BRICE, HILL, GORMAN, ET AL.

A prominent Campbell Democrat

of Ohio says this in the St. Louis

Republic, Dem.:—

"Never before in the history of

the Democratic party of this country

have its destinies apparently

fallen into the hands of men of the

calibre now in control. There is not

a true Democrat in the lot. There

is Calvin S. Brice, a red-headed

Israelite, who comes from a Repub-

lican family, and who slipped over-

board twenty years ago to see who

should be the Democrat and who the

Republican in his firm. The lot of the

Democrat fell to Brice, and he has

been a Democrat ever since, on the

principle that first involved the loss

of the penny. By the questionable

methods of the railroad and stock

sharp, after a speedy existence as a

country lawyer, he made a lucky

strike or two and got into Wall

street.

It was but a short time until he

began to figure on political promi-

nence in Ohio as a sort of an ad-

vertisement for his business. He has

played the Democratic party for a

rank sucker ever since. It is the old

gold brick game. Brice held out

the alluring inducement of a dummy

roll of greenbacks to help the Dem-

ocrats in their Ohio campaign. First,

he was made delegate-at-large to the

St. Louis convention in '88, and

paid for it by organizing a big drunk

on his special train, which landed

the delegates in St. Louis in such a

boozy condition that half of them

were never entirely fitted for the

duties before them. Being then

elected to the National Committee

from Ohio, he was next, upon the

theory that he could raise a large

amount of money, made chairman

of the Executive Committee of the

National Democratic Committee. In

that capacity Mr. Brice's strong

point—treachery, shone out, as

usual, to a marked degree. While

his chairmanship of the National

Committee boomed his stocks the

crowd of sycophants who surrounded

him sold out the secrets of the com-

mittee, abused Grover Cleveland, and

betrayed the cause to the Republi-

cans. In payment for this unex-

emplified piece of duplicity one of

them now holds a lucrative position

under the Republican boss of New

York, and another is making his

fortune at Washington."
