AN INVITATION.—A circular has been received from a joint committee of the Portland Tammany society and Young Men's Democratic league, outlining arrangements for a convention of all Democratic clubs or societies throughout the state, called for January 8th and 9th, 1892, in the city of Portland. GREAT CHANGES IN SIGHT FOR SALEM.

The indications for building operations at Salem, the coming year are very flattering. Besides an extensive system of street improvement, there will be more new residences built in 1892 than in any previous year. New business buildings already planned and begun include such substantial structures as the Hughes D'Arcy block, the Capital National bank building, the dome to the state house, remodeling of the hall of representatives, G. W. Gray's row, the Commercial street viaduct, and the Friends polytechnic institute. Far beyond these in importance is the reconstruction of the old Salem street railway system from a horse-car line into a steam motor or electric motor road. The new company that expects to take hold of the line in about a month is made up of eastern capitalists and able Salem men, who represent large money and real estate interests. They have the plans all before them for a steam motor line. The new motors are noiseless and smokeless and plans of the company as at present outlined embrace a number of extensions, one notably to the Blair Forward coal mines, about seven miles east of Salem. A company of Salem gentlemen also contemplate enlisting eastern capitalists to bring the immense water power of Silver Creek Falls to Salem in the shape of electric power to operate all kinds of machinery and the Salem street railway. The extension of one mile of the Capital City Electric railway to Rural cemetery in South Salem is about ensured. Perhaps the greatest forward step to make Salem a manufacturing center will be realized when the plans of the Wilcox-Ladd syndicate of Portland are fully known. So much we are permitted to say, and that has leaked out from recent purchases of two blocks of ground on North Mill creek water course, where are located two immense water-powers, one to be utilized as a factory and the other as an immense electric light and power plant. This syndicate has invested \$50,000 in refitting a flouring mill plant at Salem the past year, that had lain idle for months and now requires \$100,000 capital to operate it. They have almost unlimited capital at command and own the immense water power running through the north and south of the city, and they do not propose to allow it to remain unused. Their total proposed investments will not fall short of half a million. Salem has a brilliant future as a manufacturing center and the day is not far distant when the present river front will be one solid barricade of factories. It is not necessary to enlarge upon the very gratifying situation that confronts the capital city.
