KNOCKED OUT.

The State Victorious in Keeping Jurisdiction of the R. R. Commission Cases.

Judge Boise decides that the railroad companies cannot remove their cases to Judge Dundy's court.

The points relied on by District Attorney Bingham, Attorney General Chamberlain, and Commissioner Colvig in their arguments in opposing removal of the cases to the federal courts were briefly as follows:

That there was no diversity of citizenship, that no federal question, or question involving a law of congress or the constitution of the United States was necessary to a decision of the cases.
