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AT THE ASYLUM.

A Journal Reporter Goes Through That Sad and Funny World Enclosed with Erick.

A reporter of THE JOURNAL penetrated the Oregon mist Wednesday to the state asylum a mile east of the city and spent a few hours with Dr. Rowland, his employees and the seven hundred and thirteen patients who make their home in those immense rectangles of three-story brick buildings. He has visited similar institutions in the east and in Europe, and comparing with what he had seen before, he is convinced that in respect to cleanliness, comforts of inmates, politeness of all employees and gentleness toward patients, he has not seen it surpassed.

Supt. Rowland and his steward, Jay C. Smith, received the writer and escorted him through the building. Two-thirds of the patients are males but we did not have time to discuss this apparent discrimination in favor of the fair sex nor ascertain why their reason is so much less disturbed. We learned that how-ever violent patients may become, so far Dr. Rowland has been able to handle all cases, even under trying circumstances, without resort to force or punishment. The new superintendent seems to unite in a rare degree kindness and intelligence. The state is very fortunate to have secured his services and he has been equally fortunate in his choice of employees.

SOME QUEER PATIENTS. It is always interesting to study the peculiar mental phenomena here manifested. Many labor under the hallucination of being in positions of power, of being real princes and potentates and able to carry out all the most imperious exercise of authority. They make the most ridiculous commands and expect all to bow to their decrees. Then there is the opposite extreme of childlike and absence of all will power.

One middle-aged woman fondles a doll all day long with the devotion of a five-year-old. As the reporter was walking through one of the wards a very pretty young woman who imagines she is a princess, approached and looking in his eyes with an expression of innocent wonder and "anxious expectation," said:

"Are you the one who has come to redeem me?"

Dr. Rowland explained that she was constantly under the impression of being held in durance, prisoner in a castle, and expects to be rescued by her cavalier prince. She took the reporter's reply as an encouragement and leaned trustfully upon his arm as he walked about the ward.

THE QUEEN OF OREGON. It is by no means a queenly figure, but a very garrulous and abusive old lady, not in the least inclined to politeness or gentility. She mingles German with her English billingsgate and continually complains at the insubordination of her subjects. The astrologers and soothsayers, musicians and doctors, prime ministers and world-coming-to-an-end predictors by the dozen are far more agreeable subjects to observe.

IN THE KITCHEN. Baking and cooking was going in a clean and wholesome manner. A baking of bread was just taken out that any bakery or housekeeper in Oregon might be proud to equal. The institution is becoming terribly crowded for room and unless the hags admitting persons here are radically changed an additional wing will have to be built at an early day. This will be inevitable. Millions outside of the asylum who could appreciate the food, bedding and care here received, would be only too glad to get what the generosity of the state here supplies to its unhappy wards.

AT THE POINT OF A PISTOL.

An Insane Man Demands Money of a Bank Cashier.

At one o'clock a man stepped up to the teller's window at Williams & England's bank and demanded a loan of five hundred dollars of the cashier.

Hugh P. McNary, the cashier, told the man he must wait until one of the proprietors came in.

"I will not wait. I am hard up. I've got to have that money at once or I will kill you."

The speaker was Dr. M. J. Patton, who has an office upstairs in the Eldridge block, and who has been in the hands of the police several times for drunkenness.

McNary stepped up to the counter and reached under it where lay a revolver in a sheath. "Stop, I've got the drop on you," yelled the doctor as he drew a small silver-mounted revolver.

McNary was within a hairsbreadth of shooting the man, when at this critical juncture a customer stepped in.

Dr. Patton followed McNary out as he went to look for a policeman, saying:

"See here; this must remain a secret between us. I've got to have money and you've got to get it for me or you are a dead man."

In a few minutes Capt. Dille had him under arrest and before Recorder Goodell. He was bound over in the sum of \$500 bail and was sent to the county jail. Dr. Patton is evidently a dangerous man to be abroad.

Dr. Patton lives in North Salem, has a nice family, is badly involved in debt, and has been addicted to the use of whiskey and opium.

CITY OVERFLOW.

The North Mill Creek Dam Too High—A Stream Pouring Over North High Street.

The Milling Co., in rebuilding the dam on North Mill creek between High and Church streets, got it too high, and the street being flooded a small stream is turned out over property along the creek. It can be easily remedied by lowering the dam a foot or so. Superintendent Shiel was seen this morning by the residents of that portion of the city, and he promised to have it fixed by erecting an embankment.

This part of the city was high and dry during the great flood in February, 1890, and no danger is feared at present from the water.

Commissioners in November Session Dispatch a Large Trist of Public Business.

THURSDAY FORENOON.

John Moore allowed \$8 per month; J. M. Brown agent to disburse same. Petition of J. P. Graham, et al, for bridge on stage road east of Woodburn, referred to city council of Woodburn as it is in city limits.

Petition of J. S. Graham, et al, for county bridge on road from Woodburn to Monitor Mills, granted, and Nick Miller ordered to build same.

Petition for county road from northeast corner Geo. Neal d. l. e., road first time.

Petition for location of county road from Drift Creek road to Salem and Silverton road, dismissed without prejudice.

AN IMPORTANT CASE.

The case of Elliott, appellant vs. Oliver, respondent, involves the constitutionality of the act of the legislature creating the office of recorder of conveyance for Union county. It has been argued and submitted. This is an important case and affects the office of recorder of conveyance in all the counties of the state except Multnomah. Elliott, who was elected recorder of Union county in June, 1890, brings a mandamus proceeding against Oliver, the county clerk, to recover possession of certain records of the county which Oliver refuses to deliver to him on the ground that the act of the legislature creating the office of recorder of conveyance is contrary to Sec. 15, Art. 7, of the constitution, and therefore null and void. The claim of Oliver's counsel is that inasmuch as the constitution provides that whenever the number of votes in any county shall exceed 1200 the legislative assembly may authorize the election of one person as clerk of the circuit court, one person as clerk of the county court, and one person as recorder of conveyances; the office of county clerk cannot be disturbed in any other way; and that the attempt of the legislature to take from that office a part of the duties and give to the recorder, leaving the office of clerk in existence is contrary to the constitution. Appellant was given twenty days in which to file brief, and the court intimated that owing to the importance of the question any other person directly interested in the question might file a brief.
