FOUND GUILTY.

The Southern Pacific Found Guilty of Discrimination and Fined \$1000.

At Albany Wednesday in the circuit court the first of the two cases of the state against E. P. Rogers, of the Southern Pacific Co., for discrimination in freight rates, the jury returned a verdict of guilty. Counsel for the defendant filed a motion for a new trial and arrest of judgment, which Judge Rose overruled. Time for sentence was waived, and the court imposed a fine of \$1000. The case will be appealed to the supreme court. The second case was continued.

The outcome of these suits was watched with deep interest. In violation of the Hunt law, the Southern Pacific company had been charging less for hauling grain from certain points a longer distance than other points nearer, and thus killing local markets. This is in keeping with a general practice to build up trade at competitive points at the expense of the shippers at non-competitive points. The fine of a thousand dollars if imposed in every instance where the company has violated the law would bankrupt the Southern Pacific with all its alleged millions. The case is an important one, because it shows how the company has been disregarding state laws. The first jury disagreed, as several of the jurors were men holding discriminatory contracts or who had received favors from the railroad. The conviction reflects credit upon Public Prosecutor Geo. H. Bingham.

THEY ARE WANTED.

Two Supposed Horse-thieves Heeded This Way—Officers on the Lookout.

Sheriff Croston at noon received a telegram from Sheriff J. E. Noland of Lane county, asking him to look out for two horse-thieves coming in this direction. The telegram reads as follows:

"Send man on main road and look out for stolen team hitched to an old hack with a panel bed, painted black. The horses are hitched up in an old work harness with new bridles. One man is fifty years old, six feet high and has short gray whiskers. The other is thirty-three years old, five feet ten inches high and wears a plaid check suit."

The sheriff is sending out telegrams and taking all steps to over-haul the two men. The team was stolen on the night of the 27th from the pasture of D. Stanton, Creswell. Both are males, one bay with four white feet and face, the other black with a few white hairs on face. They are well kept and good travelers.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.—The Oregon convention of the Y. P. S. C. E. meets at Albany Friday, Oct. 30, at 2 p. m., and will remain in session three days. About twenty delegates from the societies connected with the different churches at Salem will attend. It will be a large and successful convention of young Christian workers.

MUTE SCHOOL.—The annual meeting of the board of trustees of the Oregon school for deaf mutes was held yesterday. All the officers were re-elected and the school was found in good condition. The attendance is above the average, and members of the board declare themselves pleased with the general management and progress of the school.

A BAD NIGHT.—The band boys had only a small attendance last night to a concert that really merited a better house. They about made expenses, and will try again under more favorable circumstances. The Second Regiment band deserves a liberal share of encouragement from Salem people.

PAVING TO GO AHEAD.

The Special Session Very Liable to Order the Contracts Signed Up.

Mayor D'Arcy has ordered a special session of the council this evening to consider the contracts for gravel pavement of twelve blocks. It is more than likely that the finishing stroke will be put on, and the work begun as soon as possible.

Consultation with contractors shows that the bid which the city has secured on this is a reasonable one. It is doubtful if as low a bid could be secured if another advertisement for bids was made. There can be no mistake that the present bid was a reasonable one.

The disgrace of having pools of water standing on our streets—principal streets at that—should not be tolerated any longer. Our city will lose nothing by having the streets graded so that the water cannot stand in pools as it does now. The work should not be put off until spring. If it is right to do what is begun, it is as right now as it ever will be. Delay is no solution of the difficulty and should not be suffered any longer. If present plan is wrong drop it, but do not delay it. Tiling, manholes connected with the sewers and streets put to grade are all desirable improvements on present conditions.

Mayor D'Arcy's vote carried the paving ordinance and the mayor will not stand in the way of immediate undertaking of the improvement. He stated in a JOURNAL reporter this morning that all he wishes to bring to the attention of the council, before signing the contract, is the question, whether the contract price was sealed down sufficient after the plans were changed to leave off the gutters and crosswalks. The mayor is not certain that the contract price was reduced enough, in proportion to the original bid, for leaving off the concrete work referred to and simply wishes a consultation on that point.

SOCIAL EVENT.—The Albany papers chronicle the marriage at the parlors of the St. Charles Hotel at 10 a. m. on Wednesday Oct. 28, 1891, of Miss Margaret Rhaw and Wm. Davidson, Rev. E. R. Pichard officiating. The groom is clerk at the St. Charles, and the bride is a wealthy young lady of Salem. The paragon were elegantly decorated for the occasion. Mr. and Mrs. Davidson left on the noon train for Portland, where they will spend a few days. On their return they will be given a reception Monday evening at the St. Charles. The happy couple were the recipients of congratulatory telegrams from Salem, Portland, San Francisco and elsewhere.

A SUCCESS.—The program rendered last night by Miss Ames at Willamette chapel, aided by conservatory talent, was a decided success. Miss Ames has winning ways, great energies and as an educationist stands second to none in Oregon. Her humorous renditions brought great applause from a large audience, who turned out in spite of rains and stormy weather. The University library nets a substantial sum.
