"Here it is," he said. "My con-science will not allow me to keep it. I was drunk when I robbed that till. For heaven's sake do not disclose my crime. I have a lovely wife and children. My folks would die if they heard of it."

Mrs. Caroline Reeling of near Woodburn, who lost her husband about a year ago and buried him in her own backyard was today tried for insanity and committed. For some time Mrs. Reeling has refused everybody who came to talk busi-ness to Mr. Reeling in the backyard. She has a family of 8 children, a farm of 200 acres, and is of a religious turn, trusting as she says entirely in the Lord to pay her taxes and run things generally. She has been in the habit of mowing her hay with a scythe and only cutting what was needed. It took Deputy Wain, Marshal Besch of Woodburn, and Liverman Cooley an hour to capture her. She was landed in the asylum at 1 p. m.

A PRACAS.
When the officers arrived at the Reeling homestead the woman went wild. Her children joined in the melee like young tigers, striking out right and left. The officers had to retreat once but got reinforcements, tho' the children and dog fought to the last. It was a trying scene, as the oldest child is only 15 and they clung to their mother like leeches. She had to be put in irons. The estate has never been administered on and the woman is rational on some subjects.

ANOTHER FINE CHURCH.

The Finely Decorated Interior of the First M. E. Church.

It will hardly be ready to be thrown open by Sunday, but when it is open the attendants will hardly recognize their old house of worship.

The badly stained and dirty walls that sent a chill down your back have entirely disappeared; pleasant colors and a cheerful impression predominate. About \$1000 will have been spent on frescoing, glaz-ing and cleaning up when the work is finished as it will be before an-other week rolls around. The brush-work was completed Thursday and today the staging is being removed. The finishing touch goes on the walls Saturday.

THE ENSEMBLE.
As you enter the front of the church the entrance, halls and stairways are done up in solid color work of light terra cotta, to which the light from the rose windows gives quite a rosy cast. The folding doors reveal an interior where drawings are in excellent harmony with the inter-secting gothic architecture of the auditorium, the side walls of which are finished in shades of rose with a deep decoration of blue and gold over the wainscoting. The top of the walls is trimmed in a deep bor-der—a stile in stucco painting be-tween the sides and ceiling pan's, consisting of a central figure with heads and decorations growing out of a seashell. The ceiling panels show a blue-sky effect with light cloud work as of incense rising be-tween. Immense moldings ending in three beads are done in harmonious shades of terra cotta with gold decora-tions radiating from the caps. The chancel has a dove descending from the clouds. The soft grays over the big gothic windows give the ceiling work a very rich and dis-tinguished aspect. The lively warm colors are clean and bright and yet the whole general effect is cool and churchy, and in excellent taste. The brush work and designing was done by artists: Kreiss, Willmann, and Wilson. Ed. Hutchins was the staging builder.

Properties of Stones.

A DUAL LIFE.
