THE SPECIFICATIONS.

Citizen's Plan That is Being Circulated for Signatures—"No Good."

The city engineer has completed the specifications for the property owner's plan of improving the streets and they are being circulated for signatures approving the same to be laid before the council.

The specifications are virtually as first proposed on the Boothby plan, concrete gutters and curbs, with a patch-work gravel street. The most objectionable feature of the specifications is that where the street is up to grade only two inches surface are to be removed and replaced with gravel. This will be no improvement of the streets whatever.

The JOURNAL has published specifications for building gravel streets properly. No other gravel street is worth sinking a dollar on or will be any improvement whatever on present conditions.

Salem wants her principal business streets dry, clean, free from mud, well drained and well appearing all the year around. She can only have such streets by having them established upon certain well-established principles. There are no scientific principles of street building involved in the Boothby plan. It is not a plan at all except to head off proper and permanent street improvement and the public may as well understand it.

A RUNAWAY HORSE.

Causes Men on a High Seafaring to Scamper for Their Lives.

At 11:30 this morning a Mr. Peterson's horse made a wild break for liberty while tied in front of Weber Bros. store. He dashed up Commercial, turned onto the walk and tore along in front of the real estate offices, and started to go in through under the high scaffolding of the Gray block, where a gang of men were working forty feet in the air. They rushed into the windows for dear life. The horse left the buggy here and was picked up more dead than alive.

THAT DITCH.—Seventy men and twelve teams are at work between Dayton and Aumville enlarging the Santiam water ditch. A NEW DYNAMO!

New Cars and Increased Motors to Meet Their Growing Business.

The Capital City Electric Railway Co. has signed contracts for an eighty-two horse-power dynamo, two twenty horse-power car motors, two new vestibule cars, and more trailers. The dynamo will be used to generate power to meet the demands of their increased traffic and extensions of lines. The present dynamo will be kept in position and run by water power to fall back upon in case of need. The present car-motors are fifteen horse-power, and not quite heavy enough when the cars are jammed as they are on special occasions. The new power will be ample for all the traffic for years to come. The investment of the company in additional plant will be \$8000. A new switch is being put in just north of the Garden Road. No opposition has developed to the proposed Ferry street extension of the electric line to the S. P. depot, and the franchise will probably be granted at the next meeting of the city council.
