KILLED BY LIGHTNING.
LONG BRANCH, N. J., June 13.—An electric storm which swept over this section of the state, yesterday afternoon, caused loss of life and destruction of considerable property. At Hammon, Daniel Gross and his two children were instantly killed by a bolt of lightning. The damage done at Ashbury Park, amounts to \$20,000.

THE GRAZING LEASE.
WASHINGTON, June 13.—Acting Secretary Chandler has approved the grazing leases on the Crow Indian reservation in Montana, amounting to 846,000 acres. The successful bidders to whom leases were made are Samuel H. Hardin, Bingham, Wyoming; Columbia Land and Cattle Co., by M. Raeburn, Chicago; Fortus B. War, Chicago; Thos. Patton, New York; and Matthew H. Murphy, of Miles City, Mont.

HANGED BY A MOB.
BRISTOL, Tenn., June 13.—Bob Clark, a mulatto under arrest for ravishing Mrs. John Warren, was taken from jail this morning by a mob and hanged.

J. H. TURNER DEAD.
PENDLETON, June 13.—J. H. Turner, an old pioneer and well known lawyer, died at his residence in this city yesterday morning at 4 o'clock, after an illness of several weeks. He made a will Thursday, disposing of his property. He was unconscious at the time of his death. The funeral took place this morning.

IN PLACE OF SIR JOHN.
OTTAWA, June 13.—J. C. Abbott has been called upon to form a ministry and has undertaken the task. It was in conformity with the late premier's desires that Abbott will undertake the formation of a cabinet.

LA GRIPE IN CHINA.
CHICAGO, June 13.—W. A. Thompson, an American in the Chinese custom service at Whampoa, China, is now in this city. He says gripe swept over the Chinese empire in February last and many thousands of natives died of the disease. During one week in Canton fully 10,000 people were buried.

THE TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION.
BOSTON, June 13.—Hon. Edward Atkinson addressed the convention yesterday afternoon, and in the course of his remarks said:

"No laws or actions should in any way restrict the liberty of the individual learning any trade, or disposing of his time. As a student who works fourteen hours a day, I view with distrust the disposition of large bodies of workmen to rely more and more upon state and summary legislation, instead of their own individual exertions. This, I come to warn you about."

John R. O'Donnell, of New York, moved a vote of thanks to Atkinson, and at the same time subjected that gentleman to a cross-examination. Atkinson reaffirmed his opinion that no man should be deprived of the liberty to work as long as he pleased and at whatever wages he pleased, without regard to organization. Shouts of "rats," and hisses came from all over the hall, and not more than half the delegates arose in a vote of thanks.

FATAL DYNAMITE.
RICHMOND, Va., June 13.—By premature explosion of a dynamite blast on Roanoke Southern railroad between Rock Mount and Roanoke two men were instantly killed and two fatally injured.

VALUE OF BRANDSTUFFS EXPORTED.
WASHINGTON, June 13.—The bureau of statistics reports the total value of exports of domestic brandstuffs from United States during last May was \$12,330,000.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE IS ANGRY.
LONDON, June 13.—It is currently reported that Lord Coleridge, lord chief justice of England, who presided at the recent basarist trial will take official notice of the charge made against him by Sir William, the submission of which is that a verdict by the jury would have been entirely different had it not been for partiality for defendants, which the lord chief justice showed in his summing up and charge to the jury.

UNITED STATES INSULTED.

Oleomargarine Dealers Arrested, Maxwell Rejected, Welsh Tin Works Shut Down, The Etata on Her Way North, Foreign and State News, Etc.

WILL APOLOGISE FOR WALES.
LONDON, June 13.—It is stated that the secretary of state for war will apologize Monday next in the commons on behalf of the Prince of Wales for the course the latter took in condoning the conduct of Cumming at Trauby Croft, last September in the famous Baccarat case.

FATHER CURES.
PITTSBURG, Pa., June 13.—The truly remarkable cures of all ailments the flesh is heir to effected by the Rev. Father Mollinger, at the shrine of St. Anthony on Troy hill, Allegheny, is attracting attention throughout the country. Over 1000 invalids from various parts of the United States have arrived in this city since Monday, and they are coming by every train. Several of the number, whose ailments were apparently beyond all human power to relieve, have already been restored to health or greatly relieved. Yesterday Father Mollinger was obliged to remove from the sacristy of the little church to the more commodious school adjoining. At one time over 2000 patients were waiting their turn to receive the venerable father's blessing and whatever remedies he should apply. Today is St. Anthony's day, and preparations are in progress for the accommodation of the thousands who will be presented that day, on which the priest's power to heal is said to be extraordinarily great, because Anthony is the saint from whom he derives his power. Yesterday two blind boys, born blind, aged 13 and 14 years, led by the mother and sister, sons of Mr. Culbertson, a wealthy farmer near Halifax, N. S., arrived from the Norton blind asylum at Halifax. Last evening a large number of people, residents of Nashville, Tenn., arrived accompanied by friends and hastened to Troy hill. The scenes in and about the church are remarkable, and at least some of the cures effected are little short of miraculous. It was discovered today that Adolph Hepp, Father Mollinger's amanuensis and interpreter, together with his brothers, Frank and John, and Jacob Hook, have for several days been extorting fees from the afflicted, representing that they had great influence with the priest. One of the Hepp brothers said that by this plan they secured several hundred dollars a week. Father Mollinger makes no charge whatever for his services. His attention has been directed to the scandal caused by actions of these young men, and it will be stopped and the participants made to suffer. It is stated that Father Mollinger has been summoned to Rome by the pope. He leaves on Monday next. The purpose of the special call is not known, but the knowledge of his going has created consternation among his patients.

