### BIG LAND PURCHASE.

#### Bradstreet's State of Midsummer Trade.

#### A HACKMAN WINS AN HEIRESS.

#### Heavy Rain, Decided Sensation, Big Fire in Chicago, Terrible Massacre, Murdered by Italians, Foreign News, Etc.

**BIG LAND PURCHASE.**  
TACOMA, Aug. 3.—That the lumbermen of the Mississippi valley are well pleased with the future prospects of the Pacific coast, is indicated by a transaction of more than ordinary magnitude, recently closed by them whereby they have come into possession of about a million acres of land in Oregon. The land was granted by the state to the Oregon Central Military Land Company for the construction of a military road from Eugene to the Eastern boundary of Oregon. The grant is about six miles wide and 500 miles in length, covering about 300,000 acres of timber 400,000 acres of farm land, and the rest grazing land. Although the matter has been under consideration for a year, it was but recently closed. The parties purchasing are F. Weyhauser, of Rock Island; the Meyers, of Muscatine; Young & Co. of Clinton Ia.; Laird Norton & Co., of Winona; E. Rutledge, of Chippewa Falls, Wis., and two or three others. While the consideration is not made public, it is known to be a very large sum. The parties are here now and will be joined by other lumbermen. They will remain around the Sound for a week and take in Portland before their return.

**RESISTED ARREST.**  
MONTEREY, Cal., Aug. 3.—This city was thrown into a state of intense excitement Saturday night about 9:30 o'clock, occasioned by City Marshal R. D. Young shooting and killing Barney B. Garner, who resisted arrest. Garner had been drinking in the afternoon. Frequent requests of the marshal for him to remain quiet were not heeded, and when Garner was told to consider himself under arrest he made a motion to draw a pistol. Marshal Young immediately drew his own and fired two shots, both bullets going through Garner's body killing him instantly. Young immediately gave himself up and went to the county jail. Garner was a saloon-keeper, and was quarrelsome when under the influence of liquor. He leaves a widow and three children. A pistol was found in Garner's pocket by the coroner. An inquest will be held today.

**A PRETTY WIFE THE CAUSE.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—A mysterious shooting case occurred early last night in the apartment house No. 230 West forty-second street. While Charles C. Goodwin was engaged in writing a letter in his room, Bertram W. Webster, an acquaintance, opened the door and stood upon the threshold with a revolver in his hand. Without uttering a word, he fired at Goodwin, who fell to the floor with a bullet in his abdomen. Webster coolly walked down stairs and told the janitor that Goodwin was sick, after which he disappeared. Goodwin was taken to the hospital and will probably die. He is a bachelor, aged 35. Webster is a married man 30 years of age. The police profess to believe that Mrs. Webster, who is young and pretty, is the cause of the shooting.

**PAN AMERICAN COMPANY.**

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—The officers and directors of the Pan American Transportation Co., an organization formed for the purpose of putting on a line of steamers between the southern ports of the United States and the principal ports of South America, Central America and West Indies are in session in this city today. The purpose of the meeting is to map out the work more completely and perfect arrangements for floating the additional securities to carry it on to the amount of a million of dollars. The original capital stock of \$10,000,000 has already been subscribed but the company has authority to increase to \$100,000,000. The projectors contemplate building at least twenty steel steamships under the provisions of the mail subsidy bill.

**LABOR TROUBLES.**

OMAHA, Aug. 3.—There has been no frost trouble at the Omaha and Grant smelter today. When the hour for day shift to go on duty about 400 men gathered at the gate. Nobody went to work except half a dozen men, who emptied the silver furnaces. Soon after this was done the smelter closed. A number of manufacturers clubbed together and will test the eight hour law in the courts.

**GAMBLING ROW.**

SEATTLE, Aug. 3.—John Donohue, a real estate operator at Alhambra, Mass., has assigned. Liabilities \$500,000 assets \$100,000.

**LANDMARK BURNED.**

PALMER, Mass., Aug. 3.—The Weeks House, an old landmark, was burned this morning. Rev. Williams, a retired Congregational minister, was burned to death. Other guests who had a narrow escape lost all their effects. Loss \$50,000.

**STEADILY IMPROVING.**

BAN HABER, Me., Aug. 3.—Secretary Blaine is steadily improving in health, though he is seldom seen in the village. He takes various drives about the island and indulges regularly in long walks.

Mr. Brumfield with his two half-grown sons fought with desperation, but were finally murdered, their throats being cut and their bodies being repeatedly stabbed. Mrs. Brumfield and her three children were next killed by the Italians, who then searched the house for money and set it on fire. Mr. Brumfield was an influential and wealthy man. Two years ago while county commissioner, he opposed the building of a new court house and thus made many enemies. The court house was built and it is thought Friday night's work was the result of an old feud and that Brumfield's enemies supplied the Italians with liquor and pointed out the path to his residence.

