**THEY LOVE OREGON.**—And should love it well enough to obey the laws. Governor Penneyer remitted the fine of \$500 against Thos. E. Russell, convicted of assault with a dangerous weapon upon Dr. J. C. Gray, upon the condition that he should leave the state and remain away permanently. Russell has served about two months of his sentence. Now Russell refuses to accept the pardon, on condition that he leave the state, and has notified the officials. His attorney, L. Blyen, has given notice of the appeal of the case to the supreme court. They all love Oregon. A case in Albany was dismissed on the condition that the man leave Albany, but he didn't leave. A Journal Reporter Mystifies Carl King and Company.

"I can read your mind," said THE JOURNAL man to the dashing mental illusionist Carl King at The Willamette.

The scribe was presented to the Spanish troubadours from Madrid, Don Jose Ramirez, his wife and a willowy dark-eyed niece, Senorita Lemaire. The trio speak English, Italian, Dutch, German, Spanish and French and a number of intervening dialects thrown in.
