

retreated out of sight in the foliage. The groans of the negro were fearful. Smaller snakes were so common as to attract attention. The negroes were but little above barbarians, and went about without clothing when at work. The head over, a half breed, lashed them at will, sometimes until they fell fainting from loss of blood. If a negro died the body was thrown into the forest to be devoured as the cheapest way of burial. The Englishmen were not lashed, and worked as if they pleased, being sick in part of the time. They were also promised wages and a farm in an indefinite future. Hutchins and his companion made their escape, and tried to follow the line of the river, hoping to meet one of the boats that sometimes passed. The first night they tried to sleep in a tree, but were kept awake by the roars of a jaguar. In the morning as they were beginning to descend one fell and broke one of his legs. Hutchins remained by him until he died a few hours later death being caused by apparent weakness and agony of mind. Hutchins gathered leaves to cover the body, which rapidly decomposed, but he soon saw a large vulture hovering and descend on the corpse; then other vultures came, and were so rapacious that Hutchins saw that it would be dangerous to interfere. They soon devoured the body before his eyes, the bones being picked clean. After the vultures had gone, Hutchins covered the bones as well as possible, and found his way to the plantation. He claimed that he and Wilson had wandered off accidentally, and, as he persistently refused or failed to work, he was eventually released and sent back by river to Para whence he was returned to England.

QUEER CASE OF LOCKJAW.
MARYSVILLE, Cal., Nov. 14.—Wm. E. Berlein, Jr., 21 years of age, who was married a few weeks ago, was recently scratched on the hand by a pet fowl. The hand swelled considerably, but the swelling after a time disappeared. The hand again became swollen and he placed himself under a doctor's care. Wednesday night he retired apparently as well as usual, but about 10:30 o'clock was attacked with violent spasms and lockjaw. Two doctors were hastily summoned and finally had him so that he was able to speak. While in spasms it took several able-bodied men to hold him down on the bed. The doctors say he had a very close call but now will probably recover.

ALL QUIET IN BRAZIL.
WASHINGTON, 14.—The Brazilian minister this morning received a cablegram from the minister of foreign relations at Rio Janeiro stating that the news of the secession of Rio Grande or any other state is untrue and that perfect peace prevails. Governor Costilhos has resigned at the request of the people and provisional junta is organized. Tranquility is re-established and public opinion is satisfied.

THE ANARCHISTS.
CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—When the hearing of the anarchist cases was resumed this morning a number of prisoners were fined nominal sums for carrying concealed weapons, and one took a change of venue.

HOG PRODUCTS.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—The chief of the bureau of statistics reports the total value of exports of beef and hog products from the United States during October was \$8,396,845.

DYING OF FAMINE.
ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 14.—Hundreds of persons are dying daily from influenza in the famine stricken districts and in large towns in the south of Russia.

Senior Montt is Presented to the President.

REBELLIOUS INDIANS.

From Brazil, A Lucky Find, Hog Products, W. C. T. U., Family Burned Alive, Captain Troup Resigns, Important Decision, Foreign and State News etc.

SENIOR MONTT IS PRESENTED.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Senior Montt, the Chilean minister, was formally presented to the president this a. m. by the secretary of state. In his address Senior Montt said: "The object of the mission which the government of Chile has confided to me is to cultivate and maintain in the relations of peace and friendship between the United States and Chile which have ever been cordial." In response President Harrison said: "The presence of the representative of the government of Chile at this capital will, I hope, tend to promote the good understanding between the two governments and an early settlement upon terms just and honorable to both of the diplomatic questions now somewhat urgently awaiting adjustment. The government of the United States as well as its people particularly desire and rejoice in the prosperity of our neighbors on this hemisphere. We hear with sorrow every fresh tale of internal strife and are always ready to give our friendly offices to the promotion of peace. If these are not acceptable to our policy to preserve honorable and strict neutrality, as we have done during the recent war in Chile."

REBELLIOUS INDIANS.
PIERRE, S. D., Nov. 14.—The remnants of Big Foot band of Indians numbering some 60 families are in open revolt against the agent at Cheyenne agency. The Indians have left the agency and stated they are going to Pine Ridge agency to reside. A force of Indian police has been dispatched to bring them back without fail.

