casting lots at the initial meeting of
the new council.

WHAT IT MEANS.

An earnest, enterprising, aggres-
sive policy of public improvements
is badly needed by this city. In the
recent election all party and personal
considerations had to be laid aside
to emphasize this fact. The result
was not a political victory but a
blow for progress.

PAVING CONTRACT CANCELLED

The Bays-Jeffries Co. of Salem Re-
leased Without Expense to
the City.

A reporter saw a member of the
paving firm today who said:

"The Bays-Jeffries Co. of Salem
has signed up a release to the city
that cancels the gravel paving con-
tract. The contract was let under a
good many complications and these
are now obliterated. Under the
gravel contract special contracts
could be made for bitumen, but it
will be a great deal better to have a
uniform system provided for the
city. The bonds, agreements and
contract of the Bays-Jeffries Co.
are now returned by the city and at
no expense to the city. If work is
done on the streets of a permanent
character it should be done under
contract. If gravel is to be put on,
that can be done by the city or
property owners in the old way
without any contract."
