SILVERTON MOTOR LINE.

Prominent Salemites Propose to Push This Suburban Connection.

At 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon Bankers A. Bush and Mayor Williams, Hon. Joe Baker, and O. G. Savage, and other gentlemen met in the parlors of the Ladd & Bush bank to revive the Salem and Silverton motor line project and devise plans to push it. It was decided to open correspondence with leading railroad construction companies, inviting their attention to the fine opportunity for a profitable enterprise and that liberal inducement awaited any one competent to undertake building the line. The meeting adjourned to 2 o'clock today, when the agitation of the subject will be resumed.

The gentlemen taking up this matter are in earnest and could make no greater strike in behalf of this city, real estate, business and state fair interests. They should not be discouraged by the prompt revival of the state line project of the S. P., that would not take the place of the Silverton motor if it was built, and which is periodically revived to head off all efforts made by Salem to get an outside connection. At a well-attended meeting at the parlors of the Bush bank this afternoon, it was decided to appoint a committee of one to correspond with railroad builders and ascertain upon what terms a railroad can be built to Silverton. W. F. Boothby was appointed.
