

waiting an opportunity to pacify the time. Consulate officers and special agents of the treasury department are in the northwest frontier. The prohibited Chinamen cross the border in twenty different places between Vancouver and Montreal. They are assisted across by syndicates of men who make a regular business of it, who have fast teams, stations and secret trails in the interior and trim clipper ships on Puget sound. The United States government offers practically no resistance to this illegal traffic. He is in a position to know—the customs officers, employment and immigration agents, and Canadian Pacific railroad men—estimate that the Chinese cross the line to the United States in about the following ratio: From British Columbia via Puget sound and overland into Washington and Idaho, 40 per cent; from Northwest territory into Montana, about 30 per cent; from Manitoba into Minnesota and North Dakota, about 10 per cent; from all points east of Port Arthur into Michigan and New York, about 20 per cent.

SALEM, Mass., Sept. 14.—Hon. B. Loring, ex-minister to Portugal and former commissioner of agriculture died suddenly this morning of heart trouble. He was 74 years old.

REVOLVING CRIMES.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 14.—Robert Bell, assistant sexton of Calvary Church arraigned in Police Court today charged with rape, abduction and a revolting crime and six of his victims. Girls ranging in age from fourteen to sixty years, confronted him. The story of the girls reveals a series of heinous crimes extending over a period of ten months. The prisoner was held without bail for examination.

Probable Fatal Burning at Oregon City.

REMAINS OF MISS BERTHA ISON.

The Train Robbers, Diss De Bar vs Miss Ava, The North Pole, Good Rifle Shooting, Fighting over a Woman, A Peculiar Death, Foreign and News, Etc.

INDIANS DYING.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 14.—A Guthrie Oklahoma dispatch says the governor inspector, just in from Cheyenne and Arapahoe Indian reservations, reports that for nearly a week Indians have been holding dances. From the result of that and eating melons, both green and ripe, fully fifty per cent. of them died, and a score are very sick.

PROBABLY FATALITY BURNED.

OREGON CITY, Sept. 14.—A frightful accident occurred at Oregon City Saturday, by which Miss Minnie Brown was probably fatally burned, and her stepmother, Mrs. Thomas Brown, and Jacob Sager, seriously burned. Their house is on Fourth street, just off Main. At noon passengers were startled by the cry of fire, and were horrified the next second to see two women rush out of the house, their clothing all ablaze and the flames leaping toward their heads. Their cries attracted a crowd and several men went to their assistance and extinguished the flames with much difficulty.

It is not known exactly how the fire started, except that kerosene had something to do with its origin. The ladies were alone in the house, and it is supposed they were starting a fire with kerosene. Minnie's clothing while she was trying to save her daughter. Their cries aroused Jacob Sager, who is night watchman for the Willamette Transportation and Locks Company and who rooms in the house. Hastily dressing himself, he rushed down stairs and met Minnie in the hall at the foot of the stairs, a mass of flames. She was rushing into the street in company with her mother. Seizing her, he began tearing the burning clothes off with his naked hands, and had succeeded in getting a large part off and the fire much subdued when she broke away and ran into the street. Nothing was at hand to smother the flames and she continued burning for a little time even after reaching the street. At length when the fire was extinguished she was found to be horribly burned from head to foot. Much of the Mr. Sager's heroic measures to tearing the clothes from her, and by which means his hands are both badly burned. In place of Miss Brown's burns are deep. Fears are entertained as to her recovery, owing to the severe shock to the system.

Mrs. Brown fared better than her daughter when she rushed out doors. Fortunately someone reached her with a buggy robe, which was thrown and wrapped around her, after which she was rolled upon the ground until the flames were extinguished. Her burns are serious, but it is not thought by the attending physicians that there is any danger of loss of life in her case. Four physicians were summoned, and everything possible is being done to alleviate the pain of the sufferers.

Mr. Sager's burns are confined to the hands, and would be counted in most cases, but in view of the much greater injuries experienced by those whom he tried to aid, he thinks his wounds but slight.

REMAINS OF MISS BERTHA ISON.

BAKER CITY, Or., Sept. 14.—The remains of Miss Bertha Ison, the young lady who was murdered at Bloomington, Ill., last Monday, arrived in this city Saturday, the scene of her birth and home for almost her entire life. The funeral party, consisting of her mother, sister and brother, was met at Pocatello, Idaho, by several intimate friends, who accompanied the remains here. When the train arrived in this city hundreds of friends were at the depot, and the scene was indeed a sad one. Among the number were the school matrons of the deceased. The remains were conveyed to the family residence, from which place the funeral took place yesterday. Never in the history of Baker City was there an announcement which felt heavier than the intelligence that Miss Ison, one of the city's most highly respected young ladies, had been murdered.

