ALAN PRICES.

How to get to the North Pole. We may seem fully entitled to draw the conclusion that a current is constantly running across the polar region somewhere north of Franz Josef Land from the sea north of the Siberian coast and Hebrides strait, and into the sea between Spitzbergen and Greenland. Since such a current exists, the most natural way of reaching the north pole, or a point quite near it, must be to enter the current on the side where it runs northward, that is, somewhere near the New Siberian islands, and let it carry one straight across those unknown regions which it has prevented so many from reaching. I should build a wooden ship as small and as strong as possible; it shall be big enough to carry provisions for twelve men for five years, besides the necessary coal; a vessel of about 200 tons will suffice. The most important feature of the ship will be that she will be built on such lines as will give her the greatest power of resistance to the pressure of the floe ice. Her sides must not be perpendicular, as those of ships generally are, but must slope from the bulwarks to the keel; or, to use a sailor's expression, her "dead rise" must be made great, so that the floe shall get no hold of her when they are pressed together, but will glide down along her sides and under her, thus tending to lift her out of the water.

With this vessel, and a crew of ten or twelve strong and well picked men, besides an equipment for five years as good in all respects as modern appliances can afford, I think the enterprise has a good prospect of success.—Dr. Fridtjof Nansen in Forum.

THE Bull and the Painter.

Up on George Gould's place, at Furlough lake, in the Catalina, is a stocky young Jersey bull, as full of vim and energy as a steam engine. A few days ago some painters from Margaretville were painting a cottage on the place and had to pass through the pasture where the bull was browsing. One of the painters carried a red paint pot, which he caught the bull's eye. He prepared for business at once and charged on the painter, bellowing loudly. They saw him coming and scampered for dear life. He singled out the painter with the red paint pot and gave him chase, driving him up a tree. As the man sprang into the tree he dropped the paint pot, upon which the bull proceeded to vent his rage. He splattered the paint, which was a bright yellow, all over his forelegs, shoulders and head, and from being a black bull he shortly became a golden colored one. After he had used up the paint pot he turned his attention again to the painter in the tree and quietly proceeded to watch him. After keeping him up the tree for about an hour Jim Gibbons, Gould's head hostler, came and whacked the bull soundly with a blacksnake whip and drove him into a pen, allowing the frightened painter to come down from his perch. Apple Trees Around London.

Many apple trees in London suburban gardens are in danger of extinction. This is a thousand pities, because the apple tree, apart from its attacks of caterpillars and some liability to American blight, not only lives and grows in London gardens, but will bear abundant fruit. Up till the past four or five years it has been quite common to find fairly well loaded apple trees in hundreds of London suburban gardens. Lately, however, year after year the foliage has no longer developed than it has been attacked by myriads of caterpillars, and everywhere round the metropolis all now be seen apple trees apparently all bare and dead. The country brown shriveled foliage left upon them will presently fall, and an other crop of leaves will appear; but the trees have been crippled and weak ended, and this being repeated year after year most eventually kill the trees—in deed, many have been killed already.—London News.

English Pension Abuses.

The curiosities of the pension list comprise few cases more remarkable than that to which Dr. Clark has called attention. About two years ago the honorable member and Mr. J. W. Phillips, as directors of a South African mining company, advertised for a manager at a salary of £2,000 per annum, and from among numerous applicants for the post selected a gentleman who was employed under the home office as assistant inspector of mines at £400 per annum. He resigned his official engagement; but notwithstanding the fact that he is now earning five times his former salary, his name appears on the list of public servants pensioned on account of "ill health and defective eyesight." The chancellor of the exchequer has undertaken to make a searching examination into the case.—London Public Opinion.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

Crops in the Wowie neighborhood, Wasco county, will be fully up to the average. Union is confident of securing the woolen mill. It is expected work will begin on it in a week or two. Work on the Hillsboro water works is now fairly under way, and will be pushed as fast as possible until completed. Potatoes are plentiful this year in Southern Oregon, and some have been sold at Grant's Pass at 45 cents a hundred. The young son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Benson was drowned in a spring at their home near Kirbyville, Josephine county, Sunday. The city of Weston is agitating the subject of improving and extending her water system, which cost \$10,000, and also purchasing an electric light plant. There is considerable opposition to the proposed building of a new courthouse at Roseburg. High taxes and hard times are assigned as the principal causes. Harvest hands are very scarce in Eastern Umatilla, and especially in the vicinity of Milton. Wages this season are \$1.50 per day and \$2.50 for man and team. Walla Walla county's forty-two leading fruit-growers cultivate 1101 acres of land for fruit growing purposes, the total number of trees in the forty-two orchards being 117,935. Joseph Kineman, of Hillsboro, will close up his second kiln of 200,000 brick this week. He expects to burn another kiln this fall. The Adams boys have burned an equal amount. Mrs. Kason Smith, well known in Eastern Oregon, has commenced proceedings for divorce against her husband in the superior court of Walla Walla county. She asks for \$100 per month alimony. Work on the Washington county court house is being pushed as fast as possible. The brickwork is already nearing the top of the second story. The building will be a very handsome one when completed. The hot winds of the last two weeks in Gilliam county have damaged to some extent the crops in that section. Fall wheat, is, of course, uninjured, but spring wheat that was at all late has suffered severely. The little 10-year-old son of Mr. Rudio, of Long Creek, was badly injured in consequence of tying himself to a calf and being dragged. He was severely cut about the head and face and his nose broken. J. H. Nichols, one of Benton county's prominent citizens died at Corvallis last Wednesday. He had been apparently well the day previous, but Wednesday morning he was stricken with apoplexy and died in a short time. Messrs. Eddy and Bushner report the work of alumnus on the Umatilla reservation as progressing favorably. They find little difficulty in satisfying the Indians, but are occasionally delayed by reason of destroyed or displaced monuments. John Timmerman, of Helix, estimates that the wheat crop in his vicinity will average from thirty-five to forty bushels to the acre. Thirty bushels per acre with wheat at 65 cents means something more than \$3000 for each quarter section. There is a strong likelihood of a large summer hotel gracing the wooded slope of the Columbia at Cathlamet before another year rolls around. Pendleton Tribune: Abraham Jacobson, who has been in this section since 1865 considers the condition of grass upon the mountain ranges the best the present year that he has ever seen it. This argues favorably for the sheep and stockmen. The fruit crop in Southern Oregon will be very large and fine. Henry Adams, of Myrtle Creek, expects to have 35,000 pounds of dried prunes and John Weaver still more. The grain crop in the vicinity of Myrtle Creek is very large, and there is no rust to speak of. A visitor from the Cascade locks informs The Dalles Sun that the water is nearly all pumped out of the canal and that a force of laborers have been put to work on the sand pit, preparatory to commencing the concrete in the bottom of the canal. A young man at Halsey went to sleep with a lighted cigarette in his mouth, and was awakened during the night from the intense heat of a burning bed. He was forced to carry the smoldering down stairs to extinguish the flames. He doesn't smoke now when he goes to bed. Oregon City is taking hold of the question of public improvements with a determination that indicates the opening of a new era in the city's growth. Professor Price has been invited to deliver the address before the coming county institute to be held at Josephine county and Professor Geitz, of Ashland, responded to an invitation to address the teachers of Polk county. Rumors to the effect that all the attachments against G. W. Hunt had been dissolved and that he would resume work, have been in circulation lately, and it would be a cause of rejoicing if they could be confirmed, but the news shows that so far from escaping old attachments, new ones are being leveled.
