A CLEVER JAILBREAKER

A Hindoo Getaway Who Was Really Able and Could Give Most Men Points.

For some months Rajoo Koh, a notorious robber, behaved well. His devoted wife then appeared and petitioned for some jewels, which she said were her own property. Any how, she loitered about, and it is said she had an interview with him. Whether she helped or not in what happened afterward is best known to those who must have assisted our native Jack Sheppard in his wonderful escape. It is asserted that at 5 p. m. he was locked up in one of the solitary cells, which had an iron barred door and walls sixteen feet high, with a battlement and Mangalore tiled roof. The next morning Rajoo was not out. His escape was no mystery when the mode was carefully examined.

He appears to have been provided with a light rope some twenty-two feet long, which is usually used for the weaving loom. To this was knotted a tape from his pyjama. At the end of the tape he is supposed to have tied his cap with a little mud in it, and had it thrown it so as to pass between the beam of the roof and the tiles. By a little shaking the weighted cap brought down this end of the rope with in reach. When all is quiet he appears, or is said to have swarmed up the rope and most professionally removed the heavy tiles, placing them carefully one on top of the other. When the hole was sufficient to admit his body he got through and drew the rope after him to assist in getting down from the roof.

When this feat was accomplished he had to circumvent the watchers and clear the inner and outer walls and pass the sentries. Nothing daunted, he appears to have made for the central tower by getting out of his own ward, wriggled into the hospital ward and made for the outer ward at the back of the hospital. Here he placed an iron pot against the wall, but found he was too short to reach the top with its aid, so went to the building and wrenched off one of the shutters of a window, thereby procuring nails, which he fixed in the wall to assist in getting on the top. This was easily accomplished. To descend on the other side was nothing for him, but the next question was a more serious one—that was, surmounting the outer wall, which varied from eighteen to twenty feet in height.

Even this had been thought of, as he walked half around the jail to the blacksmith's shop, situated between the outer and inner walls, where he forced open the chest, armed himself with an implement sufficient for his purpose, and next proceeded to the superintendent's office, which is next to the sepoys' guard room. The padlock offered little resistance. The contents of the prisoners' property box were soon ransacked. Appropriating fifty rupees in cash and rigging himself out in the best suit of clothes of under trial prisoners, he proceeded to the outer wall, where he must have been some time listening to the footsteps of the sentinel, and at the same time working through the wall with his blacksmith's implement during the interval between the sentry's visits.

At last, when all but through, his keen hearing pointed to the time for the removal of the last impediment, and he was free, with forty rupees in his pocket and a good suit of clothes to his back.

Thus ended a well planned, skillful and daring escape, much to the chagrin of the jail authorities and the contingent guard, whose sentry shortly afterward stumbled over the debris accumulated on his footpath, which had not been there when he last passed that way.—Allahabad (India) Pioneer.

How to Shoot Kangaroos.

Shooting kangaroos with a rifle requires a large degree of skill. On the flat plains the animals "loom" in an extraordinary manner, and it is only after much practice that one unaccustomed to measuring distances over these unrelieved areas can get their range. Sighting, for instance, at 500 yards, the tyro will be likely to see his bullet kick the dust 200 yards short of the mark, and the kangaroo, alarmed at the whistle of the missile on the ricochet, making off at express train rate in the distance. The surest way to bag kangaroo at long range is to put your sights up for the greatest distance at which the rifle is gauged, and gradually lower it until the bullets take effect.

A kangaroo will stand a lot of firing at in this way, and although he will look up as each shot sings above him, seems to consider it some strange insect or other, and directly resumes feeding. The "ping" of a rifle bullet that comes over him without interruption is quite different to the noise made by a ball on the rebound, and while he will take alarm from the latter the former has little disquieting effect upon him.—Boston Journal.
