

had no liberty since the middle of August until the day of the massacre, and were only granted it then after the captain requested the police to protect the men in case of any trouble on shore. The men went ashore and strolled about in a quiet and orderly manner. About 6 o'clock Boatwain's Mate Riggins, one of the best men in the crew, had some words with a 'chillie' sailor. Another of the Baltimore men came up and said something, when the Chilian spat in his face and was promptly knocked down. This started the row, and soon the two men were surrounded by a crew of Chilian sailors, roughs and boatmen, outnumbering them forty to one. Riggins was stabbed and sunk to the ground, and the other man, fearing a like fate, started to run, but was pursued and stabbed in the back seven times. Another man came along and picked Riggins up to carry him away, when a squad of police fired. A bullet passed through the shirt of the man holding Riggins, and, piercing the latter's neck, lodged under the shoulder blade. The man, seeing the brutes loading again, dropped Riggins and ran. The next board of Riggins he was seen in a cart dying, while a crowd of Chilians applied epithets. He died in a short time. The Baltimore officers found people who could identify the policeman who did the shooting. About 7 p. m. another man was brought off, stabbed twice in the back, one wound penetrating the lung. All night a howling mob was after the Baltimore sailors, and caught them and brutally beat and stabbed them. There were a number in the hospital badly wounded when the letter was written, and a number who escaped with slight cuts and bruises. In fact as the young officer said, the sick list the day after the affair was bad enough for a regular battle. He expressed the utmost indignation, saying the affair was brutal and cowardly. He is sure our boys were set on without warning, and says: "Don't lose sight of the fact that Riggins was shot by a policeman while dying from a stab wound." Several other men, while running to save their lives, were cut at by officers with swords. Men were held up and robbed in broad daylight in the streets of Valparaiso, and one of the Baltimore's officers, while walking down to the landing, was spit at. Besides all this there were a dozen other things, such as spitting at the flags of the Baltimore boat while at the landing, kicking the men in the boats, etc. The night of the fight one man was so hard pressed that he jumped off the landing, and stones were thrown at him while he was in the water. When a boat from an American merchant ship tried to pick him up, it was driven back. The young officer adds that from all reports the police abetted the whole affair.

MURDER AND SUICIDE!

Two Men Shot at McMinnville Sunday.

A WELLKNOWN OREGON JOURNALIST.

The Tennessee Convict Labor War, Stock Broker Failure, Fatal English Explosion, Troubles at Rio, Situation at Pekin, Cattle Trade With Canada, Indian Hostilities, Etc.

MURDER AND SUICIDE AT McMINN- VILLE.

McMinnville, Ore., Nov. 30.—J. H. Stine, editor of the Whiteson Advance, was shot last evening by H. C. Cook, section boss on the Narrow Gauge railway. Cook then shot himself twice. Both men were killed instantly. The circumstances of the crime were these, Stine, Cook and a German section hand had been to Amity on foot a distance of three miles from Whiteson. When about half way back on their return, Stine walked about ten feet in advance of the others, Cook quickly and without warning drew a pistol and fired at Stine, striking him in the back of the neck and breaking the spinal column. Turning his pistol on himself, he fired one shot into his breast missing the heart by about two inches. Still standing on his feet, he then placed the pistol to his temple and fired the second shot through his brain. The section hand thinking his time was also come, started to run at the first shot and did not stop until he got to Whiteson. A squad of men returned and found both men dead.

THE CAUSE.

No cause is known for the deed except it be a sudden fit of mental aberration. Cook had been acting singular for several days. The section hand with them said he had taken but two drinks of whiskey during the day and showed no signs of intoxication. The men were good friends and always on the best of terms. They were talking pleasantly at the time of the shooting.

BOTH VETERANS.

They were both about 48 years of age and both veterans in the civil war. Nothing is known of Cook's family relations. He was brought here by the coroner last night and hundreds viewed his remains today. Stine leaves a wife and one child. He had been connected with papers at Independence, Grant's Pass, St. Heles and other points. He will be buried at Independence.

THE CONVICT LABOR WAR.

NASHVILLE, Nov. 30.—"The convicts shall be returned to the mines if it takes every able-bodied man in the state to do it," said Governor Buchanan last night. The lessees have made a demand upon the state for the convicts. This demand he answered promptly, that when the convicts are captured they will be returned, if supplied with sufficient guards and proper quarters. Proper quarters will be built at once. This will take about two weeks. The guard will not be taken from the existing militia companies of the state, but men will be enlisted for the purpose about 300 of the 672 of released convicts have been captured.