INSULT TO UNITED STATES.
WASHINGTON, June 13.—The government is considering the question of cutting all diplomatic relations with Hayti. The letter written by Minister Firmin to the special commissioners of the United States in reply to the request of a lease of the mole of St. Nicholas was so unfriendly in tone that serious offense has been taken in Washington. During the uprising two years ago Hippolyte sent a commissioner to this country, who virtually pledged to the United States to lease a coal-gas station and certain commercial privileges in the event of the United States lending her moral support to Hippolyte. This the United States did, and it proved the turning point in the uprising in the black republic, for shortly afterwards the legation was despoiled. Recently a commission was sent to Port-au-Prince to secure a fulfillment of the pledges. Instead, they received a very irritating reply in which Hippolyte absolutely declined to enter into any negotiations for the lease of the mole, and objecting to the continued presence in Port-au-Prince of the United States men-of-war. The letter completely ignored any obligation toward the United States. Minister Douglas will soon be in this country, again on leave of absence, and all diplomatic inter-

course will have ceased. It will then be with Hayti to make such apologies as may be required.

OLEOMARGARINE.
ST. LOUIS, June 13.—The United States grand jury have returned indictments against sixty-nine retail dealers in oleomargarine for violation of the act requiring oleo to be sold in stamped packages.

MAXWELL REJECTED.
CHICAGO, June 13.—The world's fair directory last evening took action on two of the most talked-of nominations made by Director-General Davis. The vote on the confirmation of M. E. Stone, of Chicago, as chief of the department of foreign affairs, resulted in a tie, and further consideration of this was postponed until the next meeting. Mr. Stone, however, hearing that a fight had been made on his confirmation, promptly withdrew his name. The committee appointed to make an investigation of the accusations against W. S. Maxwell, who was nominated for chief of the bureau of horticulture, reported there was no proof to sustain the charges against his character. When the nomination was put to a vote, however, Maxwell was defeated, 25 to 8. Director-General Davis thereupon substituted the name of General N. P. Chipman, of California. He was at once confirmed by the directory. The board of control must now pass upon Chipman and there is some talk that feeling over the defeat of Maxwell may lead to Chipman's rejection by the board. The directory unanimously confirmed the nomination of Skiff, as chief of the mining bureau.

THE ETATA.
NEW YORK, June 13.—A special cablegram from Iquique, Chili, says: "Recently Captain Mouzum, commanding the Etata, applied to Rear-Admiral McCann for protection for his ship against the torpedo cruisers Almirante Condell and Almirante Lynch, which had appeared off this harbor a few days ago. The Etata's machinery was being overhauled preparatory to her departure for San Diego, Cal., and therefore, she was absolutely helpless against attacks. Besides, although she is practically in possession of the United States, the forces of Balmaceda's cruisers may not be aware of that fact or might ignore it. Recognizing this possibility, Admiral McCann ordered the captains of the Baltimore, Charleston and San Francisco to give the Etata all necessary protection. Accordingly, each vessel supplied a picket steam launch, commanded as follows: The Charleston's by Lieutenant Edward F. Onabrough, the Baltimore's by Lieutenant Herbert Dunn and the San Francisco's by Lieutenant Lervy M. Garrett. Each launch is manned by a fully armed crew, and they take four hour watches at night on picket duty watching the Etata, ready to warn any of the Chilean cruisers of the Balmaceda party that may think the Etata fair game for guns or torpedoes. The search lights of the three vessels are also said to help the picket launches to keep a sharp lookout for an enemy. Should such an attack be made at night and any of our sailors or officers be killed or wounded, the relations of the United States with the combatants in the Chilean civil war would become very much complicated."

The Etata will be sent north in charge Lieutenant-Commander C. C. Todd, the Charleston's executive officer, assisted by Lieutenant James H. Glennon and Assistant Engineer Ira N. Hill. The repairs to the Etata's machinery are practically completed and she will start for San Diego today.

HE WAS IN A REPUBLIC.
NEW YORK, June 13.—Among the arrivals by the Ward line steamship Cienfuegos, yesterday morning were Sir Ambrose Shea, governor of the Bahamas, Lady Shea and their daughter. When the baggage of the distinguished passengers was placed upon the dock, the customs inspectors proceeded to examine it, just as they would the baggage of any ordinary passenger. The governor protested against the examination, saying that he was a subject of the queen, occupied a high position in the British government, and that his baggage ought to be passed without examination. His baggage was examined just the same. He comes on a pleasure trip.
