UNSKILLFUL BURGLARS.

Pass Three Pairs of Doors by Force to Find an Empty Till and Safe.

The work of a tyro at burglary, or a drunken thief and housebreaker, created not a little surprise to the people at the Gray Bros' hardware store when they entered it this morning to open up.

Unskillful burglars had bored holes thro' the door jambs opposite the locks of three doors, reaching through and turning the keys. They entered at the alley door of the warehouse, then through two pairs of doors entering the store. The last pair of doors bored through could have been opened by simply slipping the catch locks above and below. They took the money drawer out of a counter in front, took tools off the shelf and broke the till open, but it was empty. They then took padlock keys off themselves and tried to open the safe. The safe had nothing of value in it, all having been deposited up to 4 p.m.

The outside doors of the safe were left unintentionally unlocked, and probably left standing open, which could be plainly seen from the office window fronting on Liberty street. But the inside doors were locked, and padlock keys were of no avail. So the night's work proved unprofitable, and the burglars retired damaging the doors, probably to the extent of \$20. No stock is missing.

THE POLICE
do not believe there are any professionals and this kind of work is proof of it. A professional would have had the contents of that safe, as a few blows from an ax or crowbar might have opened it. A night light would have made the work impossible.

The Free Library.

ED. JOURNAL: I see an article in THE JOURNAL of the 7th inst. speaking of the necessity of a free library in this city, which shall be kept open a portion of every week day. Now that does injustice to our city. Persons reading THE JOURNAL who do not live in Salem would conclude that there was no free library in the city, when the facts are that the W. C. T. U. have maintained a free reading room in Salem for the last five years, at a great deal of expense and sacrifice on their part.

The library contains over four hundred volumes, also many of the best periodicals, including a great number of our state papers, from which strangers can get information about the different localities in which they are published. It is kept open every day in the week from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Every one is made welcome. A registration is made of every one who comes in to read. Thirty-one names were registered yesterday. I think that if the citizens of Salem have a thousand dollars to give to a library they would find it a much better investment to add it to one already well begun than to start a new one. Our matron could care for twice the number of books for the same pay she now gets, and the expense for wood and light would be no greater.
