

him to get off the train, "Come and put me off," he growled in response. Kimmel needed no second invitation, and going up to him showed him off the train. The train was going slowly at the time and the tramp was not hurt. He picked himself up and shook his hat at Kimmel. The latter went about his business and thought nothing about it. The tramp, it seems, boarded the train as soon as Kimmel's back was turned. He seemed to have murder in his heart, for when the train reached St. Mary's bridge, which is sixty feet above the river, he snaked up behind the brakeman and shoved him off the train. Poor Kimmel, with an awful cry, fell headlong into the river, receiving fatal injuries. The tramp has not been arrested, but the officials are on his track.

THEY REFUSE TO SCRUB.
NEWPORT, R. I., Dec. 19.—The 150 apprentices boys at the training station at Coasters Harbor Island refused to scrub the hammocks because the water was icy and the air was freezing, and their health would be endangered. Lieutenant Commander Lyons, in the absence of Captain Bruce, called out the marines, who with fixed bayonets forced the boys to scrub the hammocks. Last night guards were pacing the corridors of the barracks on the island, and all communication with the mainland was forbidden. It is charged that this outbreak is simply the result of resentment of a very rigid and exacting discipline which has prevailed since Captain Higginson's departure.

WOULD NOT BE A NUN.
BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 19.—Miss Lily Elliott, daughter of W. H. Elliott, a wealthy iron merchant, seven years ago entered the Protestant Episcopal Sisterhood of the Visitation, a close religious community connected with the ritualistic element of the denomination. She took the white veil at Mount Calvary Episcopal church in this city and her friends supposed she would spend the rest of her life within the convent walls. They were greatly surprised a few weeks ago to learn that she had returned to her home and was to be married. Yesterday she became the wife of Robert Elliot, the ceremony taking place at the Episcopal church of St. Michael and All Angels. Her father gave her away, and only members of the family were present. One of her sisters is the wife of Bishop Nicholson, of Milwaukee, and the other sister was married only two weeks ago to Lieutenant Schwerin, of the United States navy.

FLORENCE'S ESTATE.
NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—There is to be a contest over the will of the late William J. Florence, the actor, which was filed for probate with the surrogate on Tuesday of this week. It is ascertained that the relatives of Mr. Florence claim that he left a codicil, which has in some manner disappeared. In the will which has been filed, Mrs. Florence is named as the sole executrix, and the entire estate of the dead actor is left to the wife, none of the actor's brothers nor sisters getting so much as a souvenir of him from among his large collection of articles which he picked up during his eventful career. The brothers and sisters of William Florence, whose real name was Conlin, and who was a full brother to Police Inspector Conlin, of this city, profess to be surprised that a codicil to this will has not been found. They say that Mr. Florence repeatedly assured various members of the family, including the inspector, that he made a codicil some time before he was taken ill, in which he had left his relatives properly provided for out of his large means, and had especially made provision for the care of his paralytic brother, John Conlin.

THE CONGRESS.

Some Changes in Committees, no Business Done.

THE OPERATOR'S STRIKE OVER.

Cargo Seized, The Chilean Affair, Half-breeds not Indians, Louisiana Democrats, From Canada, Would not be a Nun, They refuse to Scrub, The Florence Estate, Foreign and State News.

THE CONGRESS.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—It being understood that there would be but a short session of the house this morning, the attendance of members was very small. The report of the committee on rules was presented, empowering the speaker to appoint the committees of the last house with the following changes: Membership of committee on ways and means increased from thirteen to fifteen members; centennial committee, from nine to eleven members; committee on Indian depredation and claims dispensed with, and a committee on commerce changed to committee on rules for state and foreign commerce. A concurrent resolution was agreed to, providing for a holiday recess from Wednesday, the 23d inst., until Tuesday, the 5th of January.

Calo, of Tennessee, offered a resolution for the appointment of a special committee of five members, to inquire into the charge made against the commissioner of pensions and the administration of his office; referred to committee on rules. Chipman, of Michigan, announced the death of his colleague, Melbourne H. Ford, and in respect to the memory of the deceased the house adjourned until Wednesday, with the understanding that on that day no business will be transacted except that referring to recess, resolutions, and to the announcement of committees by the speaker.

