A GROWING INDUSTRY.—A few

the Salem Iron Works and was
then surprised to find not only the
usual departments, composed of the
foundry, machine, blacksmith, and
pattern shops in full blast, but also
an entirely new departure in the
shape of a millinery department.
They are now successfully manufac-
turing the Wahlstrom purifier which is
one of the best machines for its pur-
pose on the market. One was
recently put into the mills at
Albany by this firm, and it is re-
ported to give the greatest satisfac-
tion. These machines are hand-
somer furnished in redwood and
ash, making a very neat appearance,

ment for the capital city. This new
department of the Salem Iron
