OUT OF THE CAMERA.—The artist Sperry has been at work for some time in developing a picture of the late Miss Nellie Boise, drowned at Clatsop beach last summer. A few days before her departure a Salem amateur artist caught a group of young ladies in one of the parlors of ex-Governor Moody's residence. No photograph of Miss Boise could be found in any of the galleries at Salem or Portland, and this was only found in diminished form, caught by chance, as the lady had a singular aversion to having her picture taken. It presents a fine side view of Miss Boise, a very natural and lifelike picture. Miss Sperry has developed it in several ways, light and dark, and it is treasured by the family and friends as the only picture obtainable of the departed.

PERFECT SKIES.—Saturday and Sunday were as perfect days as June ever afforded. The skies were clear and the air soft, the landscapes mellow and rich with foliage effects. From all the elevations about Salem the great mountain peaks were visible at a distance forty to one hundred miles. Mt. Rainier is 135 miles distant by the U. S. land office map of 1890, and this measurement is sustained by reliable geographical authorities. The beautiful sugarloaf of St. Helens is plainly visible at 95 miles.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Grand Jury Submits Its Usual Report—The Focket.

THE GRAND JURY'S REPORT.
Pursuant to the duties obligatory on the grand jury of this court, we have carefully inquired into and examined every matter brought before us, and, having discharged such duties to the best of our ability, we beg to report the following:
We have visited and examined the various public institutions in and adjacent to Salem.

The county poor farm at this time supplies the needs of nine inmates. We find the comforts for this class, under the present management, in just a fair condition—no more.

The records and files of the clerk, sheriff, treasurer, recorder, and other officials are orderly, systematically, and efficiently kept.

We find that the index to the county roads is very indefinite and imperfect, and recommend to the honorable county court that a new index of county roads be made; otherwise we find the record book and indices in the county clerk's office in good form and well kept.

The city's prison we find apparently secure, and the building in good condition.
At the penitentiary we find extensive improvements in the painting of the building and fixing of the grounds. The register at this time shows 369 prisoners. All seem to have plenty of good wholesome food and only a fair amount of work. And we will say that the dragging of the piece of iron, that the jury's attention has been called to by some, as a punishment, is no more than just and what is apparently right, under the circumstances.

The state house, so far as completed, together with its furniture and appurtenances, is in good repair. The books and journals of the secretary, treasurer, clerk of the board of school land commissioners and other officers, together with the files, are kept in a neat and satisfactory manner.

The asylum, under its new management, has been improved in the way of safety to the building and inmates in case of fire, and the water cisterns are being overhauled. The building, its arrangements and appliances, are all apparently in good condition and working order. The records and files of the institution are orderly and efficiently kept. We visited the school for the deaf mutes and also for the blind. We find each of these places in good condition, neatly kept, and all the conveniences possible for the occupants therein.

THE BIG REVIVAL.

The revival meeting at the Christian church opened Sunday with a fine audience. The subject was, "The Cause of Infidelity." The sermon was well worth hearing. At night the house was full. The subject was, "How Can We Understand the Bible?" The subject was ably handled. The speaker said the Bible should be interpreted by the rules of interpretation common to language. That the Holy Spirit used the language of men in speaking to men. That Matthew, Mark, Luke and John were written as histories of Christ to produce faith, that he is the son of God. The acts of the Apostles is a history of how the apostles converted Christians, and that the Epistles were written to churches to correct the members and teach them how to live. That Timothy and Titus were written to preachers and elders, and that Revelations is a history of the church. That prophecy is history in advance. The subject tonight is "The Bible is from Heaven." Any one desiring Bible knowledge will do well to attend these meetings.

The Decorative Union.

ED. JOURNAL.—The Salem papers are continually harping on the inactivity of the Salem Decorative Union in regard to the improvement of Willson avenue as though they were a wealthy corporation having unlimited means. The truth is, that through the efforts of the union alone, the state expended about \$4000 in improving and beautifying the grounds east of the capitol last year. I was in conversation with Secretary McBride only a day or two ago in regard to improving west of the capitol, and he informed me that while the state board was ready and willing to proceed with improving on the west side, that in view of the fact that the dome of the capitol is to be built next year, heating apparatus to be put in the building, and the representative hall to be remodeled, all in accordance with the instructions of the legislature at its last session, it was deemed imprudent to attempt any improvement until all this work had been completed, as the grounds will be covered with iron, brick, lumber, and other building material, and that if any shrubbery or trees were set out or walks made they would probably be injured or destroyed by teams or otherwise. The Decorative union, without help from the city or state, can do but little, yet is ready to assist, and has been doing all it could. To properly improve Willson avenue from the west side of the capitol to the east side of Church street, with a curb, trees, shrubs, walks and tiling will require \$10,000, and there is no use in doing anything unless the work is begun right. If the city could grade Willson avenue, filling up the west end from the band stand to a proper level, and tile it from the band stand to the west line, then the union could assist with its means to further continue the work, but to begin wrong is to throw money away.
