TWO HOT GAMES.
Falmes and Albina have two spirited
battles with Ball and Bat.
A small crowd witnessed what
proved to be an exciting game Sat-
urday. The score is an interesting

The pitching of Jacobs was aston-
ishing in all its features. He struck

inning, and lost to Albina in the
eighth by a misjudged decision of
Umpire Potter when he called
George out at home plate on close
slide, on a ball which the catcher for
Albina had not held, and Mr. Pot-
ter did not see for the cloud of
dust. He would have been perfectly
excusable for reversing his decision
as the fact became known to all and
was admitted even by the Albina.
As it was it gave them the game,
and established Umpire Potter's
reputation for extreme fairness to
visitors.

SUNDAY'S GAME.
By hard battling and great run-
ning the Salems gathered in a trio
on the first round and George, the
new supply pitcher was received
with cheers, which he justified by
retiring the visitors, 8 to 0.
The second was signalized by fine

fifth, when excellent playing got

the game possessed intense interest.

seventh and took out one. In the
eighth Albina put their catcher into
the box to relieve the regular who
was badly lamed. In the eighth
Salems took two more and Albina
went down before the combine. In
the ninth each side scored two more.
The game closed with a 10 to 4
score. The regular pitcher for the
Albina, Hitesue, was disabled at
close of third inning, and Abrams
was substituted. This split made
the visitors weak. They offered the
Salems two very good matches how-
ever, and will always be welcomed
here as a fine lot of players.

YOUNG CATTLE THIEVES.
Chas. Snelling and Ed. Rodgers, alias
Lewis Bros. Under Arrest
Again.

MONDAY MORNING
Sheriff W. L. Warren of Yamhill
county arrived on the overland
from Jacksonville, and had in charge
Chas. Snelling and Ed. Rogers,
under charge of larceny of cattle.
They were arrested last fall in Me-
Minville for same accusation and
gave bail, but disappeared.

They have lately turned up in
Jackson county under the name of
Lewis Bros., operating at Central
Point racing and trading horses.
A young man by name of Albert
Yocomb from Yamhill was visiting
a brother-in-law and recognized
them. Sheriff Warren was holding
warrants for their arrest, at once tele-
graphed Sheriff Birdsey of Jack-
son county to capture them. He
then went down and got his men.
They had disposed of the horses and
were about ready to leave the coun-
try. The charge consists in getting
away with 13 head of cattle belong-
ing to Kingroy & Cook, eight miles
west of McMinnville. Other stock
was missed before. The 13 head of
cattle were taken to Portland, and
other cattle had been disposed of at
Dallas. For this they were indicted
by the grand jury of Yamhill,
and will now be tried at the Sep-
tember term of circuit court which
sets on the fourth Monday of Sep-
tember at McMinnville.

VERY POPULAR.
As Sheriff Warren, with his men
came through Central Point, there
was a great demonstration by the
friends of the boys. The crowd sur-
rounded the car, and filled the train
and covered the "Lewis Bros." with
flowers and put moties in the seats
and remembrances in the men's
pockets. It was a grand farewell,
and showed a remarkable affection
for the two young men, who are not
yet of age. The man and his wife
where they had worked led the jolly
crowd, composed of as many wom-
en as men. They threw rice over
them for luck and wished them all
kinds of good luck. It is under-
stood they are from families of good
standing and means, and were not
in need of money. The sheriff does
not believe that they will escape
conviction on the facts, and left with
his men in a team at 1 p. m.

THE BOYS' STORY
is not in shape to be given publicly
as they propose to defend themselves

proud of their warm reception at
Central Point, and strongly declare
their entire innocence of any crime.
They claim the indictment was
worked up by personal enemies,
men in the stock business, who pre-
