STATE.

ASHLAND, Ore., July 30.—Engineer Jack Roseford, of the southern-bound express, met his death in tunnel fourteen in the Siskiyou, sixteen miles south of Ashland, yesterday. Two engines were required to take a train over the Siskiyou, and Roseford had the front one. When the train was nearly through the tunnel the coupling between the mail car and express car broke, and the train stopped. Fifteen or twenty minutes were consumed in trying to make a new coupling, and the smoke and gas from the second engine blew directly into the cab of the one ahead, suffocating the engineer and fireman. It was decided to back out of the tunnel, and when the train stopped outside, the engineer and fireman of the front engine were found to be missing.
