DEATH OF GEN. W. H. F. LEE.
ALEXANDRIA, Va., Oct. 16.—General W. H. F. Lee, second son of General Robert E. Lee, died at Ravensworth, Fairfax county, last evening, aged 64 years. He had represented his district in congress for two terms, and was member-elect for the present house. Cause of death, heart trouble and dropsy.

THE CONTEMP CASES.
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23.—When the case of Stephen R. Gage was cited to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt, for not appearing before the grand jury when summoned, was called in the superior court this morning. Gage stated he would purge himself of contempt and in recognition of decision of the department of the court both he and Chute would appear before the grand jury and testify.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT.
PITTSBURGH, Ohio, Oct. 16.—The Panhandle vestibule limited east bound was wrecked at Mingo Junction, four miles west of Stubenville, Ohio, this morning. William Marshall, a brakeman of Columbus, Ohio, and Joseph Weston, express messenger, were killed. Four others were seriously injured.

THE FIRST TO GIVE THE ALARM.
SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Oct. 16.—During the past few months several incendiary fires have occurred here, Odd Fellows' hall, several schools, stores and residences being destroyed. Wednesday night Deputy Sheriff Holcomb's barn was on fire, and George Jessang, deputy county assessor, was arrested while playing a hose on the flames. He was charged by the sheriff with being the cause of several recent fires, including this one. Jessang was first to give the alarm for all these fires. No motive is known for his acts.

MONUMENT TO GRANT.
PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 16.—It is designed by the Grand Army of the Republic to erect in Washington, D. C., a monument to General Grant. The necessary money to pay for the monument is being raised by popular subscription, among the G. A. R. posts of the country.

NINETY-FIVE THOUSAND SHORT.
WASHINGTON, Ind., Oct. 16.—The alleged shortage of County Auditor Lavalie, in the school funds, will probably amount to \$95,000, as that sum is not accounted for.

THE ADAMS EXPRESS EMBROILED.
NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—The application of Henry Sanford, president of the Adams Express company, for an attachment against the property of John Hoey, the deposed president of that company, in a suit to recover over half a million, was granted today. The summons attached to the papers announces to Hoey, if he defaults in appearing to answer the suit, judgment will be taken against him for \$712,000, with interests and costs.

CARCASSES SPOILED.
PLYMOUTH, Oct. 16.—The British steamer Parramatta, which arrived here, reports the crank shaft of her freezing engine was broken while she was in the gulf of Aden causing its stoppage for 20 hours. Hot weather caused the carcasses of 20,000 Australian sheep in the freezing compartments to spoil.

A VALUABLE DECISION.
FARGO, N. D., Oct. 16.—It is said the decision of Judge Caldwell in the Northern Pacific case yesterday is worth from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 to the railroad, although on the main issue as to taxation of lands, the decision is against the company. The decision gives them a clear title to all land within their grant, not known to contain minerals at the time of filing the maps of the definite location of the road.

HE LIT A MATCH.
MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 16.—J. M. Horton, a wealthy cotton farmer of this county, is nearly \$10,000 out of pocket through the criminal carelessness of a negro deputy sheriff named Bill Bolton. Saturday night Bolton went to Horton's steam gin to levy on a lot of cotton therein belonging to one of Horton's customers. Going into the cotton-room, where the atmosphere was charged with fine particles of cotton lint, he struck a match. Instantly the whole place was in a blaze, and in ten minutes the gin house and contents were destroyed. A crowd of negroes gathered, and, on finding out what Bolton had done, they set upon him and beat him so severely that he may die. Horton has no insurance.

GONE WITH HIS AUNT.
PINE BLUFF, Ark., Oct. 16.—News reaches this city of a sensational elopement at Magnolia, Ark., a station south of here, on the St. Louis and Southwestern Railway. Richard Stogers, a wealthy lumberman and merchant, has disappeared with his aunt, Mrs. Jennie Buford. Stogers' wife has been dead less than a month, and Mrs. Buford leaves a husband and children.

UNCOVERING A MYSTERY.
ARKANSAS CITY, Ark., Oct. 16.—The sheriff of this county made an arrest in Oklahoma which may lead to the solution of a great mystery. The prisoner, John Pruden, is accused of a murder which was committed here over two years ago. At that time a man named Charles Webb was reported to have been killed by a horse. There was, however, some evidence to show that Webb was not dead and that a tramp had been murdered to get the insurance on Webb's life. While the coroner was investigating this supposed murder an old man named Louis Pomeroy, who lived in the neighborhood, was murdered, and it was supposed he was killed to prevent his telling what he knew of the Webb murder. The excitement over these murders ended with the arrest and acquittal of several men, the evidence against them being insufficient to convict.

Recently a negro named Reuben Jones, who claims to have known about the murder, made a statement charging Pruden with the murder, and he is in jail awaiting trial. Jones says he saw the man do the shooting, but was afraid to tell what he knew at the time.

WILLIAM IS ANGRY.
BERLIN, Oct. 16.—The police are anxiously hunting for the author of a scurrilous leaflet, which has been mysteriously circulated, and which contains an offensive attack on the kaiser, charging him with dissipation and immorality, and imitating that he is of unsound mind. The writer also holds up to ridicule the kaiser's alleged idea of ever equaling his ancestor, the great Frederick, and the article closes with the advice to the kaiser to be careful about the confagration to consume himself and his house. Such words are seldom heard in Germany, much less printed, and the author would be sentenced to a long term of imprisonment, could he be discovered. The kaiser is said to know no forgiveness for people who offend his pride and ambition, and the police know that he appreciates and rewards the men who make the desired arrests.

THE STORM OVER.
LONDON, Oct. 16.—The vessels which have arrived at English ports seeking shelter from the storm, are in a pitiable condition. The storm is now over.

O'BRIEN VS. PARNELL.
LONDON, Oct. 16.—Wm. O'Brien, the member of parliament, today made public a statement, or manifesto in reply to recent Parnellite defenses. He writes: "I have waited since the funeral, hoping the late Parnell's leading supporters, knowing my relations with Parnell at Buloine, would have manliness enough to disassociate themselves from the diabolical charges that Dillon and myself brought their leader to death. At Boulogne the conference of Parnell's four most influential lieutenants professed themselves as eager as ourselves to secure Parnell's withdrawal. These same men are now silent whilst their organ charges me with plotting to get rid of Parnell. They themselves pressed me to consent to Parnell's first proposition, which was that he should retire in favor of myself. A letter from Parnell to O'Brien is then given in which the former expressed his gratitude for the kindness and gentleness of the spirit shown by O'Brien. O'Brien concluded: "Thus closed the Boulogne communication. With a full recognition, we parted as honorable opponents."
