruction of the cabinet would be made, he said, by and between Secretaries Blaine, Foster, Tracy and the president himself, with the object of promoting Mr. Harrison's reelection. All stories, he said, as to who would be selected for cabinet vacancies were merely conjectures, as no person had yet been selected or even discussed.

A LUCKY CARPENTER.
SPRINGFIELD, O., June 9.—James Wood, lately a poor carpenter here, is on his way home from England nearly a quarter of a million dollars richer than he left this city. The story from his sudden rise from poverty to wealth has many romantic features. Many years ago his grandfather, a young English naval officer, loved and married a young girl in Waterford, Ireland. The marriage was beneath his social station, and his wife, being of a spirited nature, did not long bear the indignities forced upon her. She soon left

his home and came to this country. Here she found employment to support herself, and her child, a daughter, who afterward became the mother of James Wood, now the happy heir to a large portion of the great Wood estate.

TO VISIT WORLD'S FAIR SITE.
WASHINGTON, June 9.—A number of ministers of foreign countries will leave here Thursday under the auspices of the state department, for Chicago where a visit will be made to the site for the world's fair. They wish to see what arrangements have been made, and what scope the fair is to be.

SHARPshooters TOURNAMENT.
ST. LOUIS, June 9.—Sharpshooters from all over the United States to the number of 2,000 opened their tournament here today by a grand parade.

SHOT HIMSELF.
LOUISVILLE, June 9.—Henry Zeisel, a Grand Army man, killed himself here yesterday with the load he last put in his musket during the war. He had been spending his pension money in drink, and when he went home this morning he kissed his little girl good-by and went into another room and shot himself.

RAIDERS PLEADS GUILTY.
PHILADELPHIA, June 9.—John Bardsley, ex-city treasurer, was arraigned this morning on seventeen different indictments charging him with having loaned money as a public officer, deriving gain from the deposit of public money and converting public money to his own use. He pleaded guilty to every count. Two weeks from today is set for the hearing of evidence, when the court will pronounce sentence according to its weight.

MORE BONDS.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 9.—The stockholders of the St. Louis and San Francisco R. R. today voted favorably upon the project to issue new bonds to the amount of \$50,000,000 at four per cent.

SOCKLESS JERRY WAS THERE.
LACROSSE, Wis., June 9.—The State farmers' alliance met in convention here this morning to continue two days. The prime object of the gathering being the discussion of the project to organize all farmers' societies under one head. Among the notables present were President Polk of the National Farmers' alliance and representative Jerry Simpson.

FOREIGN.

DO NOT LIKE WOMEN DOCTORS.
LONDON, June 9.—The Turks, who are very numerous in the occupied provinces of Bosnia, have objected to the presence of a woman doctor in a hospital at Sarajevo. For this reason, as the Austrian government is careful not to hurt the feelings of the Mussulman, the woman doctor will doubtless be removed. One Turaisa patient, when approached by the female physician, became very angry, and told her to go back to the harem, and not try to act the part of a man.

The Austrian government has not decided, as was reported, to admit women to hospitals, only one woman having been admitted, and she is only on trial.

FRANCE AND THE WORLD'S FAIR.
PARIS, June 9.—At a cabinet council held today it was decided to ask Parliament for the credit necessary to enable France to take part in the world's fair at Chicago.

Oscar Wilde's Companion.
As the story goes, it was Whistler the artist who induced Oscar Wilde to visit the United States in the interests of aestheticism. Wilde was one of Whistler's most devoted satellites, and Whistler recognized in the ambitious and audacious young man just such a missionary as would do good work for the new school in this wild and woolly republic of ours. It is said that Whistler planned every detail of the famous tour, even to the amusing item of that long hair with which Oscar won half the battle among us.
Wilde worshipped Whistler, hanging upon his utterances as though he were a veritable god. Whistler understood his pupil thoroughly, reading his thoughts as though his mind were an open book. None knew better than Oscar's faculty for absorbing the useful. Oscar's powers of assimilation were always amazing, and London folk used to say that Oscar's bon mots were Whistler's commonplaces warmed over.
On one occasion Whistler told a very funny story, and after the applause had ceased Wilde drew out somewhat peevishly, "Egad, Whistler, I wish I'd said that." Thereupon Whistler retorted amiably and soothingly, "Ah, never mind, Oscar, but have patience, for you will say it; indeed you will."—Eugene Field in Chicago News.