FROM BRAZIL.
BALTIMORE, Nov. 14.—Telegrams touching the political disturbance in Brazil is given little confidence by a large Baltimore coffee house. Robert Levering is in receipt of cables from there positively denying the existence of any trouble in Rio Grande del Sul.

LUCKY FIND.
WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 14.—Thomas A. Joseph and William Jones, little boys, found on Wednesday about \$900 in gold and silver hidden in a hole on the border of a wood near Miner's mills. They were scraping away some dirt to build a little fort, when they came on the money. Their discovery gives rise to two questions, one involving the guilt or innocence of a man now in prison, and the other forming an interesting point about a celebrated murder five months ago. Henry Myers, a driver for Richards & Co., came into town and told a startling story of having been held up by highwaymen near Miner's mills and relieved of a large sum of money belonging to his employers. His story was not believed, and he was arrested, tried for larceny, convicted and sentenced to three years which he is now serving. He now says that the money found by the boys is the sum stolen from him and hidden by the highwaymen. Why they should bury it is not explained, but his attorneys are investigating, and hope to prove that Myers is innocent. The other story is that the money is part of the booty of the McClure murder. It was found within a mile of the scene of the crime. Captain Linden, who was engaged on the McClure case, discovered that not all of the \$1200 stolen had been taken to Italy by Bevineno and Vellata, and "Redneck" Mike, just before he was hanged, said there was some money still hidden. The little boys have advertised in legal form, and should no owner be found, they will keep the money.

NATIONAL W. C. T. U.
BOSTON, Nov. 14.—Four thousand people packed Tremont temple yesterday, when the world's convention of national W. C. T. U. was called to order by Miss Willard. In the annual address Miss Willard paid a glowing tribute to the individual and collective work of the members. Miss Willard said: "That party which unmistakably declares for the prohibition of strong drink in its political platform in 1892 is the only one that can hope for the good will, the good words, and the prayers of the W. C. T. U. We called that banner to the mast in '84, and sink or swim, live or die, survive or perish, we will keep it waving." Report of treasurer showed the receipts of the year to be \$23,317. At the afternoon session the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Buell of Connecticut, reported that at this convention fifty-one states and territories are represented. This year the membership is 153,492; the gain over last year is 10,360. The introduction of delegates to the world's convention and various reports completed the afternoon session.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 14.—At today's session of the convention of the National W. C. T. U. there was announced that a telegram was received last night from the governor of Washington, asking that the next convention should be held in Seattle.
FAMILY BURNED ALIVE.
COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 14.—One of the most disastrous fires in years, from the fact that an entire family was consumed, occurred here early yesterday in a row of tenement houses on North High street. The exact origin of the fire remains a mystery, but on the first alarm flames were seen shooting from the roof, licking up everything within reach. The firemen endeavored to enter the rooms, but the dense smoke made this impossible. One of the captains did get partially inside of the buildings, but was pulled out again nearly suffocated. Two hours were consumed in gaining control of the flames, and long ere that every person was supposed to have escaped. Such, however, was not the case. It was nearly 4 o'clock in the afternoon when a little girl living in the neighborhood with childish curiosity rummaged through the ruins and found a naked arm, which led to a search and the ultimate discovery of five bodies burned to a crisp and beyond recognition. The entire family of Charles Rehder was destroyed, while sleeping in a room eight by fourteen feet in the second story. The firemen were summoned and took up the second search. What they discovered was horrifying. In that small room were three beds, a cradle, a stove and a bureau. Near the door lay the father with the infant clasped in his arms. It was evident that he had awakened to the true realization of the danger and had started out with the child when overcome by the heat. The mother, kneeling near the head of the bed, was half buried beneath the falling roof. The two girls slept as they had retired in their little cot. All of the bodies, with the flesh dropping from the bones, were removed to the corner's. The fire is supposed to have been of incendiary origin, as two suspicious characters were seen after the damage was done. The room was only ten feet from the ground, and the entire family might have been rescued.

CAPTAIN TROUP RESIGNS.
PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—Captain J. W. Troup, superintendent of the Union Pacific water line, has resigned that position. He has been connected with the water service for about sixteen years, in which time he worked his way up from purser to the superintendency of the entire Pacific coast. Captain Troup will be succeeded by Captain B. R. Pegram, who is a comparative stranger here, having spent his time on the Mississippi river. He is an old steamboat man.

