SOME BRICK—Burton Bros., of State street brick yards, have just finished burning a new kiln of 40,000 of their superior brick, and although they have several heavy new contracts, including the two new school houses, they are still a million brick ahead of the demand. Just the same they keep a force of about thirty men close at work, and propose to keep up with the growth of the town if such a thing is possible.

AFTER RECRUITS.—A detail of United States recruiting sergeants arrived in the city last night from Oregon City, Commanded by Lieutenant Frederic A. Tripp, First Infantry. The members of the detail are: Sergeant Pearce, Sergeant Wooley and Private Rush, of the First regiment, United States Infantry, stationed at Angel Island, San Francisco harbor. The officers have been ordered here to establish a recruiting office, which will probably be upstairs in the Patton block.

How IT GROWS.—Col. Ashby's market is having temporary quarters fitted up in the old China house next to Rineman's. He will occupy one of the new brick store rooms that is going up on State street. From small beginnings that is the way a business will grow in Salem in a year. Jack's bean stalk is nowhere.

SEWERS.—Work on the new river front sewer is being pushed by Contractor Robinson. The assessments ordered by the last council have not been made or collected. It was discovered that the city had to pay all but \$600, and another whirl by the city council will have to be taken before collection can be enforced.

ACCIDENT.—At 1:45 today little Gertrude Litchfield was riding and the horse shied and threw her off. She fell upon the electric car line right in front of a car. Motorman Robinson reversed the car in an instant and she would certainly have been run over. She received quite severe bruises, and what is worse was prevented going on a fishing party.

BUSTED AND BURNED.

Misfortunes that Overtook an Ill-Fated Locomotive Thursday Night.

Engine No. 361 pulling the overland train due south last night, Jas. Wheeler engineer, broke her left eccentric at Labish trestle. Engine No. 83 was ordered down from Junction City, which arrived before midnight, switched the 361 into Chemawa and brought the belated overland on to Salem, leaving for the south at 1 p. m. As soon as the track was open Salem yard engine No. 1, Bat Casey engineer, was ordered to Chemawa to bring No. 361 to this city. On the way a spark set fire to her lagging of wood which encases the boiler, and the No. 1 ran for her life and put the burning locomotive, which was almost a mass of flames, under the big water tank. She was drenched and run onto the side track and the yard crew retired, supposing they had saved the ill-fated No. 361.

AN ALARM
was turned in from the woolen mills at 5:35 a. m. and Capital engine was on the ground in a jiffy. For some reason the bell was not rung until some time after and at 5:30 Tiger engine got there with a hose cart, but had lost her grates and could not steam up. The Caps got a stream and extinguished the flames. The tender was stacked full of wood and coal and but for this would have been entirely destroyed.

THE NO. 361 is entirely dismantled and is a sorry-looking iron horse. Her jacket is in tatters and her cab is gone up in smoke. It seems a spark smoldered under the sheathing and again fired the lagging and it was not discovered until too late. An effort was made to put the burning engine under the tank again but there was not enough steam up. Her driving rods had been disconnected and she was immovable. But for the new fire alarm recently put in from the woolen mills and cannery she would have been much worse injured and might have set fire to other property. The 361 will be taken to Portland today by the yard engine.

DEFECTIVE FORCE.
This fire reveals the great defect in our fire department. The Capital's engine was on the ground in five minutes after the fire alarm was sounded. It was then nearly thirty minutes before the steam was got. Capt. Price had to mount an engine horse and ride down town and ring the fire bell to get the volunteer fire men out. Comment is unnecessary.

WHAT IS PROPOSED.
Capt. Hunt, John Knight, a JOURNAL reporter and others witnessed the turning in of the private alarms at 12 m. today. Each place is indicated by different taps and it worked like a charm. Engineer Holman has spent a good deal of time and some money on these alarms and they ought to be taken to all parts of the city. Foreman Hunt of the Capitals will ask the city council to fix up sleeping apartments in the engine house for six men to run a hose cart beside the driver and engineer. If men can be procured to sleep there, with the extension of the alarms, Salem would have a pretty good day and night service, and the arrangement should be made.

RELEASED AT LAST.

Over a Hundred Thousand Dollars Escapes the Custody of a Broken Safe.

The people at the Ladd & Bush bank are happy. A defective Dreadnaught safe, that for over three weeks has held imprisoned a larger sum of coin than most editors carry in their pockets, has yielded to the gentle persuasion of safe experts, who have been working day and night to release its hidden treasures. Over \$130,000 has been withdrawn from circulation.

A DREADNAUGHT.

The safe is one of the famous "Dreadnaught" pattern, now no longer made. There are but two more of this pattern on the coast and but few in the east. The steel and diamond pointed drills would not "faze" it. It was only by use of an emery drill that any impression could be made on the steel plate.

