

REPUBLICAN EXECUTIVE COMMPT-TER .--- M. N. QUAY RESIGNS AS A MEMBER.

WASHINGTON .--- July 30. - The mational republican executive committee met here yesterday afternoon. Of thirteen members, but seven were present. Chairman, M. S. Quay, of Pennsylvania; vice chairman, J. S. Clarkson, of Iowa: secretary, J. S. Fassett, of New York; treasurer, W. W. Dudley, of Indiana; Samuel Fessenden, of Connecticut, Garrett A. Hobart, of New Jersey, and J. M. Haynes, of Maine.
