

General Stanley, commanding the department of Texas, and the court-martial was thought to be imminent when his friends intervened and induced him to apply for retirement under the thirty-year-service law, the war department agreeing to pigeon-hole the charges on condition that the application for retirement should follow. The arrangement will not be fully consummated until next August, when Colonel Morrow will complete the thirty years necessary to entitle him to retirement. The war department has relieved him from his command, and ordered him to his home in anticipation of that event. The charges against Colonel Morrow are based upon certain actions of that officer during the recent Garza campaign. One of the principal charges, constituting disobedience of orders, relates to Colonel Morrow's passing to men of his regiment to pass over the border into Mexico in the face of positive instructions prohibiting such action. Colonel Morrow, it will be remembered, was tried by court-martial in this city a few years ago on charges of duplicating his pay accounts, and was suspended for three years.

**Was Not Pardoned.**  
OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 17.—The statement sent out from North Yakima that John Milburn, the train robber, who is again in trouble, was pardoned by Governor Ferry, is not correct. Milburn was sentenced to a term of one year from September 21, 1890. Under the provisions of the commutation act, approved February 2, 1888, the sentences of convicts are shortened for good behavior, the time deducted from the first year of a term being two months. Milburn has behaved himself well in prison, and according to the records of the penitentiary, he was liberated in pursuance of the law July 21, 1891, ten months after his term began.

**Endorse Harrison.**  
OKLAHOMA, I. T., Feb. 17.—The territorial convention of Republican clubs has elected delegates to the national convention, and adopted resolutions endorsing the administration of President Harrison.

**The Typhus Fever.**  
OKLAHOMA, I. T., Feb. 17.—There is considerable excitement here over five cases of typhus victims, a fewish mother and five children, who came here about ten days ago.

**Killed His Daughter.**  
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 17.—At Red Bluff, twenty miles below here, Henry Black, who was whipping his wife, shot and killed his daughter for interfering to protect her mother. Black was arrested. There is talk of lynching the man.

**Plot to Wreck a Train.**  
INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 17.—A special from Fort Wayne, Ind., says: A plot to wreck a passenger train on the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne and Chicago, at Arica, was discovered yesterday. Guards have been placed on the track and are patrolling constantly.

**A Steamship on Fire.**  
NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—The steamship Alesia, from Hamburg, was towed into port. February 8 fire was discovered in her hold and 126 bales of cotton had to be thrown overboard. The extent of the damage is not known. She is now off Sandy Hook.

**An Oregonian Dies.**  
PRINCETON, A. T., Feb. 17.—W. G. Cook, who claimed to have formerly lived at Pendleton, Or., died at the military hospital here yesterday of pneumonia. He had only arrived recently, and claimed to own property in Umatilla county, Oregon, and to have a young daughter living at Pendleton.

## FROM WASHINGTON.

### Congressional and Other News Items.

#### DOINGS OF CONGRESS.

##### Filibustering Tactics to Delay Bills—In the Senate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The doings of Western farmers and millers to the starving millions of Russia have at last served a practical purpose in the house. They served as a bludgeon for the gold standard to oppose for five hours the steady march of the lower house toward free coinage legislation. In the struggle politics had no place, filibustering and their opponents being alike members of the Democratic party. Tracey, of New York, led the fight against the consideration of the resolution authorizing the transportation of food donations to the starving Russians, but did so simply because he desired to keep as many measures as possible in the way of the Bland free coinage bill. There are now the Russian relief resolution and several other measures on the calendar of unfinished business, and it is the plan of Tracey and his followers to filibuster against all the measures in order to prevent the free coinage bill ever being reached on the calendar and passed by the house. The free coinage men may, however, force a vote on the Bland bill before it can pass to the calendar of unfinished business, which would be within two days after being reached in the order of consideration.

Hurroughs, of Michigan, moved that the house proceed to the consideration of unfinished business.

The speaker pro tem, Dockery, stated that the first unfinished business was Kilgore's motion to table the motion to reconsider the vote by which the house indefinitely postponed the senate joint resolution authorizing the secretary of the navy to transport contributions for the relief of the suffering poor of Russia.

Blount, of Georgia, suggested that the resolution upon which the motions were pending was improperly placed upon the calendar of unfinished business. On this question there was much desultory debate, and finally Tracey, of New York, came forward in the role of filibuster with a motion that the house take a recess for an hour.

