#### RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

BELLAIR, Ohio, Aug. 1.—This morning a passenger train on the Belleisle, Zanesville and Cincinnati narrow gauge railroad left the track three miles south of Belleisle, two cars being overturned and dragged some distance. Seventy passengers were on the train and the two cars turned over were crowded. When all were finally taken out the wrecked cars, it was found that fourteen people had been injured, four seriously and one fatally. The train was running forty-five miles an hour, and as it reached a curve, the cars were noticed to sway violently, and unheeding the cries for passengers to keep their seats, a rush was made for the doors. Many frightened passengers had reached the platform when the cars jumped the rails, and when they turned over in another moment these were hurled into the ditch.

#### STRANGE CASE.

BRETON HARBOR, Mich., Aug. 1.—St. Joseph is in a state of excitement over the mysterious disappearance of Nellie Ledger and Grace Beiden, aged 14 and 17 years. The girls went boat riding with two young men of Chicago, Louis Berg and Thomas Maxfield, and have not returned home. The young men say they left the girls on the boat's deck at 11:30 p. m. It is feared that the girls were kidnapped or foully dealt with. Berg and Maxfield were arrested yesterday and held under bonds for examination on next Tuesday. They declare they are innocent. The girls' parents are crazed with grief.

#### NOVEL SCHEME.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—W. R. Vaughn, ex-mayor of Council Bluffs, Ia., is at the Astor house. He has come here to launch a new political scheme to the effect that the government shall pay \$400,000,000 to the ex-slave to compensate them for their years of labor while in bondage. In short sharp sentences he gave the following explanation of his new proposition:

"I have come to New York to make the next gubernatorial candidates pledge themselves, if elected, to support the passage of my bill through congress. If a candidate refuses to do so I will array the entire negro vote against him. It makes no difference whether he is running on the democratic or republican ticket, I intend to know him under. Should both refuse, they will in future be marked men against whom the negro will invariably throw his ballot. The same policy will be followed out in every state in the union, and should I fail in finding support in either of the two great parties, 1892 will see a new party in the field, with a single and solid plank of slave indemnity for its platform."

#### MOLE ST. NICHOLAS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—President Hippolyte has resolved upon a method of defending his position in the dispute with Secretary Blaine and the government, concerning the establishment of a coaling station for Uncle Sam's fleet at Mole St. Nicholas. He has authorized the publication of the correspondence between Hay and Secretary Blaine, Minister Douglass and Admiral Gherardi upon this subject. This correspondence is now in press in this city, and is to be issued in pamphlet form within a week's time and distributed broadcast here and in Europe. The pamphlet, it is reported, had been prepared under the supervision of the Haytian consul in this city and Hippolyte's adherents in town have raised a purse to defray the expense of its dissemination. The pamphlet makes an elaborate defense of Hippolyte and represents him as a much maligned ruler. It will assert that he cannot be justly charged with the breach of faith with the United States government, and that whatever promises were made concerning Hay's willingness to grant the United States a coaling station were made by Legitime, who was a user and not chosen representative of the Haytian republic. The pamphlet will urge that the Mole St. Nicholas is the Gibraltar of Hayti, and that to cede any rights to it to a foreign power would be to put the country under the protectorate of the power securing such rights, and that Hayti had never made such concessions to any foreign government and never will. The document will score Mr. Blaine, and will try to show that Hippolyte is a big-hearted and patriotic ruler. Hippolyte's adherents are confident that the pamphlet will make a big sensation here and a still larger one abroad, where Haytiens say they know something about diplomacy and international courtesy.

#### CROP REPORT.

PORTLAND, Aug. 1.—The Oregon bulletin issued today by the crop weather bureau says: "Wheat harvest is in progress in every section of the state. Wheat is yielding from twenty to forty bushels per acre. The berry is large and plump. The surplus wheat in Oregon and Washington will be from 17,000,000 to 20,000,000 bushels."

#### RECIPROcity WITH SAN DOMINGO.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—The president today issued a proclamation announcing reciprocity with San Domingo, under the act of last October which with a view to securing reciprocal trade exempted from duty on sugar, molasses, coffee and hides, imported into the United States. By this treaty the following articles manufactured in the United States will be admitted free of duty on San Domingo republic after September 1st, 1891: Live animals, meats of all kinds, excepting smoked, the various kinds of cereals and their flour, hay, plants and seeds, cotton seed oil and cake, coal, turpentine etc., mining, manufacturing and agricultural machinery, railway material and hardware of various sorts, zinc, lead and tin, and copper in various forms, building material, ink etc., gold and silver coin and bullion.