IMPORTANT DECISION.
CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 14.—An important decision was rendered in the United States circuit court here yesterday. Sometime ago the council passed an ordinance reducing the price of gas from one dollar to sixty cents per thousand. The gas company went into court and asked relief, asserting that the proposed reduction would mean virtual confiscation of their property. Judge Jackson granted the injunction, holding that the city had no right to fix the price of articles of which it was a consumer, and that its action would impair the validity of the contract made with the gas company.

FOUND GUILTY.
PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—The proprietors of the Astorian Town Talk recently indicted for sending lottery matter through the mails by the Federal grand jury pleaded guilty today in the United States court. They were fined fifty dollars.

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A VISIT TO AN ANIMAL PAINTER.
An artist's workshop that resembles a museum because of its contents.
J. H. Dolph's studio is one of those great, ugly houses called studio buildings, ever so many stories high, which rich men build for artists to live in, if they can pay a good high rent. If you were to see one you would know with out being told that it is not an ordinary house, for it has great, high windows, each one as large as three or four of the windows in your house.
And when Mr. Dolph's door is open to you you think of some fairy tale you have read, perhaps of some kindly spirit who takes the unfortunate prince through gloomy, dark passages, and then at the "Open Sesame" brings her suddenly into a beautiful palace; for here, once in the studio, you think that you are in one of the rooms of some old palace away in Europe.

Here are beautiful eastern carpets in the soft, rich colors which artists love: great, high backed chairs, all carved, brought from Italy, chairs on which knights and ladies have sat hundreds of years ago, old, curious musical instruments, which make you wonder what they would sound like and how they were played; a carved chest, which some old Venetian noble gave to his daughter filled with brocaded dresses and dresses of cloth of gold and silver, table linen and so on, not forgetting the little silver casket filled with money and jewels, her wedding dowry when she was married, perhaps 400 years ago; guns, swords, daggers, pistols, from Arabia, Persia and other faraway countries, of curious shape and so wonderfully wrought and inlaid with gold and silver and precious stones as to make you wonder why tools for killing people were made so beautiful.

But the funniest things are behind an old Spanish screen of many folds, where you might think the artist's wife keeps her gowns—for skirts and robes hang there, so many that she might change her dress three times a day for a month. But should Mr. Dolph give you permission to take them down and examine them you would know that she does not wear them, and that any body who should nowadays would be well laughed at, for they were all made for people who died before your great-grandmother was born.

I fancy that some of you think this must be a museum. Well, yes, in one way it is, because the things are all curious and interesting and out of the way. But a museum is a place where people go to look at things, and this is a place where everything you see is made of use. "Why," you say, "Mr. Dolph does not dress up in these funny dresses and wear armor and carry these odd shaped guns and pistols?" Oh, no; but he paints them in his pictures. They are his patterns—that is, they are the things he works from, just as the plans and sketches and photographs in an architect's workshop are the architect's models.

That is the reason why in France a studio is called an atelier, which is French for workshop.—W. L. Fraser in St. Nicholas.

A Peculiarity of One Author.
A great point about Laurence Oliphant, which is fit to make one have some patience with the artist's performances, is that he never lost his character. He never even lost his friends. Whether he was his own man in London, or Harris' man in Brocton or Paris, he was always a person of integrity and of fascinating qualities. He was trusted and was fit to be trusted up to the day of his death. That he should have retained through life the affection of those who knew him best, the lively interest of all who knew him at all, and this in spite of the extraordinary things he did, means a good deal.

For all that he lost a good deal of his money, and much agreeable society and domestic comfort that should have been his; in spite even of the fact that his latest books are all but incomprehensible—it is not clearly established that his life was such a pitiable waste as some commentators upon it have thought.—Scribner's.

America Leads in Inventions.
No nation on the face of the globe is so fortunate in its patents and inventions as the United States, and the number of queer and useful articles of human contrivance recorded at the patent office at Washington is far in excess of the same class of products of any other civilized country. The wood carvers and workers in bronze and metal of Switzerland and Germany, and the skillful natives of old Japan and Chinese novelties present a marvelous variation of certain types of conventional articles which are admired the world over, but for pure, original inventions the Americans take first rank.—George E. A Remarkable Scrap Book.
One of the most carefully guarded possessions of the United States treasury is a scrap book that is always kept shut up in a massive burglar proof safe in the bureau of engraving and printing. Scarcely any one has ever seen it save high officials of the department.
