THE WHEAT CRISIS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 21.—Secretary Friedlander of the produce exchange and call board association in an interview this morning regarding the probable effect on the wheat market of the Russian Ukase prohibiting the export of wheat said: The opinion is advanced by some speculators that the Ukase has been expected for so long a time that its effect now will not be so great as at first anticipated. As to its effect here this market usually follows that of London on which Europe also depends. Liverpool and London are now dependent on New York and Chicago as the United States at present holds the wheat. If New York and Chicago advance London and Europe will follow. The San Francisco market in now in a peculiar condition. Market has cornered itself without manipulation by reason of the scarcity of wheat and almost unprecedented abundance of ships available for wheat carrying for this reason the market has been and must continue to be strong.

BECOMING REASONABLE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Special dispatches from Valparaiso say that Chili has at length conceded a point to the United States in her treatment of the assault upon the Baltimore sailors. Captain Schley yesterday received a notice granting his request that the United States representatives be furnished by the court of inquiry with copies of all depositions made before it in the investigation. It will be remembered that this same request had been absolutely refused on all previous occasions. It is supposed that the Chilean authorities, finding that our government was maintaining a fair but firm attitude, has determined to meet it half-way. It has become known here and in Santiago, that the United States was dispatching a large number of war ships to the Pacific squadron, and there is no doubt that this news had a salutary effect in Chili.

The electoral college unanimously voted for Admiral J. M. McKean as president of the republic yesterday.

A large fire occurred in Santiago Wednesday, destroying several buildings facing the Municipal theatre. The destruction of the theatre was seriously threatened at one time.

STATE.

OUTRAGE AT ASTORIA.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 21. Sheriff Smith this afternoon arrested thirty-two men charged with complicity in the outrage committed on the British ship Bucechan at the Union Pacific dock last night. About fifty men boarded the vessel and attempted to coax the sailors ashore. Failing in that, they became abusive, and used threats. Finally Captain Johansen locked all his sailors in the cabin for protection. The intruders then went through the forecastle, took all they could get in the way of sailor's clothing and effects. The men arrested this afternoon were taken to the county jail. Twenty-two of them were released, being unidentified. The complaint was sworn to regarding the other ten. They will be given a preliminary examination before a justice of the peace today.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT HIMSELF.

EUGENE, Or., Nov. 21.—A lad of 11 years named Bluebecker, who resides on McKeanzie river, accidentally shot himself with a rifle Wednesday evening, inflicting a serious wound in the side. The bullet was a .22 calibre, and is lodged in his side. He was found in the road in a critical condition.
