Some day this consummation of egotism will go down to the ocean and tell the waves to cease their rolling." Several editors who get all their inspiration for display of animosity from the successes of THE JOURNAL seem bound to force upon it the honor of raising the price of wheat at Salem. We distinctly disclaim the honor, but wheat has advanced at Salem "just the same." The influence of a public newspaper should be always used to tell the market in its own vicinage. It should never be a pliant tool of wheat syndicates and hop commission men. At least that is THE JOURNAL'S idea. If some other publishers have any ideas at all they have not been of this variety. No one ever accuses such persons of doing anything that is of any value to the public.

PAVING.—Preparations for gravel paving still go on. Judge Bonham administered a severe rebuke to the practice of bringing criminal actions to settle civil controversies, subjecting men to arrest and saddling costs on the county. SOME PEACHES.

Oregon Against the World—The Market Flooded with Luscious Beauties.

If any one imagines Oregon is not a great natural peach country he can easily have such an illusion dispelled by going around to the grocery stores and fruit stands, and seeing the stacks of Early Crawford now piled up on every hand. They measure from two and a-half to three and a-half inches in diameter. They are of an inviting yellow and red color, rich in flavor and every way a No. 1.

No fruit equal to this in flavor, size, quality and appearance is ever shown here, whether shipped from Southern Oregon or California, yet this peach grows on almost any kind of land—hill, dale, valley, white, red or black land—in great profusion.

Peaches are retailing at \$2.50 a bushel and will bring a good price throughout the season. One grower reports three-fourths of an acre that will yield him about \$300, and a number of other orchards do nearly as well.

TROUBLE AGAIN.

Ira Adams Confesses a Forgery—Works Up Sympathy.

Ira Adams, who was recently charged with plundering a saloon at Salem, who next shot his hand off while hunting near Turner from which he has not recovered, is again in trouble over a falsely uttered check.

He was on Tuesday brought before Recorder Goodell by Marshal Minto under arrest for forgery. B. Oswald, a hotel man at Mt. He should have a guardian appointed.
