A VIADUCT TO THE SOUTH.

Mill Creek to be bridged by a Fall
With Railway on a Stone
Arch.

The street committee submitted
plans of the city surveyor to the
council meeting Tuesday night for a
stone or brick arch viaduct on
Commercial street over South Mill
creek.

The plans, if carried out, will ex-
tend the street on its present grade
through the hill, which would be
leveled and used to fill the low part
still further south.

The Electric Railway company
say they will contribute as much
toward such a bridge as it would
cost them to bridge the creek for
their South Salem extension.

THE PLAN.

It shows a full width roadway of cut
stone, one arch spanning the creek,
the whole containing 3000 perch of
stone. It would be a beautiful im-
provement and is petitioned for by
nearly all the property owners of
South Salem. The plan is by E. J.
McCausland.
