PECULIAR DEATH.—Miss Lou
Chandler, daughter of Thos. Chan-
dler, who lives just across the river
from Independence, died Nov. 18,
1891, at midnight, from injuries re-
ceived by a lamp explosion little
over a week ago. The gentleman
who came to Salem with the news
to inform some friends gives an ac-
count of the peculiar and sad ac-
cident: "It seems that a young gen-
tleman by the name of Mr. Dugger,
was paying his respects to this
young lady, and until late in the
evening they remained in talking,
and in some unaccountable way the
young lady's dress caught fire, and
every effort was made to extinguish
the flames, when failing in this, the
girl dashed into the yard, the wind
kidding anew the flames when at
last her father with a bucket of
water managed to put the fire out.
She was badly burned nearly all
over her body. Mr. Chandler and the
young gentleman, Mr. Dugger, were
also badly burned."

WHO MAY PRACTICE?

A Supreme Court Decision of Great
Interest to Physicians.

The supreme court of Oregon has
rendered a decision, (see elsewhere)
of great importance to physicians—
that of Wm. A. Barnore against the
state board of medical exami-
ners.

THE CASE.

Dr. Barnore had been refused a
certificate by the board upon showing
he was a graduate of the medical
department of the university of
Ohio and had a diploma from a
legally chartered medical school
in good standing, and was refused
upon the ground that the Oregon
State board had adopted a rule
which defined "medical institution
in good standing," as used in the
act to mean, "only those institutions
which required three regular courses
or sessions of six months each, ex-
tending over a period of three years
time," and that the school of plain-
tiff did not when he graduated have
such a three years' course.

If Dr. Barnore had applied before
the board adopted this rule he could
have been admitted to practice in
Oregon.

Dr. Barnore asked a mandamus
to compel the state board to issue a
certificate and won his case in the
circuit court. This is now reversed
by the supreme court and the state
board of examiners sustained.

THE STATE FAIR.

Arrangements Completed—Grounds
and Buildings—Election of
Officers—Fruit Palace.

The state board of agriculture con-
cluded its annual session late
Wednesday night.

THE PREMIUM LISTS

were thoroughly revised and cor-
rected, as is necessary from year to
year. The society paid out more for
premiums the past year than ever
before and euroached \$700 upon its
general fund for this purpose. The
exhibits in all departments were
more complete in 1891 than ever
before. The fair for 1891 was a de-
cided financial success.

Apperson is also a member of the
committee.

Financial committee: V. B. de
Lashmutt, J. G. Wright and D. S.
Bulck.

J. Q. Wilson was made superin-
tendent of grounds.

NEW IDEAS.

The state poultry growers were
represented by a committee and
secured a sweepstake premium of
\$20 first, and \$10 second for biggest
displays. This will increase the
poultry display a great deal.

HORSES AND RACES.

The speed program for 1892 was
arranged for each day, nominations
to close June 1, 1892, by payment of
5 per cent. of purse; final payment
to be made at 6 p. m. the day before
the race and three to start.

In running races nominations are
to close Aug. 1, 1892, with a payment
of 5 per cent. of the purse; the bal-
ance to be paid at 6 p. m. the day
before the race and three to start.

In running races takes five full
paid up entries to fill.

FRUIT PALACE.

A committee of the Marion County
Fruit Growers' association addressed
the board in relation to a fruit
palace for 1892, and the board ap-
propriated \$300 for this purpose. It
is offered in shape of a first and sec-
ond premium of \$200 and \$100.
There are quite likely to be two pal-
aces next year as several parts of the
state manifest a disposition to come
to the state fair with a fruit palace
display. This region will have to

exert itself to capture the honors
again as it did in 1891.

IMPROVEMENTS.

In the coming year there will be
a great improvement on the grounds.
More land will be cleared up. The
east entrance will be abolished and
the restaurant will all be moved
out of the enclosure. An agricul-
tural implement hall will be built
where the fruit palace now stands,
at least forty by one hundred feet.
All improvements made will be with
a view to permanency. The little
campers' houses will be re-
quired to be more neat, and a gen-
eral spirit of enterprise has taken
hold of the board.

THE NOSS JOLLITIES.—The Noss
family gave a first class perform-
ance at the opera house last night.
The mandolin orchestra was the
first on program sufficient to satisfy
the audience that the performers
were thorough musicians. The mu-
sical bottles, saxophones, oboes, opo-
carinas, East India piano, and
many other novelties were brought
into use. Miss Bertha, who as a
bass drummer, vocalist and manip-
ulator of the various instruments
used in the "Sleigh Ride Party,"
was loudly applauded. The cate-
manner in which she beat the bass
drum with her foot was noted by all.
She is a musical genius, crowned
with a lovely face, and graceful ac-
tions. The other members of the
company deserve special mention,
but as lack of space will not admit
it, we will say that they were ex-
cellent and the best in their line
that has visited Lexington.—Trans-
cript.

ELECTRIC EXTENSIONS.—The
Electric company is making pro-
gress soliciting its subsidy in South
Salem. That part of the city was
its first opportunity to make a ten
strike and it should improve it.
The JOURNAL has not a cent of in-
terest in any car line, but is a firm
believer in the value of such improve-
ments. The Electric company will
build south if it is helped. This is a
local organization. It is not foreign
capital, but a metropolitan home
enterprise and the city's best adver-
tisement. Many are giving lib-
erally to the South Salem subsidy and
3 cent fares to Rural cemetery would
make a wonderful change in that
part of the city.

in the city. An officer was sent to
arrest Mr. Nobles.
