Arthur Breymann, wife and son and daughter Otto and Bertha Breymann, Whitney Boise and Miss Mary Stout of Portland. A fine luncheon was served after the wedding and congratulations. Mr. and Mrs. Reuben P. Boise, Jr., accompanied by a small party of friends took the 1 p. m. train. They will be absent several days at the Sound and will return to live at Salem. Mr. Boise is a prominent young business man of this city, and has a large circle of friends and well wishers.

Hops.—The weekly report of the Department of Agriculture has this: "Hop picking is in progress. The hop lice have done considerable damage. In some yards fully 50 per cent. of the hops have mould on them, in other yards no mould or little to be seen. The hop crop of Oregon was estimated to be 30,000 bales, but since picking has commenced it has been found that based on above estimate there will not be over 20,000 bales, at the most, of the first grade hops."

BLOOD AND PERJURY.

Salem's Police Court Boils Over With Business Monday Morning.

SERIOUS SPARRING.
There was a "high jinks" at the Bill Anderson saloon Saturday night. The fun at an early hour was "fast and furious." There was an orchestra, comic sparring matches had been advertised, and working men and thresher crews filled the place to overflowing.

A FIGHT
took place, which a JOURNAL reporter had described to him by an eyewitness as follows: The mock sparring matches that have been a feature at the Bill Anderson saloon Saturday nights were coming off as usual. One Holland put in an appearance evidently bent on trouble and intent to break up the sport, which he did. He had a falling out with one of the seconds, got his blood up and offered seriously to whip the house. As there were two hundred present and Holland wanted to take charge of ceremonies. He jumped into the ring and began to strip. Mr. Anderson, the proprietor, concluded to put an end to the trouble and struck Holland on the head with a whiskey glass, which cut him so that he bled. This stopped the riot in the nick of time, as Bat Callahan was ready to meet Holland in cold blood. Mr. Anderson claims that his prompt action alone prevented a general melee.

HOLLAND'S STATEMENT.
"I dropped in there," says Holland, "and a sparring was going on. One man was knocked down and was so full he could not arise. I tried to help him and did so. When I turned to go I had a word with the second and Anderson hit me with two whiskey glasses."

A WARRANT
was issued for the arrest of Wm. R. Anderson and he appeared before Justice Goodell on charge of having committed an assault with a dangerous weapon. He appeared by his attorney, Wm. Kaiser, waived examination and was bound over to the next grand jury. Bond \$200.

THE ELOPERS.
Saturday evening J. L. Mitchell, Isaac Durbin, Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Ross, and Marshall Minto went to Albany and confronted Bynon and Bechtel who married and ran away with the two young Salem girls. The young ladies were at the Reverend house in care of the landlady. The girls acted sorry and offered no excuses for their wild act. The men had assured them that they were making money and could provide for them. At the jail the men were found brazen, proposed to fight the matter out to the end and would give no information. The four came to Salem on the Sunday morning overland, were placed in the county jail and hearing set for 9 a. m.

Bynon and Bechtel are photographers and have been at Salem since the latter part of August. They at first took views for some eastern view company, then for newspapers and of late on their own account. They appeared before Justice Goodell an asked continuance of their case one day to prepare a defence. It was granted.
Mr. Bynon's sister and husband from Portland are here to assist him in the settlement of the case. Both the young men are well dressed and acting in a very gentlemanly manner.

A WRIT OF REVIEW.

The Union Pacific Regrets Action to Restrain the Railroad Commission.

The Union Pacific company has filed papers to restrain the Oregon railroad commission from enforcing the reduced freight rates. The action is begun before Judge Boise of the circuit court. A writ of review has been asked to bring the matter before the court and time set for hearing is the 21st of Sept., at Salem.

A REVIEW IS ASKED.

What the company seeks by its pleadings is a writ of review of the rates fixed in the court. It sets up certain leases of lines of feeders, upon which it is called to pay certain fixed charges of 51 per cent or \$2,555,583.64 per annum; that the net earnings from the leased lines the first year were only \$2,238,443.87, etc. Hence the company asks that the Oregon commission rates be annulled as not compensatory and the commission restrained from enforcing the same.

Further Details of Death of Young Windsor, of Lincoln.

While hauling out from the field Saturday morning John, a 17 year old son of Benjamin Windsor, of Lincoln, Polk county, fell and was crushed under the wheels. He got up and drove home, but there sunk away from internal hemorrhage. Dr. Richardson arrived two hours before the boy died. He was in a state of perfect collapse and pulseless. Dr. Chase, of Lincoln, was there soon after the accident but he was without relief. The funeral was held Sunday at 3 p. m. and the body buried at Zena, with an unusual attendance of friends, the procession being over a mile long. Dr. Chase was a quiet, industrious boy, well liked by all and his death is a great loss to the family.
