AN ATTACK ON DR. CORWIN.

Of the First Congregational Church—How it is Regarded.

An article in Saturday night's Portland Dispatch makes a personal attack on Rev. C. L. Corwin of the First Congregational church.

A JOURNAL reporter called on Dr. Corwin, Sunday afternoon, showed him the paper, and asked if he desired to make any statement in reply thereto. He said he did not think any reply to the Dispatch necessary, as there was nothing in his past life or that his people here should know all about.

HOW IT IS RECEIVED.
The attack is regarded by the members of the church and many outside the society as weak. From a legal point of view they consider the paper publishing them as almost an irresponsible sheet. They all say that while these publications have been going on for several months, Dr. Corwin's church has been growing stronger, attendance at his meetings is larger than ever, and his Sunday school is the largest by actual count, of any in the city and this does not indicate that the attack, while it has been persistent, is making any unfavorable impression upon the people he serves. He seems to enjoy their unlimited confidence, and they will probably take no notice of the matters sought to be ventilated.

EXPOSED THE FRAUD.

How a Lady Caught One of the Baking Powder Fakers.

The fraudulent character of the methods used to introduce some of the new and inferior baking powders to the housekeepers of this vicinity through bogus chemical tests performed generally by a company of women agents, is fully shown by the following incident: A lady of — street, who had been annoyed by the agents, determined to test the efficacy of the experiments, and she brought out some of the baking powder which they are advertising. The agent submitted the substance to the usual tests and called the lady's attention to the presence of alum, ammonia and other injurious ingredients which could be distinguished by the peculiar odor, the residuum, etc. The lady of course saw all these unmistakable signs of so-called impurities and allowed the agent full swing to expand upon the merits of her own cooking powder. The agent finally inquired of the lady what brand of baking powder she had been experimenting with. "That baking powder," replied the lady, "is the same that you have been cracking up so high." The agent turned all colors and beat a hasty retreat. — street has not been bothered with baking powder agents since.

MURDER AT WILLAMINA.