THE OPERATOR'S STRIKE.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—There are no new developments in the strike of the Southern Pacific operators. So far as known not a man has left his post in the last twenty-four hours. General Manager Towne says that no further trouble is anticipated. Assistant Superintendent Pratt says every man has now been replaced, and that all offices are running as usual.

AGAINST THE LAW.
PORTLAND, Dec. 19.—The customs authorities have seized about \$28,000 worth of goods belonging to two prominent hardware firms of this city, which were brought to this port on the English bark Ochertyre on an alleged violation of the United States law.

Several days ago the British bark Ochertyre, of 1296 tons register, under command of Captain Harris, arrived at this port direct from Antwerp. She brought considerable cargo, and among the freight was a consignment of hardware to the firm of Honeyman, DeHart & Co., valued at about \$25,000, and also a quantity of similar freight for Knapp, Burrell & Co., valued at \$3000. The goods were shipped from New York, landed at Antwerp, and reshipped to Portland. This practice is in violation of law.

A similar case is now pending before a court in San Francisco.

CARGO SEIZED.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—The cargo of the British ship City of Buenos, from Antwerp, was seized yesterday by the collector of the port. The cargo consisted of nails, iron plates, and other hardware, shipped to San Francisco from New York by way of Antwerp, in violation of section 4347 of the revised statutes.

THE CHILIAN AFFAIR.
LONDON, Dec. 19.—A dispatch to The Times from Santiago, De Chili, states that the publication of the correspondence between the government of Chili and the United States in relation to the assault upon the sailors from the American man-of-war "Baltimore," is completed. The dispatch adds that the public are apparently satisfied with the course pursued by Chili.

PIERRE, S. D., Dec. 19.—Great excitement was created at Pierre and other South Dakota towns by advices from Washington to the Pierre land office that the assistant attorney general had decided that Jane Waldron, a half-breed Indian woman, was born a citizen of the U. S., and her claim that she is an Indian mother cannot be allowed, and she can no longer be permitted to draw rations and annuity or receive land in severalty. Hundreds of half-breeds, like Mrs. Waldron, have occupied all of the choicest and most valuable tracts of the lately-ceded Sioux lands, some of which, lying opposite Pierre, have already advanced many thousands of dollars in value. The South Dakota land office was flooded with applications all day from whites to contest these claims of the half-breeds taken under the severalty act. At least \$1,000,000 is involved.

LOUISIANA DEMOCRATS.
BATON ROUGE, Dec. 19.—The Adams Farmers' Alliance and the anti-lottery combine convention adopted a platform, nominated their

state ticket, provided for the appointment of a new state central committee, and adjourned sine die. The platform adopted declares allegiance to Democratic principles, praises the present state government, and concludes with a declaration of unalterable opposition to lotteries and the adoption of the proposed revenue amendments to the constitution. The combine candidates are now in caucus marking out a plan of campaign.

BATON ROUGE, Dec. 19.—The regular Democratic convention yesterday afternoon nominated Judge S. D. McEnery for governor, and ex-Governor Robert Wickliffe for lieutenant governor, amid wild enthusiasm. A recess was then taken until today.

The Democratic caucus made the following nominations: Secretary of state, Leonard F. Mason; auditor, O. B. Steele; superintendent of education, John V. Calhoun; state treasurer, Gabriel Montegut; attorney general, Edgar W. Sutherland. As these nominations will be confirmed by the convention, the state ticket may be regarded as complete.

FROM CANADA.
QUEBEC, Dec. 19.—A monster mass meeting is being organized by liberals throughout the province. The police are in readiness to march to the official residence of the lieutenant governor to protect it against any hostile demonstration that may be made. The citizens of St. Roch and St. Sauver, especially, are boiling with indignation. Mercier has made public his views on the political situation, and published the correspondence between himself and lieutenant governor and interim report of the royal commission. This report regrets that certain correspondence was not produced, and concludes that it is not proved that Mercier knew of the existence of a bargain between Armstrong and Picaud, and the gentleman declares that he is benefitted in no way thereby.