Pending this, Owens, of Ohio, moved an adjournment, but it was lost. On Tracey's motion, no quorum voted, and when he raised the point tellers were ordered. On the vote by tellers a quorum appeared after weary waiting, and then Tracey demanded the yeas and nays. A motion for a recess was defeated, 6 to 195. Many opponents of the silver bill withheld their vote in the hope of breaking a quorum. Immediately Tracey was on his feet with a motion to adjourn which was defeated, 35 to 140. The question recurred on a motion to table the motion to reconsider the vote by which the Russian relief resolution was indefinitely postponed. It was tabled without division, thus finally defeating the measure. The house then adjourned.

**IN THE SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—In the senate yesterday, the Idaho contested election case was taken up. The resolutions reported by the committee are that Dubois is entitled to the seat he now holds, and Claggett is not entitled to it. The majority report is signed by Teller, Hoar, Mitchell, Chandler and Higgins, Republicans, and Pugh and Turpin, Democrats. The minority report is in favor of Claggett, signed by two Democratic senators, Vance and Gray. Pending the discussion, the senate adjourned.

**THE SENATE TODAY.**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The senate today passed a resolution requesting the president to return to Mexico, 21 battle flags now in the museum of the U. S. Military Academy, which were captured during the late war with Mexico. Also a bill directing the secretary to admit free of duty the wreckage from the ships Trenton and Vandalla presented by the U. S. government to the king of Samoa, and refund \$1,750, being the amount of duties paid thereon to the collector at San Francisco. Also a bill for the payment to Wm. R. Wheaton, ex-registrar, and Chas. H. Chamberlain, ex-receiver of the land office at San Francisco, \$3800, a portion of the amount deposited by them in the treasury, as fees for the testimony taken by clerks, paid by themselves.

Idaho contested election case was then taken up and Gray addressed the senate in support of the views of the minority of the committee on election, that Claggett, not Dubois, was entitled to the seat.

**WERE WE FOOLED?**  
The Canadian Reciprocity Commissioners.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—A Washington correspondent, referring to the withdrawal of the Canadian reciprocity commissioners, says: "If the Canadian commissioners shall return to Canada and make misleading statements as to the commission here, as did Sir Charles Tupper on a former occasion, the probability is that the administration will not permit the statements to go uncontradicted, but will publish what did actually occur in order to protect itself from the im-

position to which it was subjected last spring. It is understood that the secretary of state took pains to have the statements of the Dominion commissioners reduced to writing. It is announced in Ottawa that the Dominion ministers are expected to soon return from Washington. It can be stated authoritatively that Secretary Blaine will place nothing in the way of their immediate return. It is known that the president and Secretary Blaine are indignant that diplomatic courtesy has been so audaciously abused as it has been by the Dominion commissioners in coming to Washington to negotiate a treaty when they have no authority whatever to even enter upon the preliminary consideration of that question. When they arrived here it was supposed they had full authority to conclude an agreement which, if approved by the president and submitted to the senate, would be binding upon the United States and upon the British government. It now appears that they came for the purpose of endeavoring to 'look into the hand of the United States' and to ascertain, if they could, whether there would be any prospect of reciprocity, even if they could obtain from Great Britain any authority to negotiate a treaty. The president and Secretary Blaine now find that they have twice been used to effect a tory and anti-American purpose in Canada. There are indications, that if the Dominion commissioners do not omit the ordinary courtesy of calling upon the president to take leave, the latter may avail himself of the occasion to announce in a speech to them how much this government feels that it has been trifled with. It is said that Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British minister, is not altogether pleased that he has been made the cat's-paw, for the second time, by the Dominion government for purposes of its own, and that he feels very much embarrassed that he should have introduced the Dominion cabinet officers to the secretary of state and the president, knowing that the United States officials presumed at least that the Canadian commissioners had some authority in the premises. There will be no treaty made by the present administration with the tory government at Ottawa. This is one of the results which is made clear by the masquerades here of the past week, and the cause of reciprocity, which the tory cabinet pretend to have so much at heart, has been apparently seriously injured by the campaign of false pretenses here."

**Robert Ford Killed.**  
DENVER, Colo., Feb. 17.—Robert Ford, who killed Jesse James, the Missouri outlaw, in 1882 was shot and killed today in a saloon row at Creed, a new mining town.

**WANT EIGHT HOURS.**  
Carpenters Will Demand It After May 1st.  
BOSTON, Feb. 17.—The United Brotherhood of Carpenters, throughout the country will, on May 1st, demand that eight hours shall constitute a day's work, and will strike where the concessions are not made.

**For Blaine.**  
CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—The Chicago Blaine club has decided to go to Minneapolis, and make every honorable attempt to secure the nomination of Blaine for president.

**Hyatt Gives Himself Up.**  
NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—John Hyatt, the Jersey City abductor, who was captured in San Francisco, but escaped from the custody of Detective Dalton, who was bringing him home in a sleeping car, astonished the officials at the police headquarters in that city this morning, by walking in and giving himself up.

