MISCELLANY.

REPORTS OF THE STORM. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 30.—Yesterday's storm was unquestionably the heaviest of the season in the Northwest. It spread with equal force over pretty nearly the entire Pacific coast, at least from Montana, and as far south as Tehachapi and to some extent in Southern California.

Accident on the U. P. R. R. PORTLAND, Dec. 30.—Report has just reached here that a wreck occurred on the Union Pacific this morning between Kamela and La Grande, and that a passenger train was reported fatally injured and several passengers seriously hurt.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Dec. 30.—Fast mail train No. 1, on the Union Pacific which left here at 8:30 p. m. last night met with an accident, which caused the death of Engineer R. E. Law, Fireman George Miller, a tramp named Seamski and fatal injuries to another tramp named Siger, when about two miles west of this city.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—There is a death of war news at the department today. Secretary Elkins arrived here this morning, but will not undertake the discharge of his duties as secretary of war just yet.

PORTLAND, Dec. 30.—It will be remembered that on the 27th of November young C. W. Carpenter, an employe of the A. P. Hotaling company, left this city. He forged a check purporting to bear the signature of Isaac Kaufman for \$844, and had it cashed by the bank of British Columbia. Great sympathy was felt at the time for Miss Snell, to whom he was engaged to be married on the first of this month.

It seems that Carpenter was very much in love with a girl in Oakland and had obtained her father's reluctant consent to a wedding on the 28th ult. At 3 o'clock his fiancée received a note from Carpenter, saying that he had seen in the papers a dispatch from Portland that the whole business of his forgery was out, and that he was going to leave for Paris unknown.

FAST MAIL FACILITIES.
