COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY'S SESSION.

In the matter of the assessment of the Salem Building and Loan Association, hearing continued until the 9th.

In the matter of the petition of S. P. Costello, for a saloon license in North Salem; objection to remonstrance to be heard today and petition Dec. 11th.

E. Schott granted liquor license in Sublimity precinct.

Kruschick & Schreiber granted right to build tramway along county road near Gervais.

Mrs. Johns was allowed \$8 per month for expenses Philip Fleichman, a pauper.

Lewis Warren was admitted to the poor farm.

D. O. Hearn, Henry Shrum, and Daniel E. Carley were appointed viewers and W. C. Culver surveyor to meet Monday, Dec. 21st to view a relocation of a part of the Salem and Macleay road through the donation land claim of Philip Glover.

Wm. Hillery, N. Silvers and H. W. Smith were appointed viewers and W. J. Culver surveyor to locate road commencing at the southwest corner of d l c of Geo. Neal and leading to the county road east of the railroad near where the railroad crosses the Santiam river. The view will be made on Friday, the 18th.

Report of viewers read first time in the location of a county road from the southwest corner of section 8, t 8 s, r 3, w to the Salem and Prospect hill road.

Same proceedings in relocation of county road leading from Salem to Brooks where said road crosses the railroad track near the fair grounds to the north line of sec. 30, t 8 s, r 2 w.

The report of the viewers of the road petitioned for in Yew park was read the first time, as was also the report of the viewers of the steel bridge.

SECOND DAY'S RECORD. Commissioner Grimm arrived, full court in attendance.

In application of S. P. Costello for liquor license in North Salem, objections to remonstrance overruled. Petition to be heard at 11 a. m. Friday.

Mrs. Boon allowed \$10 additional for December, D. Simpson to disburse.

In matter of bridge across North Mill creek on Liberty street, county assumes half expense.

Application of Salem Building and Loan association for rebate on taxes, dismissed for want of jurisdiction.

Petition of W. I. Henderson et al for election precinct continued to January, '92.

Application of J. J. Ryan to sell liquor in Butteville precinct granted. Monthly allowance of Company A, O. N. G., suspended until accounts are adjusted.

Petition of R. O. Thomas for vacation of First street from north side C street to intersection of B street, and B street from east side alley through block 5 to intersection First street, Turner, dismissed. No jurisdiction.

FOR PROGRESS.—Mayor D'Arcy in his last annual message committed himself to a policy of public improvements to which we believe he will stand. The councilmen elected at Monday's election are committed to such a policy. This ensures progress for Salem. That issue is vital to Salem's business and real estate interests, and that is all involved in this election.
