Now it is claimed that the waters around the south side of the island are disconnected, and that the Indians and explorers have to make frequent portages while traveling by them. The channel on the north side of the island, however, is deep and continuous, and it is thought that the old treaties and conventions must have referred to the northern channel.

ACCIDENT ON S. P.
REDDING, Cal., June 10.—The overland bound south last night ran into a band of cattle near Copley. The engine was thrown from the track against the bank derailing the mail and express car. The cab on engine was thoroughly demolished. No one seriously hurt. The wrecking train from Dunsmuir went to the relief and cleared the track so that by noon the overland north lying here was enabled to proceed.

THE ANNUAL RENTAL.
WASHINGTON, June 10.—Attorney General Miller has given an opinion that the secretary of the treasury has full authority to reduce the annual rental of seal to an amount appropriate to the number of seals which the contractors are allowed to take. Under the original contract, providing for a catch of 100,000 seals per annum, rent was fixed at \$50,000. On this basis rent for the present year has been fixed at \$3750, or 50 per cent. of the seal catch of 2500.

RACES AT CHICAGO.
CHICAGO, June 10.—Ed. Corri gan's horse, "G. W. Cook," yesterday won the Spirit of the Times' stake, beating Racine, Proctor Knott, and several less famous cracks. It was Racine's first race east of the Rocky mountains, and he made a fine effort and was leading in the stretch, when suddenly the Chicago favorite, ridden by Overton, shot forward and won at the wire by a short head, Proctor Knott third.

A DUEL.
SANTA CRUZ, Cal., June 10.—Monday in East Santa Cruz, Jesus Gonzales was shot through the heart by Gusman Harjos, death being instantaneous. A week ago, a woman who had lived with Gonzales for several years left him and went to the house of Bonita Amaya in East Santa Cruz. The trouble of the pair had apparently been settled, they expected to go to San Jose and be married. Gonzales met Harjos on the street and accused him of stealing the woman with whom he had been living; he then drew a pistol. Harjos threw up his left hand to catch the arm holding the pistol, and then drew his own pistol and fired with fatal effect. Harjos went to an East Santa Cruz justice and gave himself up.

A MURDERER SURRENDERS.
MENDOCINO, Cal., June 10.—Jackson Roades, the slayer of a school teacher, D. D. Shull at Cuffey's Cove, May 29, has been lodged in jail at Ukiah. He came into Boonville late at night, and finding acquaintances said he was tired, hungry, and sleepy, and that he desired to give himself up. The only remark that he made concerning the killing was, "It's strange what scrapes a man would get into." The feeling at the Cove is intense against Roades, and it is feared that should he be brought there for preliminary examination he will be lynched.

FOREST FIRES.
SALISBURY Me., June 10.—Forest fires are raging in Providence, especially on the northern branch of the International Railroad. Kent Junction is wiped out and the Welford and coal branch are in danger. Every available man is fighting fire. Many saw mill are burned. The fire is spreading and unless aid comes soon much greater danger is threatened.

CONFEDERATE MEMORIAL.
FREDERICKSBURG, Va., June 10.—This town is profusely decorated, with bunting and Confederate and National flags, in honor of Memorial day and the unveiling of the monument to the Confederate dead. Thousands of visitors are here from different parts of the Union. At 3 o'clock the monument was unveiled with appropriate ceremonies in the presence of a host of people.

MINISTERS EXPELLED.
PITTSBURG, Pa., June 10.—This morning six young ministers of the Reformed Presbyterian church, charged with heresy, was expelled from the church by the synod. The vote was 95 to 37. The charges against them were scandal, libel and following divisive courses in declaring in favor of right of franchise.

PORTER STILL MINISTER.
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—The rumor that Porter, Minister to Italy, has been recalled, is positively denied at the State Dept. (up 95).

THE FLOODS IN TEXAS.

ARDMORE, Ind. Ty., June 10.—Reports received here give heart-rending accounts of the fearful havoc to life and property in the overflowed valley of the Red river, in Texas and this territory. Dwellings and business houses are swept away, crops destroyed, and stock of all kinds drowned. A flat boat containing several men who were trying to rescue families driven to the tops of their houses by the flood capsized and one of the occupants was drowned. It is feared that many persons who are now missing have been drowned. It is impossible now to ascertain the loss of life or value of property destroyed. Many families are rendered homeless.

FATAL RIOT.
GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., June 10.—The street car strike broke out again early this morning. A crowd of 200 gathered at Sweet Street Cable Station, and were smashing things when the police arrived. A pitched battle ensued. Revolvers were fired and bricks and sticks were thrown, before the mob dispersed. Officers have arrested thirteen of the mob. It is reported that one of the crowd was fatally injured and others wounded.

