NO PAVING TILL SPRING.

That is What Seems to Be in the Air for Salem.

A JOURNAL representative had a short conversation with a prominent business man this morning in the course of which he said:

"I very much doubt if the council Thursday evening does not put off paving till next spring, if not entirely. The truth is, they are all afraid of the coming city election. The mayor seems afraid to veto and afraid to proceed. Plans will be made at the Thursday evening meeting that it will be a more favorable time to do the work next spring. The contractors are not disposed to be in a hurry, as they are still in hopes of some change in favor of bituminous rock. The bituminous men have one strong point. They say a smooth pavement that can be washed clean with a hose is the only one that guarantees freedom from dust and mud. There is not enough money in the present contract and any change will be welcomed by the Portland contractors, especially if it is made after the bid is accepted. I predict that we will see no work on street improvement at the hands of the present city administration. The pledges it made to improve the streets are fresh in the memory of all. A whole year has passed and nothing has been done. That display of energies manifested at the start has oozed out soft as our street mud. It is to be hoped the next city administration will come nearer redeeming its pledges on street improvement than the present one has, tho' a good deal of preliminary work has been done."

FROM JEFFERSON.—The ladies of the Evangelical church held a very pleasant entertainment at the Town Hall, Saturday evening, the chief feature of which were, a fine supper, a fairly good literary and musical production by the young people, and, best of all, a jolly good social time, in which all classes felt free to take a part. About forty dollars were realized, which, after deducting expenses, will be used toward furnishing the new Evangelical church, now under way of construction. Between showers the farmers of this community are busy with their fall sowing and gathering their bountiful harvest of fruits and potatoes. Not an empty residence can now be found in the town. Many new corners are noted. Among the more recent arrivals are James Faggart, the owner of one of the most romantic and beautiful locations on the coast. It is near "Slab Creek," in Tillamook county. A place known to many of our readers as a summer resort. Mr. Faggart comes to spend the winter with his wife, who is a teacher in our school. Mr. Lynes and family are just from Missouri; are renting for a time, till they can buy a place to suit them. They are of the class of citizens we need, and we cordially extend to them a kind welcome. Rev. Wolfe, with his family, has just arrived from Minnesota. He is warmly received by his congregation, for whom he preached very acceptably last Sunday. He will occupy the same pulpit next Sunday morning and evening.

PERSONAL.—Mr. C. E. Tilton, formerly of Ladd & Tilton, passed through Salem Tuesday night via San Francisco, on his journey home. Mr. Tilton is accompanied by his wife, and is on a tour of pleasure and business combined from his home in New Hampshire. He is well-known as one of Oregon's pioneers, having come here in early days from the east and with Mr. Ladd established the largest banking concern in the Northwest and one of the largest on the coast. He is known throughout the east as one of the ablest financiers in the country. It is some years ago that he dissolved partnership with Mr. Ladd. Since then he has retired from business and is enjoying life in New Hampshire. Although seventy years of age, he appears fresh and vigorous. He was met at the train by his old friend A. Bush, of Salem.

SUPREME COURT.

Latest Decision of Oregon's Highest Court of Appeals.

C. B. Bellinger, guardian of Linda and Ben Campbell Holladay, minors, app., vs. Rufus Ingalls, executor, resp. The decree appealed from reversed and the court below directed to reverse the decree of the county court of Multnomah county, and to direct that court to require the respondent to file his final account as executor of the last will and testament of Esther Holladay, deceased, and that the same be there disposed of according to law and the usual practice of that court. Opinion by Strahan, C. J.

In the matter of Peter Fenstermacher et al. vs. The State of Oregon, a petition was filed in this court asking for an order permitting them to file in the circuit court a bill or complaint in the nature of a bill of review, denied.

L. A. Hawkins, resp. vs. Carrie Jones et al., apps., and Geo. Lung resp., vs. M. G. Morgan and W. G. Harter, apps.; judgment of the lower court affirmed in both cases on account of appellants failing to file transcripts. Opinion per curiam.

Henry Cribbie et al., apps., vs. Charles E. Deal et al., resp.; appeal from Multnomah county; argued and submitted.

State of Oregon ex rel. Annie Everett, resp. vs. Jonathan Bonner, Jr., app.; appeal from Multnomah county; argued and submitted.

James Country, resp., vs. Willamette Bridge & Railway company, app.; appeal from Multnomah county; argued and submitted.