Taking a Drive with Grant.
I was a resident of Detroit when the late General Grant was a captain of infantry and stationed at Fort Wayne, the military post near that city. Grant at that time owned a pacing pony that was as fast as a ghost. One day he invited Bishop McClosky to take a ride behind the pacer. The bishop weighed 250 pounds and was very dignified. Grant's course lay up Jefferson avenue to Grosbe Point, then, as now, a favorite drive. Grant started the pacer up long before he got beyond the city limits, and was soon fairly flying along.

I well remember seeing the bishop holding on to the seat of the buggy with one hand and on to his hat with the other, while Grant was holding on to the pony to steady him and not saying a word. When the ride was ended the bishop expressed his thanks to Grant for the courtesy shown him, but Grant could never get him into his buggy again. Poor old McClosky! It is sad to contemplate that he was compelled to die in exile. Few men have fallen as hard as he did nor created a greater sensation when they fell.—Interview with Treasurer Reeve.

The Tarpon.
The tarpon is the Megalops atlanticus of naturalists, a member of the family Elopidae, and may be considered a gigantic herring. They have a wide geographical range from the extremity of the Florida reef to Cape Cod, two specimens having been captured in the latter locality in 1874. From May to September they are extremely common in the northern streams of Florida, seeking the warmer waters of the reef and the more southern inlets during the winter. Large ones are the rule, averaging 150 pounds in weight and from five to seven and a half feet in length, while their maximum length is said to be over eight feet, and their weight 300 pounds.

The smallest specimen observed in the St. John's river, according to a careful observer, weighed sixty-eight pounds, and its capture was effected in a manner that illustrates the agility of the species. It leaped aboard the steamer Water Lily, clearing the guards, and landing fairly in the captain's lap, who was sitting in a chair in the middle of the forward deck.—C. F. Holder in Century.

A New Anecdote of Boswell.
Once in a country inn an aged man told me at great length, and with an infinity of windings, turns, harkings back and episodes, a story. He was once a long time ago, he said, a child, and in the days of his childhood there was once, he remembered, some kind of fete or rejoicing at which he was present. A gentleman who was there took him into his arms and kissed him. "My dear," said the gentleman kindly, "you will now be able to tell your children that you have been kissed by the great Boswell." "Pray, Mr. Boswell," said a lady (and I do think it was a most cruel thing to say), "pray, Mr. Boswell, why are you great?" A story like this seems to give one a kind of connection, not granted to all the world, with the last century, because Boswell died in the year 1795.—Walter Besant in Harper's.

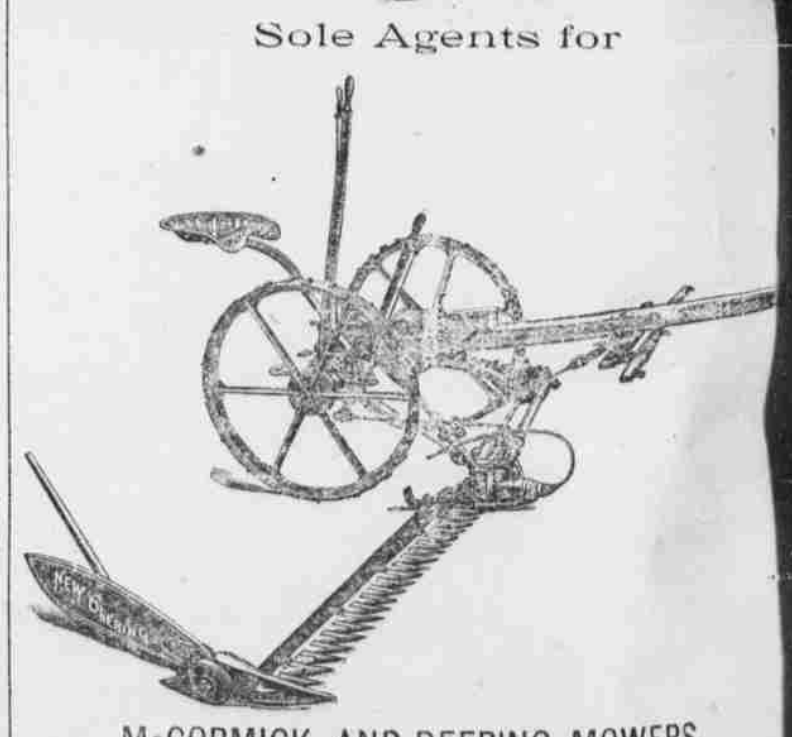