HIGH WATER IN MO.
VERSAILES, Mo., June 10.—The Osage river is higher than it has been for many years. The bottom lands and wheat fields are flooded. Great loss will result from the destruction of the crops and the washing away of fences and railroad ties.

A NEW PARTY.
ST. PAUL, June 10.—A new political party has started here under the name of National Association. Sixty gentlemen of this city and vicinity have filed articles of incorporation. The organization is to be on a secret society basis, and will be extended into other states as fast as possible. By next year the leaders expect to have sufficient strength to warrant a nomination of presidential candidate.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.
PORTLAND, Or., June 10.—The Republican City Convention met this afternoon, for the purpose of nominating a ticket for the coming municipal election.

CARE OF EX-CONFEDERATES.

How the Southern States Treat Their Disabled Veterans of the War.
Georgia's Confederate pension system, under which disabled veterans receive from \$2 to \$25 per month, according to the disability, is highly creditable to the state, but it should accept and maintain the home near this city in order to complete the good work. It will be of interest to review the situation in other southern states. Virginia led in the movement, and established a Confederate home at Richmond, for the support of which the state expends \$10,000 a year. Pensions to the amount of \$5,000 annually are also paid.

REBELS GRANTED AMNESTY.
BERNE, June 10.—The national council has granted amnesty to all citizens who took part in the revolution of the canton of Ticino, in September last.

SIR WILLIAM G. CUMMINGS MARRIED.
LONDON, June 10.—Sir William Gordon Cumming was married this morning in Holy Trinity Church at Chelsea to Miss Florence Garner, daughter of the late Commodore William Garner, of New York City. Only twelve people were present, the marriage was particularly secret. Lady and Sir William Gordon Cumming left this city shortly after the ceremony for the bridegroom's estate Altyre, near Forres in Scotland, where they will spend the honeymoon.

THE DEAD PREMIER.
OTTAWA, June 10.—The body of Sir John Macdonald had been lying in state in the senate chamber since 10 a. m. yesterday. There was a jam about the main entrance at 5 a. m. The funeral services were conducted at Arnscliffe, and an hour later the remains were borne to the senate chamber by six members of the Dominion houses. Six carriages, in which were seated the relatives and personal friends of his, followed. At 10 o'clock the senate doors were thrown open. Lord Stanley, accompanied by his staff, was the first to enter. Next came members of the cabinet and senators and members of parliament. A thousand ladies paid their last tribute to the late premier. The house last night after touching addresses being made by members on both sides, adjourned until June 16th.

He Opens Safes for a Living.
There is a man in this city who only a short time ago opened the big vault in the sub-terrestrial building where \$25,000,000 was kept, without knowing the combination of the lock and without a tool of any kind, in five minutes. 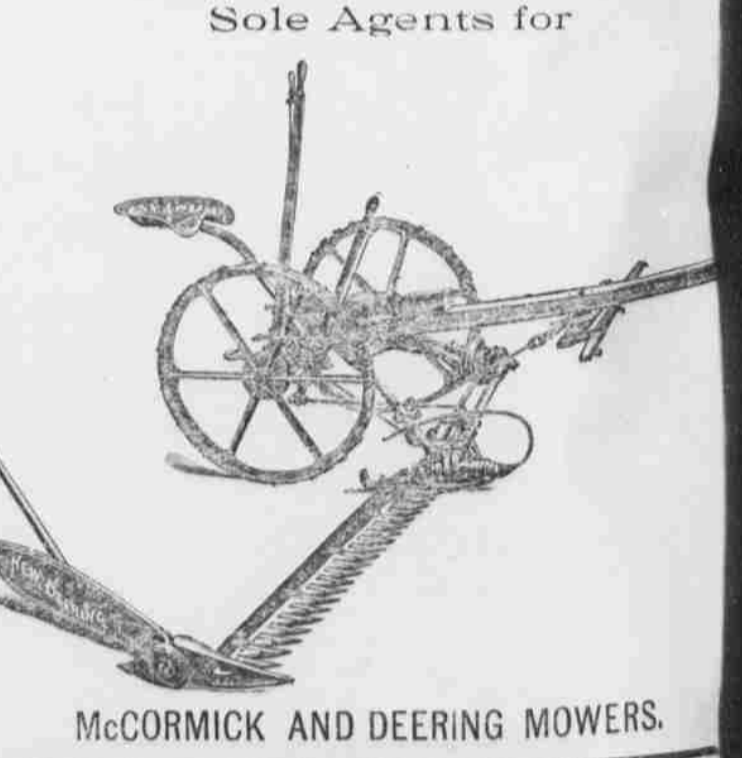
