BERRY FRAUDS.—A grocer calls our attention to frauds in strawberry boxes, that have the bottom shoved up and only weigh twelve to fourteen ounces box and all. The boxes are made of heavy green material and so the consumer is defrauded all around. It is probable that not a quart of berries is ever sold for a quart in this way. Berries should be sold "heaping measure," and in this matter grocers are not to blame. The berry grower who would arrange to give the public full measure of only the best fruit and would ripen, would for a time have a monopoly of the market. More fruit would be consumed, better prices would be paid and greater satisfaction would result all around. As it is, all hands are cheated at any price almost, and the grocer gets criticised where he is innocent.

NOT LIGHT BREAD.—The JOURNAL was shown some samples of alleged prison bread to-day that was not exactly angel's food. It was of that delicious brown only attained by a kind of rural wedding cake of the soda variety. It was not what anyone would use as dessert at a lacarant banquet to the Prince of Wales. NOT TO BE REMOVED.

Willamette University Remains in Salem for all Time to Come.

The impression is gaining ground daily that there is now no longer any possibility of removal to Portland.

The reasons for this are many and apparent. The conference selects trustees from Oregon, Columbia river and Idaho. This conference meets in Salem. The north enterprise has practically been abandoned. By the resignation of some of the professors and President Van Scoy, who were the prime movers for re-location, that has been dropped.

A capital of \$200,000 is involved at least in the University at Salem—this property would bring at sale at any time. The University is on a solid financial basis, and if Methodist influences were withdrawn, other churches would amply support it. The demand is for twice its present capacity. There is not an inch of room not now used. With greater capital it could double the business. It is self-supporting. Assets this year are in excess of liabilities.

The trustees are as much in control of this property as the directors of any bank or other corporation, yet even a majority of trustees would find themselves involved in expensive litigation if they undertook to dispose of the property here and close up the University at Salem. The disposition at both ends of the line—Salem and Portland—is to let the matter rest at present. It is probable nothing more will be heard of it.
