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### HIS LAST CRIME.

KELLY, Ia., Feb. 1.—A burglar was discovered in W. C. Davis' store Saturday night by a young man, who gathered a posse of citizens. Armed with shotguns they surrounded the store and demanded the thief to surrender. Receiving no response, one of the party climbed to the roof and lowered a lantern so that the light shone through a rear window into the store. The burglar leaped through the front window, cutting himself badly with the broken glass. He had a large revolver in each hand, with which he opened fire on C. Bodkin, a merchant. The bullet missed its mark and went through a window and through the walls of a frame building. Three or four of the posse fired upon the burglar simultaneously, and with a curse he fell dead in the middle of the street. A loaded revolver was found in his pocket, a belt full of cartridges was around his waist, and in his clothes were more cartridges. Several watches stolen from the store were also found on him. He was met at the station by the reception committee and escorted to the residence of Thomas Semmes whose guest he will be during his brief stay in this city. A reception will be held by the ex-president this afternoon.

**STEAMER WRICKED.**  
LONDON, Feb. 1.—The north German Lloyd's steamer Elder from New York stranded last night near St. Catherine's point. Twelve passengers have been landed by the life boat. Two other life boats have reached the stranded steamer and were giving all the aid possible. The passengers who have already reached the shore report the Elder has sustained no damage. The vessel lies in an easy position.
