A large double parlor has been furnished with fine appointments on the first floor, the carpets, heavy silk portieres and ceilings matching in a fine effect. About a thousand dollars have been expended in new furniture and renovations that make it a decidedly homelike hostelry, in which Landlord George and his wife take not a little pride. Mrs. Anderson retains the personal management of the cuisine and her skill is not disputed in this line, as is attested by an ever increasing flow of patronage.

STATE FAIR.—The stables at the state fair grounds near Salem, are filling up with horses in training for the fall races. The time intervening between this and the time when the state fair begins—Sept. 14th—will be improved by horsemen and all that is in their horses the different trainers will endeavor to bring out. There are now four stables of trotting horses there and five more are daily expected from Eugene. It is anticipated that there will be a fine array of horses and other live stock this season. It is hoped Yamhill will be well represented at the fair with live stock and other farm products.—Dayton Herald.

FIRST WHEAT.—The first wheat of the crop of 1891 was received and regularly taken in this morning at the Salem Flouring Mills. It was of the regulation Oregon grade, large white berry, and brought 76c, a bushel. The farmer who brought it was John Estes. The water is now coming in full head from the Santiam, and the milling interest in this city is now in a flourishing condition. Owing to larger berry and yield, wheat at 76c is a better crop in Oregon than at \$1.00 a bushel in the East.

RICH FOOD.—There has been a great improvement in handling fresh salmon at Salem. The finest Nestucca and Alsea Bay Chinook are now received, 1000 to 1500 lbs. daily, and kept on great blocks of ice in a three-ton refrigerator by Davison & White. This makes a fine showing of what can be done in Salem from small beginnings.

PLAYING CRAZY.—The prison authorities are troubled about a convict by name of Dewitt who is in their opinion either playing crazy or is really insane. He has terrible fits of profanity, which strangely enough is directed solely toward the officials, at sight of any of whom he seems to fall into a rage and the loud oaths roll out like a Niagara.

NEW POOR FARM.—The county court and commissioners are going to Turner, August 28 and 29, to look up a site for a 200 acre poor farm. The plan is to sell the present property near Salem and buy a larger tract and make the institution nearer self-supporting. Commissioner Watson, who lives at Turner is in favor of the project and the court feels quite friendly.

THAT OPTION.—The option of the Chicago syndicate on the Salem street railway expires August 15. They must then come to Salem and close their contract or forfeit securities put up. In the latter case the line will remain in the hands of the present owners who will make arrangements to improve and extend or electrify the road.

RESURRECT THE BOARD

What Business Men Declare Should Be Done to Protect Salem.

Real estate men naturally take the greatest interest in a board of trade. They have the greatest direct interest in its work of bringing families and investors to Salem. A leading real estate man says: "The criticism has been made that real estate dealers ran the last board. This is not true as a number of leading ones pulled out first, and nearly every real estate man in town is doing just as much work at advertising our city and showing attention to strangers as the board ever did. The Oregon Land Co. is doing more to advertise Oregon today than any board of trade ever did, and is spending hundreds of dollars getting up an exhibit of grains and grasses for the world's fair when all the rest of the state is not doing anything. Such companies do not need a board of trade half so much as the city needs their co-operation. The real estate men object to the board of trade being converted into a private real estate business. Salem has immense interests to protect which can only be protected through a properly organized and representative board of trade."

Says an eastern man who has moved his family here, put up a business house, and intends to stay: "Ever since I have been in Salem I have been waiting to attend a board of trade meeting. Call after call I have answered only to find not a soul there but the president and secretary. They finally thought I had some scheme to work and I stayed away. Your present organization does not impress me as of any practical value."

C. P. Bishop: I am in favor of keeping before the people of America the fact that there is such a town as Salem in Oregon, and that it is backed by the best country in the Willamette valley. If a board of trade is the best plan to accomplish it, that is what we want. What ever is best for our town should be pushed by its business men. We need manufacturers, and it requires co-operation to secure them.

T. H. Barnes: This board of trade should be composed of business men who have the true interests of our city at heart, and not be controlled by real estate men. A membership fee of \$25 with a monthly fee of \$1 should be established, and a fund raised in advance to work with. There is opportunity for valuable work, and it behooves every citizen to get in and push.