**Real Estate Congress.**  
NASHVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 17.—About 700 delegates to the national real estate congress, met this morning and listened to addresses of welcome. At noon a recess 'till until this evening, when a permanent organization will be effected.

**Louisiana Republicans.**  
NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 17.—The State convention of the Republican party of Louisiana, was called to order at noon today.

**More Exiles for Siberia.**  
WARSAW, Feb. 17.—A large number of arrests continue to be made here in connection with the alleged nihilist plot. There were recently arrested here 550 persons who were exiled to Siberia. There yet remain sixty political prisoners in the Warsaw citadel.

## FROM PORTLAND.

### Relief for Russia and Other Foreign Items.

#### STORMS IN EUROPE.

**Snow in all Paris—Traffic at a Standstill.**  
PARIS, Feb. 17.—A storm has been raging here since last evening. Traffic is almost at a standstill.

**VIENNA, Feb. 17.**—Terrible snow storms are raging in Galicia, a province of Austro-Hungary, and the greater part of Austrian Poland. Snow is piled up in immense drifts, and traffic on the various railway lines is almost wholly suspended.

**LONDON, Feb. 17.**—It is thought a number of vessels were lost in the recent storms, as a large quantity of wreckage is coming in at different points on the coast.

#### TWO THIEVES.

**They Stole Many Overcoats.**  
PORTLAND, Feb. 17.—Theodore Mahler and Frank Parkinson, were arraigned in department No. 2 of the state circuit court yesterday, and allowed until Thursday morning in which to plead. These defendants seem to have been doing a land-office business in the way of stealing from a dwelling house.

Seven indictments have been returned by the grand jury against Mahler and Parkinson charging them in each instance with larceny from dwellings. They are charged with having entered dwellings on the following dates, and of carrying away articles:

On the 20th of January, the dwelling of A. Sorenson and stealing an overcoat valued at \$75, the property of J. Weeber.

On the 27th of January, the house of John L. Gorman and carrying off a coat, umbrella and gloves of the value of \$55, the property of Sam J. Gorman.

January 23, the dwelling of A. Ralls and carrying away an overcoat and pair of gloves of the value of \$55, and the personal property of H. A. Shaub.

On same date the dwelling of Howard Winter and carrying away an overcoat, pair of gloves and handkerchief valued at \$12, and the personal property of Herbert Edgings. They also took from the same house a dress frockcoat of the value of \$22.50, belonging to the same person.

On the following day—January 29—these gay young thieves entered the house of J. F. Stewart and stole a smoking-jacket, cloak, a coat and vest, all of the value of \$35, and the personal property of J. F. Stewart.

And, lastly as the crowning act of their burglarious exploits, Mahler and Parkinson entered the house of Kate L. Bonner, and stole a mackintosh, a pair of gloves and a silk handkerchief, all of the value of \$16.25, and belonging to Charles E. Sloth.

They were allowed till Thursday to plead to the indictments.

**Arrested for Adultery.**  
PORTLAND, Feb. 17.—Warrants were issued today for the arrest of John Knight, of McMinnville, Ore., and Mrs. J. W. Cochran of this city, on a charge of adultery. Mrs. Cochran was arrested this morning at the Union depot where she was about to take the train for the Sound. It is thought that Knight is in Tacoma where he went last night.

**NEBRASKA SENDS CORN.**  
Two Million Bushels on the Way to Russia.

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 17.—Nebraska's contribution to Russia's sufferers leaves for the East on two trains today—one train from Omaha, and the other from Lincoln. There are about two million bushels of corn, which will be shipped to Akron, O., and there ground, sacked, and then sent to the sea board.

## RIOT AND BLOODSHED.

**At the Opening of a Dance House.**  
SPOKANE, Feb. 17.—A special says the opening of an enormous dance house at Sand Point, Idaho, resulted in a riot and bloodshed last night. Three hundred railroaders, cattlemen and miners were present. In the midst of the dancing a row started, in which one man was shot in the breast and another had his brains blown out and two dissolute females were probably fatally wounded. In the midst of the affray U. S. Marshal Warren and Sheriff Morley with five men entered and closed the house and now twenty-five of the worst characters in the Northwest are penned up in the stockade corral and guarded by deputy sheriffs.

**A Successful Torpedo Test.**  
LONDON, Feb. 17.—A thorough test of the Sims-Edison electric torpedo took place in Portsmouth harbor under the direction of the admiralty, and in the presence of naval attaches of many countries. The test was completely successful and experts admit the torpedo would, if adopted, displace the Brennan torpedo, which is largely the creation of British engineers.