The expert, Mr. Hill, who represents the Hill Co. of Portland, says he has never met with a safe before that offered such resistance to the most skillfully made tools. One plate was as hard as crystal steel could be made. Drills that would cut smoothly through plate glass would not scratch this. But it had to be cut through or the safe would have to be dynamited. A German, Mr. Spangenberg, an expert safe opener of nearly forty years' experience, who was lock adjuster for Herren Safe Co., worked seven days to bore a hole through this plate.

He hit it so exactly that by putting a slender point of steel through the hole he bored he was able to turn the tumblers into position. They had been entirely disarranged and by no possibility could the combination that would allow the safe to be unlocked, be discovered. Neither have the experts after three weeks work been able to learn

WHAT CAUSED THE TROUBLE.

The little catch that lifts the lever that drops into the tumblers cannot be found. It is believed by Mr. Hill that this is the part that gave out and caused the difficulty.

The safe is not seriously hurt, but will have to be sent to the Cincinnati factory to be put in order. There have been none made for almost twenty years and Mr. Bush is convinced that he has as nearly a burglar-proof safe as can be made.

It was not the time lock that was disarranged in the least, as when opened it was found run down and the arrester lifted, so that it is no possible that the time lock caused the trouble. There is also evidence that the safe was not tampered with. The defect was in the mechanism of the locks.

OREGON'S SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND.

The Buildings Put in Order for the Coming Year.—Increased Attendance.

A look through the Oregon state blind school these days will convince any one that this public institution is decidedly on the up grade.

The superintendent, Miss Olive M. Capwell, has now at work a full crew of carpenters, paper hangers and painters remodeling, enlarging and renovating that institution in such a manner as to accommodate the rapidly increasing demands made upon it. During past years the number of pupils in this school has not averaged over six, while there are now about twenty-five applications from different parts of the state, and as many more located, many of whom would come in if they could be accommodated. This speaks volumes for the management, and although Miss Capwell has limited funds to expend, she hopes to make room for all that may come.

A workshop and several bedrooms will be constructed in the wood house, while the luxury of a parlor will be dispensed with to afford room for the growing numbers. The carpets and furnishings are being taken up and renovated, while some few new furnishings are being added.

Among other acquisitions are nearly a hundred dollars worth of "point" volumes, consisting of text books, pencils, etc., which were due the school from the Louisville printing house for the blind, which distributes its literature for the United States, to the blind schools pro rata according to the number of pupils. The Oregon school will be entitled to a much larger apportionment of these valuable works next year.

Although the school does not open until the second week in September, Miss Capwell has arranged, at the suggestion of the state educational board, and on invitation of the officers of the State Fair, to make an exhibit of the musical, industrial, art and literary work of the school, which it is expected will form a most interesting feature in the pavilion.

SEVEN YEARS AND DIVORCE.

A Chicago Lawyer's Idea, Which Will Be Regarded as Original.

The Chicago attorney of a scientific turn of mind who evolved the idea of what is known as the seven year amendment to the divorce law, may or may not have simplified one of the greatest social problems. An absolute conclusion in this regard will be impossible until the amendment becomes an act and the practical workings of the new statute have been tested by a more or less intelligent and impatient community. It may not be generally understood that the suggested legislation is imperative as a deduction from consideration of what is known of the constant change occurring in particles of the human body.

Each individual is made up of atoms, and each day some of these atoms are cast off to be replaced by others from the food we eat, the water we drink and even the air we breathe. Miss Jones, though perhaps quite as charming as she was a week ago, is not entirely the same person, now is Mr. Smith the same young man he was. Each has lost a portion of the body and each has gained an equivalent.

There is the same general contour as before, but there is a slight difference in material. In course of time this change will be complete. Every recent atom of Miss Jones or Mr. Smith will have gone out into the great world and new atoms will have taken their respective places. Miss Jones and Mr. Smith will be new people.

The consensus of learned opinion is that the body changes entirely once in seven years. Now, suppose Mr. Smith and Miss Jones to wed. Mr. Smith has sworn to cherish the lady who has just become his wife, not some other woman, and vice versa, Mrs. Smith, nee Jones, has made pledges of equal solemnity and import to love none other than the man beside her. For a time it is all right, that is, relatively so, but at the end of a year only six-sevenths of the present Mrs. Smith remain, while Mr. Smith has suffered an equal variation.

At the end of seven years Mrs. Smith is not the same woman Smith married, nor is he the same man whom she promised to cleave to. There is not a particle, not one jot or tittle, remaining about either of the couple who were married. Clearly their relationship is scandalous, and something should be done about it. To remedy the evil the amendment to the divorce law makes a separation at the end of seven years permissible if not mandatory.

Of course it is claimed by the opponents of the proposed legislation that neither Mrs. Smith nor Mr. Smith can properly be deemed unfaithful, since neither longer exists, and the argument, it must be admitted, has its force. But, admitting the assumption, who are the two people at present living together under the name of Smith, and what excuse have they for the relations now existing? Should not they either separate or marry without delay?—Chicago Tribune.