**TERRIBLE MASSACRE.**  
NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—A morning paper says the harrowing details of a terrible massacre of inefficient residents in an isolated village in Paraguay by the half savage natives has reached this city by mail. According to advices 150 men, women and children wantonly slaughtered and then the butchers celebrated their victory in wild orgies. The affair occurred on the night of March 10th and the news was delayed in reaching here by the lack of facilities for communicating. The attacking band was headed by a notorious bandit, Benito Benitez and numbered about 50 men.

**DECIDED SENSATION.**  
BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 3.—A sequel to the late remarkable newspaper attack on Secretary Blaine's health is a suit for \$50,000. The libel suit is instituted by Miss Marguerite Hamm, of Bar Harbor, against the Boston Herald. Miss Hamm in last Sunday's Herald was called an adventurer, prevaricator and consort with disreputable characters. The victim is a pretty girl of rather erratic habits and a lover of notoriety. She lives in Bar Harbor with her widowed mother. During the summer she helps out by acting as correspondent of various newspapers throughout the country. This year she represented both the New York Herald and the Mail and Express. The famous dispatch in the latter, declaring Mr. Blaine to be in the last stages of a fatal disease, was from her pen, as was also a long series of articles attacking Mr. Blaine's physical condition. When the exposure of Mr. Blaine's real condition came Miss Hamm was bitterly attacked by the victimized papers. Miss Hamm acknowledges that her statements were untrue and that Mr. Blaine had nearly recovered, but she makes the astounding assertion that she was instructed through the Mail and Express, by many prominent members of the republican national committee, to create the impression throughout the country that Blaine was in the last stages of disease.

"I was to keep him sick until September," said Miss Hamm, "I don't know why, but I simply obeyed orders."  
She claims that she has proof of this in her possession, which she says she will produce at the trial. This causes a sensation and it is hoped that the head of the alleged conspiracy will be unearthed.

**THE G. A. R.**

DETROIT, Aug. 3.—The veterans of the G. A. R. are arriving by thousands, every incoming train bringing another throng to mingle with the multitude already here. G. F. Veazie, of Vermont, commander in chief, arrived here this morning.

**STATE.**

**ASHLAND COUNTERFEITERS.**

ASHLAND, Or., Aug. 3.—Fay Coon and Henry Nutt, the two young men who had a preliminary hearing before United States States Commissioner Hammond on a charge of passing counterfeit coin, and E. R. Coon, a brother of Henry, who was arrested at Grant's Pass by sheriff Moss and brought to Ashland held in bonds of \$1000 each to appear before the United States grand jury at Portland. Alonzo Nutt, the father of Henry Nutt, was arrested at Grant's Pass and will be brought hither for a hearing today. No counterfeit coin was found in possession of Alonzo Nutt, but a cellar has recently been dug under his house in Grant's Pass, and it is presumed the members of the family were preparing for extensive operations in manufacturing counterfeit coin. All four of the men arrested will doubtless be sent to Portland to await the sitting of the grand jury, for none of them can furnish bail bonds. They young men have been accused each other of making the counterfeit, each one saying it was the other and not himself. The youngest of the party, who is about 18 years old, "proceeded" to the crowd, and stated that Fay Coon told him that he and others had made about \$500 worth of bogus coin at Woodburn, Or., a year or so ago, and had passed it upon the board. There are some old offenders connected with the crowd, and detectives have been wanting them for a long time.

**HEAVY RAIN.**

LOUISVILLE, Aug. 3.—The heavy rain in many years fell here last night causing damage estimated at \$30,000.

**HIGH FIRE IN CHICAGO.**

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—A fire involving losses estimated to be at least a million dollars broke out this morning in the large retail dry-goods and notion store of Siegel, Cooper and Co. About 25 employees were in the building at the time, but all escaped uninjured, except one cash boy, who was on the third floor. He started to come down the fire escape, but fell, receiving severe injuries. There were three watchmen in the building who have not yet been accounted for. The building was entirely gutted and the north wall fell in after the interior iron works were softened by heat. The firm carried a stock of \$500,000. Loss is believed to have been fully covered by insurance.

**MURDERED BY ITALIANS.**

CATLETTSBURG, Ky., Aug. 3.—Wayne county, W. Va., was the scene of a series of murders Friday night. Mr. Brumfield, his wife and five children were murdered in the most horrible manner, and their bodies consumed by fire. About midnight fifty common Italian railroad laborers became drunk and started on a tour of destruction. The Brumfields were thought to have considerable money. The Italians went to their residence and were refused admission. The doors and windows were then forced open.

**FOR SPECULATION.**

BARCELONA, Aug. 3.—Great excitement was caused in this city last night by what was for a time believed to be revolutionary movement of the republican party but which subsequently proved to be a desperate attempt upon the part of certain speculators on the bourse to bring about a decline in prices of securities. A band of 150 men armed with rifles and revolvers slyly approached the buildings and attempted to surprise the guards it being their intention to force their way into the barracks. For a short time a regular battle was fought and a number on both sides were wounded. In the meantime the officers stationed at the barracks summoned the troops to arms and in very short time the attacking party were surrounded and the whole party placed under arrest. They are to be tried by court martial and the chances are they all will be shot.
