THE CORA BOONE CASE.

Results of the Coroner's Inquest and Medical Autopsy.

The coroner's jury and examining physicians only were admitted to the autopsy held Wednesday afternoon, as the JOURNAL went to press. The jury was composed of J. W. Crawford, H. S. Belle, A. E. Parker, Geo. B. Gray, J. H. Ross, and J. I. Thompson. The physicians examined the remains and submitted the following as the results of their work.

THEIR REPORT.  
"We, medical practitioners of Salem, Or., summoned to make a post-mortem examination and testify as the causes which led to the death of Cora Boone, do hereby state that we find that the deceased had extensive fatty degeneration of the liver, accompanied with congestion of the mucous membrane of the upper half of the stomach, the organic disease of the liver being the prime cause of death, by its interference with the general circulation, especially as it relates to the base of the brain—the capillary fulness of the brain vessels at the base of the brain, by pressure, or capillary enlargement, pressing on the origin of the pneumogastric nerves, has produced paralysis of said nerves, and consequent cessation of the heart's action."

THE JURY VERDICT.  
"We, the undersigned, the jury summoned to appear before J. S. Stott, the coroner of the county of Marion, on the 8th day of July 1891, to inquire into the cause of the death of Cora Boone, having been duly sworn according to law, and having made such inquiries, after inspecting the body, and hearing the testimony adduced, find that the deceased was named Cora Boone, and that she was a resident of Oregon; was about sixteen years old; that she came to her death on the 7th day of July, 1891, from natural causes."  
The funeral took place at 5:30, and the pall was borne by some young gentlemen friends of the deceased. The room and pall were covered with floral tributes. Rev. Brown conducted an impressive ceremony and the remains were then taken to the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

STREET CAR MATTERS.

Liable to Become Redhot in Salem Before Many Days.

In accordance with the resolution adopted by the city council, Street Commissioner Crossan has served notice on the two street car companies to comply and place their tracks the required distance from the center of the street. The electric company is quite willing to comply, because it is to their interest, but the horse-car company looks at it quite differently. It proposes to hold the center of the street as its charter calls for. To give up a block of its position would be to yield a right that might cost it its charter the entire length of its line on that street. A lively battle for street privileges is imminent.

THE NEW ELECTRIC LINE is in nowise connected with a proposed sugar refinery scheme. A Mr. Ewall at Portland and Idle wine & Walker own large tracts of land south of the city, and are agitating the refinery question. Attorney Carson says unless a favorable franchise can be obtained, the road will not be built.  
The application of this third street car project has been pending some months. The present was thought to be a favorable time to present it, while the two operating companies are involved in a controversy. Unless the new company means immediately to go at business, it is safe to say no blanket charter for an indefinite period will be granted.

IN BEHALF OF DOUGLASS.  
NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 9.—Ebaneezer D. Bassett, private secretary of Minister Douglass, denies the report that he accepted a bribe from President Hippolyte, of Hayti, or that he had anything to do with the Mole St. Nicholas negotiations. He denies all charges made against him by the Haytian refugees. He considers the Port au Prince massacre has been a cruel affair, but does not believe Hippolyte is insane.

FUNERAL OF HANNIBAL HAMLIN.  
BANGOR, Me., July 9.—The whole city was in mourning yesterday. The remains of ex-Vice-President Hamlin were removed from the residence to the Unitarian church, where they were viewed by a large number of people. The funeral services were held at 3:30, and were attended by many prominent men, including state officers.

FAILURE OF A GRAIN FIRM.  
MILWAUKEE, July 9.—The well-known Board of Trade firm of Mohr, Zinkeiser & Co. has failed. The liabilities are not known, but will probably be heavy; the assets amount to about \$50,000. Oscar Mohr, senior member of the firm, is also insolvent, but no figures are given. The firm was long on wheat.

WHAT YIELD IN RUSSIA.  
MOSCOW, July 9.—Official reports show spring wheat promises a good harvest, which will compensate for the deficient yield of winter wheat.

ACCIDENT IN A COLLIERY.  
LONDON, July 9.—The staging in a shaft at the colliery at Rotherham, Yorkshire, collapsed today killing four workmen and seriously injuring four others.

CONVENT DESTROYED.  
ST. ALAIRE, QUEBEC, July 9.—The convent of La Providence, situated on the Bichelieu river, below Belorly, was burned yesterday.

KNIGHTS OF LABOR.  
PHILADELPHIA, July 9.—The general executive board of the Knights of Labor have decided upon Toledo as the meeting place for the next session of the general assembly, Tuesday, November 10.

NEGRO LYNCHED.  
VICKSBURG, Miss., July 9.—News was received here of the lynching on Palmyre plantation of a negro named Henry Gentry, he being hanged for the murder of a colored companion.

RACE FOR THE CHAMPIONSHIP.  
TORONTO, Ontario, July 9.—A double-scut race between O'Connor and Halan and Gaudanor and Mackay, has been arranged for August 9. It is not yet decided where the race will be rowed.

THE BLACK REPUBLIC.  
PORT AU PRINCE, Hayti, July 9.—A correspondent had an interview with Hippolyte's minister of state, M. A. Firmin. He declares the Haytian government will never allow a foreign government to be established at the mole of St. Nicholas, and denied that he ever promised to cede or sell the mole of St. Nicholas to the United States government.

He contends that the execution of Rigaud was fully justified, as Rigaud was a citizen of Hayti, and refuses to allow France any indemnity on this score. Affairs have become more tranquil. The Haytian government has a friendly feeling toward the United States government and resents the proposed interference by European powers in the internal troubles of Hayti.