#### ENGLAND VS. AMERICA.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 1.—An arrangement for bringing over the team of amateurs, to be captained by Lord Hawke, were concluded today by cable, and the team will sail in the City of New York September 16, and will come to this city as the guests of the Germantown club. The first match against All Philadelphia will be played Friday, Saturday and Monday, September 25, 26 and 27, and the second, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 30, October 1 and 2. The local team of the first match will be chosen by the international match committee, at the request of the Germantown club. Whether the second match shall be played against All Philadelphia has not yet been decided.

#### THE G. A. R. REUNION.

DETROIT, Aug. 1.—This city is already elaborately decorated for the 25th reunion of the G. A. R. The registration committee have received notices from over 300 regimental organizations representing forty-five of the states and territories and over 30,000 individuals to be assigned accommodations. It is expected by Monday morning that over 40,000 veterans will have been provided for while fully half as many more will be guests of citizens.

#### TENNY AND LONGSTREET.

MORRIS PARK, Aug. 1.—The surging, jostling, pushing thousands assembled here today to see the battle for \$12,000 and championship of the turf, for Tenny and Longstreet, admitted to be best horses in training in America. A more perfect day could not have been made. The track was perfect. As the day wore on the betting was spirited with a slight odds toward Tenny. The other events on the program which would have been interesting on any day, paled into insignificance and but one thought seemed to possess the 25,000 human beings present, frequent and anxious were the inquiries both as to the condition of the flyers and each inquiry was met by the assurance they were fit to run for life. Inquiries extended to the jockeys and Hamilton who will ride Longstreet and Barnes, who will mount Tenny were pronounced in a condition in keeping with the animals. Each jockey rode at 125 pounds. Longstreet won by 12 lengths, time 2:27.

#### LOCKED OUT.

OMAHA, Aug. 1.—The eight-hour law passed by last legislature went into effect today. Employing job printers of this city refused to comply with it this morning and locked out all of their employees.

#### TRANSFERRED.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Maj. Jas. P. Canby, paymaster, is relieved from duty as chief paymaster department of the Columbia, and will proceed to Los Angeles and report to the commanding general of the department from Arizona for duty as chief paymaster of that department.

#### TWINE DECISION.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—The treasury department has acquiesced in the decision of the circuit court for the northern district of California in the suits of Lewson, against ex-Collector Sullivan. The decision is to the effect that as soon as the ruling twice are dutiable at the rate of 25 per cent. ad valorem.

### STATE.

#### COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED.

ASHLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—Two men named Fay Cook and Henry Nutt, are in custody of the United States marshal here, on a charge of manufacturing and passing counterfeit \$5 gold pieces, several of which were taken in over counters yesterday. Nutt was captured in town yesterday morning, and eleven of the counterfeit pieces were found upon him. Sheriff Birdsey overtook Cook at Hornbrook and brought him back on the train last evening. Another of the gang is in custody at Grant's Pass and will be brought here today when all will have a hearing before United States Commissioner Hammond.

#### PORTLAND FLOURING MILL SUIT.

PORTLAND, Aug. 1.—A suit involving over a million dollars was begun today in the circuit court by J. Klemm et al against the Portland Flouring mill Co. and W. S. Ladd, et al. Plaintiffs allege they were stockholders in the original corporation of Portland Flouring mill Co., which in 1783 became financially involved to W. S. Ladd. The company passed a resolution that W. S. Ladd, President and James Steel secretary, to secure a purchaser for the property on which the mill stood as well as mill. They allege Ladd and Steel never made any effort to secure a purchaser but conveyed the property to a nephew of Ladd without any consideration and that Neal was simply Ladd's agent afterwards it is claimed W. S. Ladd, W. M. Ladd and C. A. Neal incorporated a new company selling it the Portland Flouring mill Co., and had the property conveyed to them by Neal. Plaintiff's claim the entire transaction was fraudulent they ask the sale be set aside and that they may recover the profits made by new corporation.
