Lockwood Messenger System Ready for Business.

Monday a circuit of about fifty boxes was completed on the Lockwood Messenger system on Commercial street and were put into operation for the first time.

The system, when finished, will have 200 four-call boxes and will be as complete as any on the coast. Other boxes are being added daily as fast as the outside wiring can be done. The central office will be in the Postal Telegraph office and will be kept open from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m., so that a messenger can be called any time during those hours from any part of the city. THE CITY FATHERS.

Chemeketa Street Ordered Improved—Front Street Again—New Franchise Ordinance For Motor Lines.

The entire council and its officers were present Tuesday evening, Mayor D'Arcy in the chair. Mrs. Estelle Hildebeck asked permission to canvass for books. Hutton said it was wrong to charge one person and not another. Hunt sustained him. The mayor thought the council should discriminate in favor of worthy persons living in our midst. Ayes 4, noes 3; permit granted.

Chairman Hunt reported verbally on Commercial street viaduct. He had seen the county court and they had expressed a willingness to assist the city if the cost was not too high. Committee on fire and water reported favorably on removing light on Oak and Capital streets to center of street. Report adopted. Hutton stated that by resolution the council had ordered lights put up on corner. Johnson said county had removed court house light from corner of square and moved a light to be put at Church and Court streets in center of crossing. Committee on fire and water was instructed to confer with county court to secure light.

REPORTS OF CITY OFFICERS.

The street commissioner and recorder submitted a recommendation for the grading and graveling of Chemeketa street from Water to Fourteenth.

Mr. Johnson moved reference to committee on streets and public property, with city attorney and engineer to get up plans and specifications and advertise for bids and report at next meeting. Carried.

Chief Engineer Low submitted a report recommending a paid fire department. Referred to committee on fire and water.

The street commissioner reported that he had been unable to get any reply from Supt. Kocher as to planning the Front street race. Hutton moved that the city attorney be instructed to notify the company to comply with the orders of the council, or forfeit their franchise along Front street.

THE STREET IMPROVEMENT

ordered to be proceeded with: provide that Chemeketa street, from Water to Fourteenth streets, shall "be brought to a standard grade, and that it be properly gravelled with a coating of gravel at least six inches thick, and that the sidewalks and crosswalks and street car line also be placed on grade."

OVERFLOW IN DEPOT ADDITION.

Committee recommended that water course be cut through blocks 6 and 7, to intersection of alley with Turner road. There was some objection, and the matter was asked to be laid over for two weeks and referred to committee on streets.

THE TAX QUESTION

City Attorney Richardson reported that the county court would not contest the right of the city to road tax on city property.

PETITIONS.

For transfer of unexpired dray license of S. W. Morgan to James M. Worne. Granted.

Wm. Witzel asked permission to connect with Fourteenth street sewer at manhole. To street committee with power to act.

The Salem Flouring Mills Co. submitted the following: Your petitioner represent that a sewer was last summer or fall constructed

through block 44 of said city; that this company owns the abutting property upon one side of said sewer; that the contract was let and performed for \$637.50; that the city charged the owner of the abutting property \$701.25, being \$63.75 more than it paid to its contractor; that this company was wrongfully charged and paid one half of this expense, being \$31.87. It therefore prays for the return of that amount to said company. Referred to committee on streets.

For opening of Marion from Fourteenth to Fifteenth and side-walks on both sides.

ORDINANCES.
To amend an ordinance to make all street work assessable upon abutting property, and to require all bridges, crosswalks and intersections of streets to be built at expense of city. To ordinance committee.

NEW FRANCHISE.

Ordinance granting to E. F. Parkhurst and others for franchise on State, Center, Twelfth, Eighteenth and Commercial streets was read twice and referred to committee on ordinances.

Hutton moved that all bills against city should be read in open council before reference. Carried.

The council adjourned.

IN THE LEAGUE.

Arrangements Pending for League Baseball Games at Salem the Coming Season.

Manager E. B. Lytle, with the Portland club last year, is in the city working up a plan to include a Salem team in a circuit of Portland, Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane and Walla Walla.

A stock company is being formed to incorporate with \$10,000 capital stock; \$50 shares, \$25 to be paid down.

The street railway lines will assist liberally and there is no reason why Salem should not go in on this basis.

If it succeeds, Mr. Lytle will be manager. He is a competent man, and will make up the new team out of a large list of live men that would place Salem in the front rank as a baseball town. The stock should be subscribed at once.

THE SALEM WAY.

Big Public Improvements Well Under Way—1892 Will be a Great Year for This City.

The electric railway is being rushed through to Rural cemetery on the south.

The city council has ordered fifteen blocks of Chemeketa street, from the river east graded, curbed and paved.

The South Commercial street viaduct will be built, and the hill cut through.

Permanent public improvements are the order of the day, and THE JOURNAL is happy.

SHORT BUT BITTER.

Mrs. Sladden Commences a Suit for Divorce Against S. C. Sladden.

Mrs. Nellie G. Sladden this morning filed a complaint in the Lane county circuit court against her husband, S. C. Sladden, for absolute divorce. The plaintiff alleges:

That plaintiff and defendant were married at Los Angeles, Cal., on Oct. 8, 1890. That soon after marriage defendant became cross, brutal and arbitrary to plaintiff and would curse and abuse her; made statements to her in reference to his actions with other women which humiliated her; that on Feb. 7, 1891, he kicked her out of bed, hurting her badly, and used to her profane and indecent language; that on July 18, 1891, he administered chloroform to her, without her knowledge, which made her sick; that on Dec. 9, 1891, he threw her on the floor and abused her greatly; that he threatened to kill her at numerous times; that he admitted his infidelity with numerous women, giving times and places, too indecent, vulgar and profane to be written; that she left him on Jan. 22, 1892; that her health has been greatly impaired and endangered by said treatment; that S. C. Sladden is worth from \$8000 to \$10,000, and is able to pay plaintiff \$5000 alimony; that he is able to pay her \$75 alimony per month out of his earnings during the pendency of this suit; that he has taken and converted to his use \$1,125 of plaintiff's money, between Jan. 15, 1891, and Sept. 24, 1891, without her consent; that defendant pay to plaintiff \$500 for attorneys fees, costs, etc., for the prosecution of this suit; that defendant has transferred to H. E. Sladden certain property in Eugene to defraud plaintiff.

Wherefore, plaintiff asks judgment from the court as follows: \$1,125, money converted belonging to plaintiff; \$5000 alimony, and the sum of \$75 per month pending this suit, and \$500 attorney fees, cost, etc.; for one-half the property transferred to H. E. Sladden; for an absolute divorce, and that she may be allowed to resume her maiden name, Nellie E. Gilbert.

Attorneys L. Blyden, George A. Dorris and A. C. Woodcock appear for the plaintiff.—Eugene Guard, Feb. 16.
