FRANCHISE WAR ENDED.

Peace Reigns on State Street and Traffic by Rail to be Resumed.

At 9 a. m. Attorney J. J. Shaw, of the Electric Co., notified General Manager Barnes that an adjustment with the Salem Street Railway Co. had been reached, and that work could proceed. The large force of men kept on the grounds in idleness waiting, was immediately set to work, and the public rejoiced that the ugly middle is solved. The Electric has lost \$5.00 a day in fares for each block it has not been able to operate, and continued litigation meant hundreds of dollars costs to each company.

All suits in the recorder's and justice's courts are now dismissed. Following is the

RAILROAD SETTLEMENT.
The Electric company agree to put down the horse car track 23 feet north of center of street, where the council ordered it, the horse car line to furnish all iron as needed to put down the track, each company to pay its own costs in courts; the tracks to be put in at once, and at grade as required by the city, about four inches below present level of street.

THE CORRESPONDENCE.
The JOURNAL has secured the official correspondence between the Salem Street Railway company, and the city authorities:

MR. JOSEPH BAKER, Sec. of S. S. Railway Co.
SIR: By order of the common council of the city of Salem I hereby notify your company through you to have your R. R. track on State street between the center of the intersection of Liberty and Commercial with State street, removed and placed in the established grade in such a manner that the south rail will be two and one-half feet north of the center of State street. In case you do not have this done within three days I will have it done at your expense. Respectfully,

DEAR SIR: Referring to your communication of the 8th inst., relative to the removal of the Salem Street Railway track on State street between Commercial and Liberty, from its present location in the center of the street, to the north side of said street, I have to say that Sec. 2 of an ordinance embodying the franchise of said Salem Street Railway company, passed by the common council of the city of Salem Oct. 5th, 1888, and approved by the mayor Oct. 5th, 1888, provides that, "said railway 's' shall be laid as near as possible in the center of the street, and flush with the surface thereof." And Sec. 10 that "the failure on the part of said company or assigns, to comply with any or all of the provisions of this ordinance, shall at the option of the common council, work a forfeiture of all the rights and privileges herein granted." Hence, in order to preserve the integrity of its franchise, this company is constrained to refuse to remove its track, or suffer it to be removed from the center of the street.

Your attention is also respectfully directed to Sec. 3 of the aforementioned ordinance, which declares that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to obstruct the railway herein provided for, or any car thereon during the construction and operation of the same, and any person found guilty before the recorder, of violating any of the provisions of this section, shall be punished by a fine of not more than twenty-five dollars.

Your threat to remove said track is in direct violation of the city ordinance quoted above, and such unlawful action on your part will be at your peril.

DEAR SIR: I have the honor to enclose herewith copies of a communication received from R. A. Crossan, street commissioner, and my answer thereto; and in view of the explicit provision made by law for the location of the track of this company on State street, to wit: As near as possible in the middle of the street and flush with the surface thereof, I appeal to you as the executive of the city and the conservator of the laws to interpose your authority to prevent this threatened flagrant violation of a city ordinance, by a subordinate officer acting upon an inadequate and in conflict with an existing ordinance.

Should the common council decide to further amend our franchise, this company will doubtless cheerfully acquiesce in any desired change not deemed derogatory to its interests, and makes such concessions as it may deem politic.

Tin Mining in England by the Romans.

As soon as the Romans made a conquest of Britain they formed in the tin province camps and roads (still visible), and left behind them vases, urns, sepulchers, and money that exhibit daily proofs of their having been a stationary people in these parts, and that Dannonium extended even to the Poldrian promontory or the Land's End, limited by the western parts of Somersetshire. The Romans, as is well known, occupied Britain from B. C. 55 to A. D. 409, or 464 years, during which period the Cornish tin mines were largely worked by the ancient Britons, possibly for their own advantage, but more probably as serfs, and in A. D. 409 the Romans had to give way to the Saxons.

Worth Its Weight in Gold.

In China there is a root called Khuk-ki-yeh, which often sells for from twenty to one hundred times its weight in gold. In Nanchuria the same root, under a different name, if anything more unpronounceable, sells equally as high. These roots, which in order to be highly valuable must be of a peculiar shape, are bought only by mandarins, priests and others of the wealthiest classes. Single roots of this plant not weighing more than the tenth of an ounce are said to often sell for from fifty to seventy-five dollars each. What is still more remarkable about this valuable eastern root is the fact that it is a closely allied species, if not identical, with our common ginseng.—St. Louis Republic.

The Angry Tree.

The "angry tree," a woody plant which grows from ten to twenty-five feet high, and which was formerly supposed to exist only in one state in the Union, Nevada, has been found both in Eastern California and in Arizona. If disturbed, this peculiar tree shows every sign of vexation, even to ruffling up its leaves like the hair on an angry cat, and giving forth an unpleasant, sickening odor.—St. Louis Republic.