In his reply to the lieutenant governor, Mercier told the latter he has had the audacity to do what the queen would never dare to do in England without provoking a revolution. Good citizens say he must admit there is a hint to tyranny, and a man, though he be a minister, is not a slave. Mercier charges the lieutenant governor with having carried out the most odious conspiracies ever entered into against the constitutional liberties of a free people. He taunts the governor with a desire to place power in the hands of his political friends against all the rules of decency, and with trampling under foot the dignity of the crown.

HOUSE BLOWN DOWN.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—A two-story frame building in the heart of city known as the Western addition, was blown down this morning by the wind. Owen O'Donald, a hod carrier, was killed; two carpenters were probably fatally injured, and the inmates of the house, Mrs. Krenz and her two daughters, were more or less bruised.

A SENSATION.
READING, Penn., Dec. 19.—A sensation was created in the court house here today by ex-Nightwatchman of the County Prison Reuben Rhoades pleading guilty to releasing from prison Beatrice Collins, a female counterfeiter, and John Miller, a burglar. He made a statement describing the most shocking disorder and drunken carousals in which female prisoners and jail officers participated at night. The court has ordered a full investigation.

THE VESSEL LIEBLED.
PORTLAND, Dec. 19.—United States Prosecuting Attorney Mays this morning filed a libel against the cargo of the British bark Ochertyre for \$28,000. The cargo which was seized by the collector of customs last night consists of hardware which was shipped to Portland from New York by the way of Antwerp in violation of the statute prohibiting shipping of domestic merchandise in foreign vessels between two American ports.

JIM TURK AGAIN.
PORTLAND, Dec. 19.—Jim Turk, the well known sailor boarding house man, turned twenty-five men out of his place, the Garfield house, corner of Thirteenth and S streets, yesterday.

The men are all sailors, who have been staying with him for from three to six weeks. Some of them have been at his house for three months. He has put them out and kept their clothes and belongings, valued, according to their estimates, at about \$500. The trouble all arose over the men refusing to cut wood for the kitchen when told to do so this morning at breakfast.

DIAMOND ROBBERY.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 19.—James Waterman, a young man employed by Schuster Bros., wholesale jeweler, was robbed of a box containing \$20,000 worth of loose diamonds and other precious stones, this morning. But the thieves failed to get away with the gems. Being closely pursued, they threw the box in the street, and made good their escape.

THE SHIP KINKORA.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—The tug Relief will start today for Portland, with the British ship Kinkora in tow. The Kinkora put into port in distress, having lost her top hamper in a gale. The intention was to discharge her cargo of coal here, but she has been ordered north to the port for which she was bound originally.

CHATTS ABOUT MEN.

"Honest" John Bardley's present occupation in the Pennsylvania penitentiary is making pepper boxes. He has gained twenty pounds in weight since his term began.

Judson Smith, D. D., tells the American board of foreign missions that over half the human race are still heathen, and that their number has but slightly decreased during the last 100 years.

D. O. Mills, the banker, is a small and wiry man of about sixty-five, with a bright face and clear blue eyes. He dresses most modestly and does not look as if he had an income of \$1,000,000.

H. P. Chatham, of North Carolina, the only colored member of Congress, is a college graduate, and is said to be the best educated negro, with a single exception, that has yet sat in the house.

Should Kosuth live till Sept. 16, 1892, he will be ninety years old. The Liberal party in Hungary are preparing to celebrate this occasion by presenting him with Dabas, the estate on which his parents are buried.

AROUND THE THRONES.
Ex-King Milan at Belgrade signed a renunciation of all his legal and constitutional rights in Serbia.

Charlotte, the new queen of Wurttemberg, is a young and beautiful woman. She is well read in history and general literature and is a good linguist and a clever musician and artist.

The much talked of Prince Ferdinand of Roumania is a slender man of middle height, with blue eyes, light brown hair and pleasing manner. His character is gentle but by no means soft.

Queen Amelia of Portugal is a stately young woman of twenty-six, who knows and appreciates her position as the daughter of the Comte de Paris and a queen by her marriage to Don Carlos.

Queen Victoria's favorite diversion is driving. She is intensely fond of the open air, and hence in pleasant weather, and especially while residing at her castle at Balmoral, in Scotland, always drives in an open-air carriage, often driving thirty miles or more.
