A TRIBUTE.

These lines are written in memory of Elsworth Barzee, who died at Lebanon, Or., Sept. 6, 1891, and was buried in Twin Oak cemetery, at Turner, Oregon. He was the eldest son of F. S. and M. E. Barzee. Elsworth had just passed his twenty-first birthday. He graduated from the State Normal school at Monmouth, two years prior to his death. As a pupil he was industrious and zealous, being a favorite with his teachers and schoolmates, because of his intelligence and unvarying gentlemanly deportment. He was a mild of high order, which bade fair to place him in a position of eminence among men. He was honest, generous and brave, a true Christian, a devoted son, a loving brother, and a true friend.