THE TRAIN ROBBER.

MODESTO, Cal., Sept. 14.—Bill Dalton and Riley Deane, accused of having attempted to rob the train near Ceres, were brought before Justice Townes Saturday to plead and have the time set for the preliminary examination. District Attorney Fulkner addressed the court and said he had investigated the case thoroughly and he found that the detectives had gone back on everything they had said. He did not believe Dalton and Deane were near the scene of the attempted robbery. He therefore made a motion that they be discharged. The judge granted the motion, and Dalton and Deane were released from custody. Dalton was immediately arrested upon an other warrant charging him with complicity in the Albia train robbery which occurred about one year ago.

Dalton had been arrested before on the same charge, but was released on bonds. One of his bondsmen at Visalia withdrew from the bond, hence the second arrest.

DISS DE BAR VS MISS AVA.

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—Father Kelley, of the Jesuit church, whom Miss Ava, in her Cincinnati story, accused of complicity in her so-called abduction, said to a reporter Saturday that it was absurd to talk about. She came to him merely to talk over her scheme for the reform of destitute and fallen women. She never mentioned having property in the hands of the church, but spoke of having enormous wealth of her own. She said she had been a nun. Father Kelley said she struck him as being a remarkable character. After one hearing her talk you would never forget her. She could converse on any subject and her knowledge seemed world-wide. Father Kelley was shown Diss De Bar's picture, and said it bore a strong resemblance to Ava. He says he has a witness who saw Miss Ava enter the church from the side door and pass immediately out at the front, carrying a bag in which were her money and jewels. Another person saw her get into a carriage waiting around the corner and drive away. Chief of Police McClaughy then informed a telegram from Inspector Byrnes, of New York, giving a description of Diss De Bar, which corresponds to Miss Ava's description, even to the scar on the cheek. A cut of Diss De Bar, with hat and clothes changed with pen and ink to correspond with those worn by Miss Ava, were shown Father Fitzgerald, Mrs. Bolton and others. All unhesitatingly pronounced it a good likeness of Ava. Further proof of her identity is found in the fact that a well known gentleman met Diss De Bar not long ago and warned her against trying any confidence games in Chicago. This information comes from Mrs. Bolton, who says she is not at liberty to disclose all the details.

GOOD RIFLE SHOOTING.

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—A drizzling rain fell most of the Saturday at Fort Sheridan. It was the last day of the skirmishing for infantry, and also their last in company. Sergeant Merwin, E. Co., 15th infantry, made the phenomenal score of 148 in his morning run, the best ever made on this range, and probably wins for Merwin, James S. Kirk's purse of \$50. The struggle for a berth on the army rifle team was stubbornly contested by 35 infantrymen. It was generally conceded that Sergeant Merwin would carry off the gold medal, while the two silver ones would fall to Sergeant Davis and Corporal Sweeney, with a chance of Private W. James forging ahead into second or third place. James is quite an old man, but finished fourth among distinguished riflemen. Sergeant Merwin's score, 570; Sergeant Davis, B company, 568; Corporal Sweeney, 568; Sergeant F. D. Powell, 553; Corporal J. Chalon, 547; Sergeant M. Gray, 569; Lieutenant F. D. Ramsey, 568; Sergeant J. M. Mayer, 564; Lieutenant J. O'Brien 556; Lieut. C. Gerber, 552; get gold medals; the others silver.

OVER A WOMAN.

VENICE, Ills., Sept. 14.—News reached here this morning that two negroes, Grant Wood and Dick Oliver quarreled over a woman and fought with knives and pistols. Wood was cut in the heart dying soon afterwards. While Oliver's wounds are serious he probably will recover, and the woman is under arrest.

PECULIAR DEATH.

