STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

High Time Action Looking to Improvements be Taken—The City Council Should Act at Once.

A Journal reporter spent most of the forenoon in short conversations with leading business men of this city and with some of the members of the city council as to the prospects of entering upon a general policy of street improvements, and the result is very favorable. There is a pronounced sentiment in favor of early action. We could give names of scores of owners of frontage and of the heaviest of taxpayers who favor immediate action for the betterment of our principal residence and business streets, but it is not necessary. The matter has been canvassed so thoroughly by the press of this city and by the people, and discussed pro and con, that but little remains but to decide whether there shall be action or inaction. Upon that issue it ought not to take the present city government long to decide. The decision will be for a general forward movement and that decision can be taken tonight by the council as well as any time, and the council should take it. It will be upheld in its action by the entire community.

WHAT SHOULD BE DONE?

That is the question. There is still some disagreement as to what our business streets should be paved with. There is no division on the question that they shall be paved. The council should allow the property owners of our business streets to decide whether they want brick, or asphalt, or broken rock, or Belgian blocks. But where there is disagreement as to the surface paving there is none as to bringing the streets up to grade and properly surfacing them with gravel so that they will be ready to receive whatever the frontage owners may decide to put on. The prevailing opinion among those talked with is that the resident streets of the city can all be graded, curbed and coated with layers of screened gravel, the finest courses on top, and solidly rolled and will make very fine streets for driving in that way, if they are carefully and properly built and the cost of the improvement will not be such but that any residence property can stand the expense.

NOT TOO EARLY.

The streets have been well cleaned and it is none too early to begin the work. A vigorous policy of street improvements inaugurated at once will give Salem a forward movement such as no city in Oregon will surpass. Laborers will be employed, business interests will boom and Salem will make more growth than any similar city on the coast. To start early means that a great deal will be accomplished and while the earth is soft grading can be easily done, and the ground left to settle and gravel coatings put on the residence streets when the river is low and the streets dry. Hence action should be had at once. It is not too early to let the contracts for grading several residence streets in March. An early start on several miles of streets means a busy and prosperous year for all business interests. It means ten months of life and activity and will do more to place Salem in the front rank of coast cities than any other one thing.

BEAUTIFUL STREETS

with fine grades and as wide as they are in Salem, well rounded up and drained, with curbs and parked out to a distance of twenty feet on each side will make Salem the handsomest city in the valley. On no other city site is there such an opportunity to increase the fine effects and increase the value of property by making fine streets as there is at Salem. It will cost some property owners on the business streets something to be sure, but nothing in comparison to the benefit that will be derived. Broad streets, with fine trees, parked and set to rose bushes and well cared for will make Salem another city of magnificent dimensions.

The prompt and hearty action of the council on this matter will meet with unanimous approval at present. What it would meet with in the future no one can tell. THE JOURNAL has no interest in the matter but to see the city go ahead. The business interests of the city must be placed foremost. The laboring men of the city must be employed. The old policy of restricting the operations of the city to the minimum of mobackism must give way to the new spirit of the age that is in keeping with modern ideas of city building.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Revolving Motor Line Right of Way—Inspecting Electric Line Right of Way.

MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Henry James was given a ticket to Grants Pass, where he has friends who will assist in caring for him.

Catherine Rich was given relief in the sum of \$8 per month, with C. Griffin as disbursing agent.

In the matter of damage to the county roads by electric motor line ordered that Tuesday be set for examining the county roads damaged.

In the matter of the petition of E. F. Parkhurst, et al., for permission to lay tracks and maintain railways along certain highways: ordered by the court that the order heretofore made, granting right-of-way, be revoked and that E. F. Parkhurst be notified to appear and show cause why same should not be dismissed.

HOW IT IS RECEIVED.

The action of the court is a surprise when it is considered that it has granted franchises of this kind in all directions from the city, several miles over the highways to the fair grounds, out beyond Yow Park, and for the electric line through South Salem and to Rural cemetery. The court is going today to inspect a line and advise as to its proper construction, which under its new order it has no right to allow to be constructed. This is a contradiction. It is a contradiction of its own authority already exercised in many cases, upon which large property interests are founded, and a contradiction which if insisted upon will involve the county and property interests affected in litigation and prove fatal to the development of this city and county.

THE LUCKY DISAPPEARANCE.

H. B. Miller Claims to Have Seen Him in Salem.

THE ELECTRIC EXTENSION.

Large Force at Work—Inspected by the County Court—What the Superintendent Says.

The old stage road leading into Salem from the south is being converted into a city street with an electric railway line.

Forty-two men and thirteen teams are pushing the grading of the electric extension through South Salem to Rural cemetery.

Judge Davidson and Commissioners Grimm and Watson went over the extension on foot as far as the cemetery and inspected the whole work.

Supt. Barnes was seen and said there were only one or two kicking. The extension to Rural cemetery will be the means of making that a good street, which it is not today. It will result in grading the street. There is no grievance by the property owners.

Commissioners Grimm and Watson went out to see a road at the asylum, and when they return this evening the matter will be considered.

FOR PROGRESS.—The building of the viaduct on Commercial street is the greatest step for the advancement and improvement of Salem's principal business street that has ever been undertaken, and the members of the city government, who are pushing it to completion are entitled to have their names forever connected with it as a monument of enterprise, and as marking the advent of a new era of public improvements in the capital city. It is high time that our streets and bridges were constructed in a more than a temporary manner, and we predict if this viaduct is once built there will be an end of makeshifts in our public works. This improvement is of vital interest to South Salem. South Salem is a part of this city that has practically never had the benefit of any expenditures by the city. The shooting through of Commercial street on a level with the business part of the city will do more to build up South Salem than any one thing that can be done. It is a meritorious public improvement that everybody approves.