Postmaster Gilbert: No mail comes to the board of trade at present, nor to any amount since eastern advertising dropped off. I get inquiries addressed to the office personally about Salem, but none for the B. of T.

Sec. J. L. Mitchell: Our firm will heartily support a board of trade, while I am personally more than anxious to get out of the secretaryship. A meeting cannot be held until the first Tuesday in September.

AT THE COURT HOUSE.

STATE HOUSE NOTES.

News from the Big House Written by a Dour.

Chief legislative clerk Hayes and Attorney John H. Smith of Astoria were state house callers.

The state superintendent's office has total returns from all counties, showing 1747 organized districts in the state. Lane leads with 132, Clackamas 108, Linn 106, Marion 101. 132 new school houses were built last year.

The sentence of C. M. Harding of Portland was today commuted.

H. H. Wolfe, a carpenter from Bandon, and Sylvester Ligoriff, a fisherman from Astoria, are late commitments to the asylum for insane.

W. J. Pengra, G. W. Harrison and A. O. Eckleson incorporate the Springfield Improvement company.

SCHOOL FUND DISTRIBUTION.

Hon. Phil. Mettschan, state treasurer, has just finished the distribution of the interest arising from the common school fund, as made by the board of school land commissioners among the various counties of the state. The total number of persons in the state between the ages of four and twenty years is 105,622, and the total amount of funds subject to distribution was \$153,151.99, giving to each county the sum of \$1.45 per capita, the same ratio that it was in 1890, although the number of children is 6036 more, showing a healthy increase in the fund. The following statement shows the amount sent to each county, and the number of children therein:

AN ACROBATIC FAILURE.

He Dived Backward to Show Off Before His Fellow, but Does So No More.

One afternoon Lou Preston was in the middle of a story when we reached the swimming hole. He was always telling stories in the slow, drawing tone natural to him, and as the boys listened eagerly you may be sure they were interested. Boys are no flatterers in word or deed, and if they pay attention it is certain that your story is liked.

What he was telling that day was a little above me, as we say, and while the older boys delayed to hear the last of it I got ready, wet my head first "to prevent a rush of blood," according to tradition, and then jumped in.

As I was unnoticed I took the chance to learn to dive backward. This I did successfully several times, and when Lou's story was finished I had a new feat to execute for my own glory and the delectation of my friends.

"Look here, boys!" I cried. "Look here Charlie! look here! Aw! wait a minute and watch me." I got their attention at last, and braced myself for a triumphant exhibition of my great act.

I have described the swimming hole as a place at one side of the stream, worn deep by the current. Above and below and at the further side the water was shallow. The near side of this hole was perpendicular, and the hole was said to be twenty feet deep. This was just the place to dive.

That day, as the stream was high, its rippling surface overflowed the bank, the top of which formed a ledge several inches wide under water before the true rim of the hole was reached.

In my successful attempts to dive backward I had stood on this ledge, with my feet under water and my hands at the rim of the hole, and turned a back somersault. But now, having drawn all eyes to me, in my haste to act before their notice was distracted and in the flurry of a public performance, I set my heels at the margin of the overflowing water, my feet being on dry land, and forgot the ledge hidden by the water between me and the rim of the hole.

Over I went and down I came head first on the ledge. I heard my neck bones crunch under the weight of my body, and I dropped over sideways, limp and for a moment helpless, into the stream.

As I rose and the water gushed out of my ears, I heard from the bank a shout of wild laughter from the spectators of my great diving feat. The boys said afterward that had they known my neck was broken they could not have helped laughing. As they did not know it was not broken and had every reason to think it was, I believed them.

I had enough sense left to strike out feebly for the next shore. My neck was bent over to one side and I could not straighten it. I swam till my hands touched the gravel bottom, and dragging myself into three inches of water lay like a piece of driftwood on the beach.

My strength began to return after a little, and as the other boys kept up their laughter my recovery was hastened by indignation.

After that, when I dived, it was in the good, old fashioned way, face foremost.—St. Nicholas.