PORTLAND, Sept. 14.—John M. S. P. dies, the 22-year old son of a wealthy London banker, was accidentally drowned in the Willamette river at the foot of 81st street, at 4:35 o'clock Saturday afternoon. He went down to the river to take a swim about 4:30 o'clock, his intention being to go home immediately after taking the bath. A. F. C. Green and J. L. Albo, two of his associates in the lumber yard, accompanied him. The three men undressed on the slip leading from the dock to the river, and as the outer edge of the slip is only about six feet above the water, P. slides off. He was an expert swimmer, but as he did not come to the surface as soon as he should, his companions became alarmed. On looking for him where he jumped off they had no trouble in finding him. The water at that point is only five or six feet deep. When taken out P. had every appearance of a drowned man, but as he had been in the water only three minutes, and the body was still warm every effort was made to resuscitate him. Dr. R. W. Glendon, the home surgeon of St. Vincent's hospital, arrived on the scene twenty minutes after the body was taken out of the water, and Drs. David Walker and Barber arrived soon after. This party of medical talent was augmented by a number of relatives and friends, but their combined efforts to restore life availed nothing. They worked over the body nearly two hours trying every means known to the medical profession of productive artificial respiration, and not until every resource was exhausted was given up for dead. Coroner River

was then notified and the body was taken to the morgue. A more careful examination of the body at the morgue revealed the fact that Peeble's neck was broken between the fourth and fifth cervical vertebra. This accounted for his utter helplessness after striking the water and also accounted for the failure of those who worked so energetically to restore life.

KILLED BY AN ENGINE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 14.—Moses Bettman, a wealthy dealer in chemicals was run over this morning by a yard engine on Brannan street and killed. He leaves eight children, one whom is Sigmund Bettman the well known capitalist.

FOREIGN.

FIRE IN THE SALVAGES.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—The Salvages group of islands near the Canaries were recently the scene of an extensive conflagration, the loss amounts to two hundred thousand pounds.

ENGLISH TAKE SIGRI.

PARIS, Sept. 14.—A decided feeling of uneasiness is caused in diplomatic and financial circles here by the receipt of despatches announcing that Sigri, on the west coast of the island of Mytilene, an island belonging to Turkey, near the coast of Asia Minor and within steaming distance of the Dardanelles, was occupied by a detachment of British troops.

Under ordinary circumstances little or no credence would have been placed in this alarming rumor, but coupled with the story broadly circulated Saturday that Great Britain in view of Russia's practical coercion of Turkey in regard to passage through the Dardanelles and of the vessel belonging to her volunteer fleet intended to occupy the island of Tenedos at entrance of Helles Port or the Dardanelles.

CONSIDERABLE EXCITEMENT.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—As soon as the report of the occupation of Mytilene by a British force was received here there was considerable excitement, up to 5:30 p. m. there was no official utterance upon the subject. A despatch was received from Constantinople stating the occupation of the island of Mytilene was an accomplished fact and it has found echo on all continental bourses today.

FLOODS IN SPAIN.

MADRID, Sept. 14.—Serious floods and storms are reported in various parts of Spain official information received here from the scene of the floods now devastating the Province of Toledo, according to news received 2000 people perished and immense amount of damage was done.

THE NORTH POLE.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—Another expedition to the north pole has been planned by Dr. Griffith Nansen, the well known explorer, has decided to undertake the perilous trip next year. As Ekroll has invented a new kind of "sled boat," his plan has excited considerable interest in the geographical circles of Europe. Professor Lupan has a long article in the last number of Petromann's Mettellingungen upon Ekroll's plans and inventions. "The vehicle invented by Ekroll," writes the professor, "consists of a number of sleds so constructed that they can be turned into boats when necessary. The boat is to be used in the open waters of the polar sea, while the sleds are for travel over the ice. The sleds will be drawn by dogs trained for the purpose. The expedition is to consist of as few people as possible, at most six, and the greatest possible number of dogs. But little baggage and few provisions will be carried. The peculiar construction of the sleds and the snowshoes with which the travelers are to be provided will facilitate the passage of the caravan." As Ekroll will be able to use either boats or sleds, on occasion demands, he will be, in a certain sense, independent of wind and weather. Besides, he will be able to choose his path, and take, if he wishes, the shortest road.

ENGLAND GETTING READY.

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—A British army officer on his way to inspect the defenses of British Columbia says his government intends to strengthen the defenses of Canada on both oceans and along the frontier on the St. Lawrence and Great Lakes and that ships and armaments of the Atlantic and Pacific squadrons will be greatly strengthened. At Halifax the British government is building immense fortifications. He says the general belief in England is that trouble with the United States is inevitable.

EARL OF DUDLEY MARRIED.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—The Earl of Dudley was married to Miss Rachel Gurney today.
